<a href="#">adverse</a>	Contrary to your interests or welfare. <i><b>Adverse</b> currents.</i>
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<u>chant</u>	The style of music consisting of chants. <i>The rabbi <b>chanted</b> a prayer.</i>
<b>competitor</b>	An organization or country engaged in commercial or economic competition with others. <i>Two <b>competitors</b> were banned for taking drugs.</i>
<b>contestant</b>	A person who dissents from some established policy. <i>An anxious <b>contestant</b> on a television quiz show.</i>
<b>controvert</b>	Deny the truth of (something). <i>Subsequent work from the same laboratory <b>controverted</b> these results.</i>
<b>demonstrator</b>	A participant in a public protest meeting or march. <i>Troops opened fire on crowds of <b>demonstrators</b>.</i>
<u>disagree</u>	Have or express a different opinion. <i>The sea crossing <b>disagreed</b> with her.</i>
<u>disapproval</u>	The expression of disapproval. <i>Jill replied with a hint of <b>disapproval</b> in her voice.</i>
<u>disobedient</u>	Not obeying or complying with commands of those in authority. <i>Larry was stern with <b>disobedient</b> employees.</i>
<u>dissent</u>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>There was no <b>dissent</b> from this view.</i>
<b>dissentient</b>	Refusing to attend services of the Church of England. <i><b>Dissentient</b> voices were castigated as hopeless bureaucrats.</i>
<u>dissident</u>	In opposition to official policy. <i>A <b>dissident</b> who had been jailed by a military regime.</i>
<u>enemy</u>	A personal enemy. <i>He viewed lawyers as the real <b>enemy</b>.</i>
<b>negation</b>	Denial of the truth of a clause or sentence, typically involving the use of a negative word (e.g. not, no, never) or a word or affix with negative force (e.g. nothing, non-). <i>The <b>negation</b> of A is briefly not A.</i>
<b>negative</b>	A negative photographic image made on film or specially prepared glass from which positive prints may be made. <i>A <b>negative</b> outlook on life.</i>
<b>nonconformist</b>	Someone who refuses to conform to established standards of conduct. <i>The old stubborn <b>nonconformist</b> spirit of the early settlers.</i>
<u>objection</u>	The act of protesting; a public (often organized) manifestation of dissent. <i>They have raised no <b>objections</b> to the latest plans.</i>

<b>objector</b>	A person who dissents from some established policy. <i><b>Objectors</b> claim the motorway will damage the environment.</i>
<b>opponent</b>	Someone who offers opposition. <i>The news will delight <b>opponents</b> of GM foods.</i>
<b>oppose</b>	Actively resist (a person or system). <i>The board <b>opposed</b> his motion.</i>
<b>opposed</b>	In conflict with or hostile to. <i>Parties <b>opposed</b> to the ruling party.</i>
<b>opposite</b>	Of angles between opposite sides of the intersection of two lines. <i>They went in <b>opposite</b> directions.</i>
<b>protester</b>	Someone who participates in a public display of group feeling. <i>The decision was hailed by <b>protesters</b> against the closure as a triumph.</i>
<b>rebut</b>	Claim or prove that (evidence or an accusation) is false. <i>But he their sharp assault right boldly did <b>rebut</b>.</i>
<b>rebuttal</b>	A pleading by the defendant in reply to a plaintiff's surrejoinder.
<b>recusant</b>	Of or denoting a recusant. <i>Support for the exiled King was greatest among Catholic <b>recusants</b>.</i>
<b>refute</b>	Overthrow by argument, evidence, or proof. <i>His voice challenging his audience to rise and <b>refute</b> him.</i>
<b>rejection</b>	An immunological response that refuses to accept substances or organisms that are recognized as foreign. <i><b>Rejection</b> of the transplanted liver.</i>
<b>remonstrance</b>	The act of expressing earnest opposition or protest. <i>Angry <b>remonstrances</b> in the Commons.</i>
<b>resist</b>	A resistant substance applied as a coating to protect a surface during a process for example to prevent dye or glaze adhering. <i>Sweets are much easier to <b>resist</b> when you ve filled up on healthy food first.</i>
