<u>decadence</u>	Luxurious self-indulgence. <i>He denounced Western decadence.</i>
discontinuation	The action of ceasing to do or provide something, especially something that has been provided on a regular basis. <i>The discontinuation of the product was a surprise to many.</i>
disintegration	The spontaneous disintegration of a radioactive substance along with the emission of ionizing radiation. <i>The twin problems of economic failure and social disintegration.</i>
dissipation	The squandering of money, energy, or resources. <i>A descent into drunkenness and sexual dissipation.</i>
dissoluteness	Dissolute indulgence in sensual pleasure.
dissolving	A gradual transition from one scene to the next; the next scene is gradually superimposed as the former scene fades out. <i>The dissolving of salt in water.</i>
end	The point in time at which something ends. <i>Both ends wrote at the same time.</i>
ending	The end of a word a suffix or inflectional ending or final morpheme. <i>The ending of warranty period.</i>
<u>excess</u>	Excessive indulgence. <i>We will deduct the excess from the loss and then pay up to the policy limit.</i>
finish	The act of finishing. <i>Excitement grew as the finish neared.</i>
fragmenting	A broken piece of a brittle artifact.
immoderation	The quality of being excessive and lacking in restraint; overindulgence. <i>He paid a high price for his immoderation.</i>
intemperance	The quality of being intemperate. <i>His occasional intemperance of tone.</i>
licentiousness	Dissolute indulgence in sensual pleasure.
liquefaction	The process of making something, especially a gas, liquid. <i>Helium can be obtained from the liquefaction of natural gas.</i>
looseness	Freedom from restraint. <i>Misunderstandings can often be traced to a looseness of expression.</i>
melting	The process whereby heat changes something from a solid to a liquid. <i>The melting of the polar ice caps can cause floods.</i>
profligacy	Dissolute indulgence in sensual pleasure. <i>The emperor's sexual profligacy.</i>

self-indulgence	Excess in action and immoderate indulgence of bodily appetites, especially in passion or indulgence.
suspension	Temporary cessation or suspension. <i>The suspension of military action.</i>
termination	Something that results. <i>A good result and a happy termination.</i>
wildness	The property of being wild or turbulent. <i>The wildness of his anger.</i>
winding down	The act of winding or twisting.
winding up	The act of winding or twisting.

asunder	Apart. <i>Torn asunder.</i>
decomposition	(chemistry) separation of a substance into two or more substances that may differ from each other and from the original substance. <i>The decomposition of organic waste.</i>
diffuse	Spread or diffuse through. <i>The second argument is more diffuse.</i>
disappear	Get lost, as without warning or explanation. <i>He disappeared without a trace.</i>
disappearance	The process of something ceasing to exist or be in use. <i>The police were investigating her disappearance.</i>
disintegration	The spontaneous disintegration of a radioactive substance along with the emission of ionizing radiation. <i>A disintegration of personality.</i>

<u>dismissal</u>	The termination of someone's employment (leaving them free to depart). <i>The dismissal of a batsman.</i>
<u>dispel</u>	Make (a doubt, feeling, or belief) disappear. <i>The brightness of the day did nothing to dispel Elaine's dejection.</i>
disperse	Denoting a phase dispersed in another phase as in a colloid. <i>The crowds dispersed.</i>
dispersed	Distributed or spread over a considerable extent. <i>Has ties with many widely dispersed friends.</i>
<u>disseminate</u>	Cause to become widely known. <i>There is a subset of these low grade tumours that can disseminate and migrate.</i>
dissemination	The action or fact of spreading something, especially information, widely. <i>The dissemination of public information.</i>
dissipate	Live a life of pleasure, especially with respect to alcoholic consumption. <i>No power is dissipated in this sort of control element.</i>
dissipation	Overindulgence in sensual pleasures; dissipated living. <i>The dissipations in the switch and diode are small.</i>
dissolute	Unrestrained by convention or morality. <i>Unfortunately his heir was feckless and dissolute.</i>
diversify	Make (more) diverse. <i>Diversify a course of study.</i>
division	A group of organisms forming a subdivision of a larger category. <i>The BBC's engineering division.</i>
extravagance	The quality of exceeding the appropriate limits of decorum or probability or truth. <i>His reckless extravagance with other people's money.</i>
<u>lightly</u>	With few burdens. <i>She placed her hand lightly on my shoulder.</i>
looseness	A lack of strict accuracy; laxity of practice. <i>The flexibility and looseness of the materials from which mythology is made.</i>
prodigality	Excessive spending.
profligacy	Licentious or dissolute behaviour. <i>The government returned to fiscal profligacy.</i>
profligate	Recklessly wasteful. <i>He succumbed to drink and a profligate lifestyle.</i>

<u>scatter</u>	The scattering of light other electromagnetic radiation or particles. <i>He charged across the foyer scattering people.</i>
<u>separation</u>	The process of distinguishing between two or more things. <i>Religion involved the separation of the sacred and the profane.</i>
<u>shed</u>	Shed at an early stage of development. <i>A garden shed.</i>
strew	Spread by scattering. <i>The table was strewn with books and papers.</i>
waste	Run off as waste. <i>Waste heat.</i>
<u>wasteful</u>	Tending to squander and waste. <i>Wasteful duplication of effort.</i>
