Definitions of "Disseminate" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “disseminate” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Spread (something, especially information) widely.*
- *Spread throughout an organ or the body.*
- *Cause to become widely known.*



Synonyms of "Disseminate" as a verb (17 Words)

broadcast	Broadcast over the airwaves as in radio or television. <i>We don't want to broadcast our unhappiness to the world.</i>
circularise	Distribute circulars to.
circularize	Canvass by using a questionnaire. <i>They circularize prospective purchasers at regular intervals.</i>
circulate	Move through a space, circuit or system, returning to the starting point. <i>Circulate a rumor.</i>
communicate	Pass on (an infectious disease) to another person or animal. <i>He and his sons haven't communicated for years.</i>
diffuse	Spread or diffuse through. <i>Gas is diffused into the bladder.</i>
disperse	To cause to separate and go in different directions. <i>Winds dispersed the radioactive cloud high in the atmosphere.</i>
distribute	Be distributed or spread as in statistical analyses. <i>The middle term must be distributed at least once in the premises.</i>
make known	Make, formulate, or derive in the mind.
pass around	Place into the hands or custody of.
pass on	Go unchallenged; be approved.
proclaim	Say something emphatically; declare. <i>He was proclaimed King.</i>
promulgate	Promote or make widely known (an idea or cause). <i>In January 1852 the new Constitution was promulgated.</i>
propagate	Cause to propagate as by grafting or layering. <i>A hydraulic fracture is generally expected to propagate in a vertical plane.</i>
publicize	Call attention to. <i>Judy had started to publicize books and celebrities.</i>
put about	Formulate in a particular style or language.
spread	Become distributed or widespread. <i>Bobby spread his arms wide.</i>



Usage Examples of "Disseminate" as a verb

- *There is a subset of these low-grade tumours that can disseminate and migrate.*
- *Health authorities should foster good practice by disseminating information.*



Associations of "Disseminate" (30 Words)

asunder	Widely separated especially in space. <i>Torn asunder.</i>
circulate	Move in circles. <i>Tutors were circulated with the handout.</i>
diffuse	Spread or diffuse through. <i>A diffuse historical novel.</i>
diffusion	The intermingling of substances by the natural movement of their particles. <i>The rate of diffusion of a gas.</i>
dispel	Force to go away; used both with concrete and metaphoric meanings. <i>Dispel doubts.</i>
dispersal	The splitting up of a group of people, causing them to leave in different directions. <i>Colleges had made large dispersals and the shops were filled with books.</i>
disperse	Denoting a phase dispersed in another phase as in a colloid. <i>Emulsions should be examined after storage for droplet size of the disperse phase.</i>
dispersed	Distributed or spread over a considerable extent. <i>Has ties with many widely dispersed friends.</i>
dispersion	The action or process of distributing things or people over a wide area. <i>The virus is transmitted in the dispersion of droplets which results from sneezing or coughing.</i>
dissemination	The property of being diffused or dispersed. <i>The dissemination of public information.</i>
dissipate	Live a life of pleasure, especially with respect to alcoholic consumption. <i>He wanted to dissipate his anger.</i>
distribute	Cause to be distributed. <i>You can distribute the system's output over your home network.</i>
diversify	(of a business) enlarge or vary its range of products or field of operation. <i>Diversify a course of study.</i>
effluence	The action of flowing out.
imbue	Fill, soak or imbue totally. <i>His works are invariably imbued with a sense of calm and serenity.</i>
intersperse	Place at intervals in or among. <i>Intersperse exclamation marks in the text.</i>

perfuse	Force a fluid through (a body part or tissue). <i>The yellow light is perfused with white.</i>
<u>permeate</u>	Pass through. <i>The aroma of soup permeated the air.</i>
pervasiveness	The quality of filling or spreading throughout. <i>The pervasiveness of the odor of cabbage in tenement hallways.</i>
proliferate	(of a cell, structure, or organism) reproduce rapidly. <i>Cultured cells often proliferate indefinitely.</i>
<u>proliferation</u>	Rapid reproduction of a cell, part, or organism. <i>Stress levels are high forcing upon them a proliferation of ailments.</i>
prolix	Tediously prolonged or tending to speak or write at great length. <i>Editing a prolix manuscript.</i>
<u>propagate</u>	Cause to propagate as by grafting or layering. <i>Sound and light propagate in this medium.</i>
<u>scatter</u>	Sow by scattering. <i>The children scattered in all directions when the teacher approached.</i>
scattered	Occurring or distributed over widely spaced and irregular intervals in time or space. <i>Scattered thoughts.</i>
<u>spray</u>	Cover by spraying with a liquid. <i>A spray of bullets.</i>
spread	A tasty mixture to be spread on bread or crackers or used in preparing other dishes. <i>With arms spread wide.</i>
<u>sprinkle</u>	Scatter with liquid; wet lightly. <i>Sprinkle sesame seeds over the top.</i>
strew	Spread by scattering (is archaic). <i>A small room with newspapers strewn all over the floor.</i>
suffuse	To become overspread as with a fluid, a colour, a gleam of light. <i>The first half of the poem is suffused with idealism.</i>
