### Definitions of "Disseminate" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “disseminate” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Spread (something, especially information) widely.*
- *Spread throughout an organ or the body.*
- *Cause to become widely known.*



## Synonyms of "Disseminate" as a verb (17 Words)

<b>broadcast</b>	Broadcast over the airwaves as in radio or television. <i>We don't want to <b>broadcast</b> our unhappiness to the world.</i>
<b>circularise</b>	Distribute circulars to.
<b>circularize</b>	Canvass by using a questionnaire. <i>They <b>circularize</b> prospective purchasers at regular intervals.</i>
<b>circulate</b>	Move through a space, circuit or system, returning to the starting point. <i><b>Circulate</b> a rumor.</i>
<b>communicate</b>	Pass on (an infectious disease) to another person or animal. <i>He and his sons haven't <b>communicated</b> for years.</i>
<b>diffuse</b>	Spread or diffuse through. <i>Gas is <b>diffused</b> into the bladder.</i>
<b>disperse</b>	To cause to separate and go in different directions. <i>Winds <b>dispersed</b> the radioactive cloud high in the atmosphere.</i>
<b>distribute</b>	Be distributed or spread as in statistical analyses. <i>The middle term must be <b>distributed</b> at least once in the premises.</i>
<b>make known</b>	Make, formulate, or derive in the mind.
<b>pass around</b>	Place into the hands or custody of.
<b>pass on</b>	Go unchallenged; be approved.
<b>proclaim</b>	Say something emphatically; declare. <i>He was <b>proclaimed</b> King.</i>
<b>promulgate</b>	Promote or make widely known (an idea or cause). <i>In January 1852 the new Constitution was <b>promulgated</b>.</i>
<b>propagate</b>	Cause to propagate as by grafting or layering. <i>A hydraulic fracture is generally expected to <b>propagate</b> in a vertical plane.</i>
<b>publicize</b>	Call attention to. <i>Judy had started to <b>publicize</b> books and celebrities.</i>
<b>put about</b>	Formulate in a particular style or language.
<b>spread</b>	Become distributed or widespread. <i>Bobby <b>spread</b> his arms wide.</i>

- *Health authorities should foster good practice by disseminating information.*



## Associations of "Disseminate" (30 Words)

<b>asunder</b>	Widely separated especially in space. <i>Torn <b>asunder</b>.</i>
<b>circulate</b>	Move in circles. <i>Tutors were <b>circulated</b> with the handout.</i>
<b>diffuse</b>	Spread or diffuse through. <i>A <b>diffuse</b> historical novel.</i>
<b>diffusion</b>	The intermingling of substances by the natural movement of their particles. <i>The rate of <b>diffusion</b> of a gas.</i>
<b>dispel</b>	Force to go away; used both with concrete and metaphoric meanings. <i><b>Dispel</b> doubts.</i>
<b>dispersal</b>	The splitting up of a group of people, causing them to leave in different directions. <i>Colleges had made large <b>dispersals</b> and the shops were filled with books.</i>
<b>disperse</b>	Denoting a phase dispersed in another phase as in a colloid. <i>Emulsions should be examined after storage for droplet size of the <b>disperse</b> phase.</i>
<b>dispersed</b>	Distributed or spread over a considerable extent. <i>Has ties with many widely <b>dispersed</b> friends.</i>
<b>dispersion</b>	The action or process of distributing things or people over a wide area. <i>The virus is transmitted in the <b>dispersion</b> of droplets which results from sneezing or coughing.</i>
<b>dissemination</b>	The property of being diffused or dispersed. <i>The <b>dissemination</b> of public information.</i>
<b>dissipate</b>	Live a life of pleasure, especially with respect to alcoholic consumption. <i>He wanted to <b>dissipate</b> his anger.</i>
<b>distribute</b>	Cause to be distributed. <i>You can <b>distribute</b> the system's output over your home network.</i>
<b>diversify</b>	(of a business) enlarge or vary its range of products or field of operation. <i><b>Diversify</b> a course of study.</i>
<b>effluence</b>	The action of flowing out.
<b>imbue</b>	Fill, soak or imbue totally. <i>His works are invariably <b>imbued</b> with a sense of calm and serenity.</i>
<b>intersperse</b>	Place at intervals in or among. <i><b>Intersperse</b> exclamation marks in the text.</i>

<b>perfuse</b>	Force a fluid through (a body part or tissue). <i>The yellow light is <b>perfused</b> with white.</i>
<b><u>permeate</u></b>	Pass through. <i>The aroma of soup <b>permeated</b> the air.</i>
<b>pervasiveness</b>	The quality of filling or spreading throughout. <i>The <b>pervasiveness</b> of the odor of cabbage in tenement hallways.</i>
<b>proliferate</b>	(of a cell, structure, or organism) reproduce rapidly. <i>Cultured cells often <b>proliferate</b> indefinitely.</i>
<b><u>proliferation</u></b>	Rapid reproduction of a cell, part, or organism. <i>Stress levels are high forcing upon them a <b>proliferation</b> of ailments.</i>
<b>prolix</b>	Tediously prolonged or tending to speak or write at great length. <i>Editing a <b>prolix</b> manuscript.</i>
<b><u>propagate</u></b>	Cause to propagate as by grafting or layering. <i>Sound and light <b>propagate</b> in this medium.</i>
<b><u>scatter</u></b>	Sow by scattering. <i>The children <b>scattered</b> in all directions when the teacher approached.</i>
<b>scattered</b>	Occurring or distributed over widely spaced and irregular intervals in time or space. <i><b>Scattered</b> thoughts.</i>
<b><u>spray</u></b>	Cover by spraying with a liquid. <i>A <b>spray</b> of bullets.</i>
<b>spread</b>	A tasty mixture to be spread on bread or crackers or used in preparing other dishes. <i>With arms <b>spread</b> wide.</i>
<b><u>sprinkle</u></b>	Scatter with liquid; wet lightly. <i><b>Sprinkle</b> sesame seeds over the top.</i>
<b>strew</b>	Spread by scattering ( is archaic). <i>A small room with newspapers <b>strewn</b> all over the floor.</i>
<b>suffuse</b>	To become overspread as with a fluid, a colour, a gleam of light. <i>The first half of the poem is <b>suffused</b> with idealism.</i>
