<b>dissipation</b>	The squandering of money, energy, or resources. <i>A descent into drunkenness and sexual <b>dissipation</b>.</i>
<b>dissoluteness</b>	Dissolute indulgence in sensual pleasure.
<b>dissolving</b>	A gradual transition from one scene to the next; the next scene is gradually superimposed as the former scene fades out. <i>The <b>dissolving</b> of salt in water.</i>
<b>end</b>	The point in time at which something ends. <i>Both <b>ends</b> wrote at the same time.</i>
<b>ending</b>	The end of a word a suffix or inflectional ending or final morpheme. <i>The <b>ending</b> of warranty period.</i>
<b><u>excess</u></b>	Excessive indulgence. <i>We will deduct the <b>excess</b> from the loss and then pay up to the policy limit.</i>
<b>finish</b>	The act of finishing. <i>Excitement grew as the <b>finish</b> neared.</i>

<b>disperse</b>	Denoting a phase dispersed in another phase as in a colloid. <i>The crowds <b>dispersed</b>.</i>
<b>dispersed</b>	Distributed or spread over a considerable extent. <i>Has ties with many widely <b>dispersed</b> friends.</i>
<b><u>disseminate</u></b>	Cause to become widely known. <i>There is a subset of these low grade tumours that can <b>disseminate</b> and migrate.</i>
<b>dissemination</b>	The action or fact of spreading something, especially information, widely. <i>The <b>dissemination</b> of public information.</i>
