- Characterized by departure from accepted beliefs or standards.
- In opposition to official policy.
- Disagreeing, especially with a majority.

challenger	A person who engages in a contest. A potential <b>challenger</b> for the party leadership.
<u>chant</u>	Recite with musical intonation recite as a chant or a psalm. Everyone was singing and <b>chant</b> ing.
competitor	The contestant you hope to defeat. Two <b>competitor</b> s were banned for taking drugs.
conflicting	In disagreement- John Morley. There are <b>conflicting</b> accounts of what occurred.
<u>contender</u>	The contestant you hope to defeat. The major <b>contender</b> s in the football championship.
contestant	A person who dissents from some established policy. An anxious <b>contestant</b> on a television quiz show.
controvert	Deny the truth of (something. Subsequent work from the same laboratory <b>controvert</b> ed these results.
<u>counterpart</u>	A person or thing that corresponds to or has the same function as another person or thing in a different place or situation. <i>The minister held talks with his French counterpart.</i>
demonstrator	A person who shows how a piece of equipment works or how a skill or craft is performed. She was appointed <b>demonstrator</b> in botany at Newnham College.
<u>disagree</u>	Disapprove of. No one was willing to <b>disagree</b> with him.
<u>disobedient</u>	Unwilling to submit to authority. <b>Disobedient</b> children.
<u>dissent</u>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>He expressed his <b>dissent</b> in a contrary opinion.</i>
dissenter	A person who dissents.
dissentient	Refusing to attend services of the Church of England. <b>Dissentient</b> voices were castigated as hopeless bureaucrats.
<u>enemy</u>	A personal enemy. <b>Enemy</b> aircraft.
foe	An enemy or opponent. His work was praised by friends and <b>foe</b> s alike.
negation	(logic) a proposition that is true if and only if another proposition is false. <i>There should be confirmation or <b>negation</b> of the findings.</i>



negative	Having a negative charge. Should criminal law allow consent to <b>negative</b> what would otherwise be a crime.
nonconformist	A member of a Protestant Church which dissents from the established c Church of England. <i>She was a <b>nonconformist</b> an individualist.</i>
objection	The action of challenging or disagreeing with something. They have raised no <b>objection</b> s to the latest plans.
objector	A person who dissents from some established policy. <i>Objectors</i> to the housing plans.
opponent	Someone who offers opposition. An <b>opponent</b> of the economic reforms.
oppose	Be resistant to. The board <b>oppose</b> d his motion.
opposed	In conflict with or hostile to. The agency is being asked to do two diametrically <b>opposed</b> things.
protester	Someone who participates in a public display of group feeling. The decision was hailed by <b>protester</b> s against the closure as a triumph.
recusant	Of or denoting a recusant. Support for the exiled King was greatest among Catholic <b>recusant</b> s.
remonstrance	A forcefully reproachful protest. <i>He shut his ears to any <b>remonstrance</b>.</i>
rival	Be the rival of be in competition with. Nothing can <b>rival</b> cotton for durability.
vie	Compete eagerly with someone in order to do or achieve something. The athletes were vying for a place in the British team.
