## Dissuade as a Verb

### Definitions of "Dissuade" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “dissuade” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Turn away from by persuasion.*
- *Persuade (someone) not to take a particular course of action.*

### Synonyms of "Dissuade" as a verb (7 Words)

<b><u>deter</u></b>	Discourage (someone) from doing something by instilling doubt or fear of the consequences. <i>Only a health problem would <b>deter</b> him from seeking re election.</i>
<b><u>discourage</u></b>	Deprive of courage or hope take away hope from cause to feel discouraged. <i>We should <b>discourage</b> this practice among our youth.</i>
<b>disincline</b>	Make unwilling.
<b>divert</b>	Draw (the attention) of someone from something. <i>Although the audience members were <b>diverted</b> by this new symphony critics disliked it.</i>
<b>prevent</b>	Stop (someone) from doing something. <i>Locks won t <b>prevent</b> a determined burglar from getting in.</i>

**sidetrack** Cause (someone) to be distracted from an immediate or important issue.  
*A development well drilled in the south west field is flowing at thousands of barrels a day after being **sidetracked**.*

**turn aside** Get by buying and selling.

## Usage Examples of "Dissuade" as a verb

- *Negative campaigning will only dissuade people.*
- *His friends tried to dissuade him from flying.*

## Associations of "Dissuade" (30 Words)

**adamant** Impervious to pleas, persuasion, requests, reason- W.Churchill.  
*He is **adamant** in his refusal to change his mind.*

**avert** Prevent or ward off (an undesirable occurrence).  
***Avert** a strike.*

**avoid** Prevent the occurrence of; prevent from happening.  
*This route **avoids** downtown Boston.*

**ban** Ban from a place of residence as for punishment.  
*A **ban** on dangerous jet ski riders.*

**censorship** The suppression or prohibition of any parts of books, films, news, etc. that are considered obscene, politically unacceptable, or a threat to security.  
*The regulation imposes **censorship** on all media.*

**depress** Push or pull (something) down into a lower position.  
*These news **depressed** her.*

**deter** Try to prevent; show opposition to.  
*Strategists think not only about how to **deter** war but about how war might occur.*

**determined** Determined or decided upon as by an authority.  
*Made continued and **determined** efforts to find and destroy enemy headquarters.*

**discourage** Deprive of courage or hope take away hope from cause to feel discouraged.  
*Tedious regulations could **discourage** investors.*

**dishearten** Cause (someone) to lose determination or confidence.  
*The farmer was **disheartened** by the damage to his crops.*

**foreclose** Keep from happening or arising; make impossible.  
*The bank was threatening to **foreclose** on his mortgage.*

<b>forestall</b>	Prevent or obstruct (an anticipated event or action) by taking advance action. <i>They will present their resignations to <b>forestall</b> a vote of no confidence.</i>
<b>forfend</b>	Avert or prevent (something evil or unpleasant). <i>The fiend <b>forfend</b> said the grim Earl.</i>
<b>hamper</b>	A basket with a carrying handle and a hinged lid, used for food, cutlery, and plates on a picnic. <i>A laundry <b>hamper</b>.</i>
<b>hinder</b>	Hinder or prevent the progress or accomplishment of. <i>The brace I have to wear is <b>hindering</b> my movements.</i>
<b>illegalize</b>	Declare illegal; outlaw.
<b>impede</b>	Be a hindrance or obstacle to. <i>The sap causes swelling which can <b>impede</b> breathing.</i>
<b>inhibit</b>	Limit the range or extent of. <i>Contact between the young was <b>inhibited</b> by strict social customs.</i>
<b>inhibitor</b>	A person who takes out an inhibition.
<b>interference</b>	(in ice hockey and other sports) the illegal hindering of an opponent not in possession of the puck or ball. <i>He ran <b>interference</b> for the quarterback.</i>
<u><b>intervene</b></u>	Get involved, so as to alter or hinder an action, or through force or threat of force. <i>Their forces <b>intervened</b> to halt the attack.</i>
<b>lightproof</b>	Not penetrable by light. <i><b>Lightproof</b> containers.</i>
<b>militate</b>	(of a fact or circumstance) be a powerful or conclusive factor in preventing. <i>Politeness <b>militated</b> against this opinion being expressed.</i>
<b>obstruct</b>	(in various sports) impede (a player in the opposing team) in a manner which constitutes an offence. <i>The appellants were arrested and later convicted of <b>obstructing</b> the police.</i>
<u><b>preclude</b></u>	Keep from happening or arising; make impossible. <i>His difficulties <b>preclude</b> him from leading a normal life.</i>
<b>prevent</b>	Stop (someone) from doing something. <i>The guards threatened to bar the gates to <b>prevent</b> him leaving.</i>
<b>preventive</b>	A medicine or other treatment designed to prevent disease or ill health. <i>Quinine was used as a malaria <b>preventive</b>.</i>
<b>stonewall</b>	Engage in delaying tactics or refuse to cooperate. <i>Nixon <b>stonewalled</b> the Watergate investigation.</i>

**strongly**

With strength or in a strong manner.

*He was **strongly** affected by the divorce of his parents.*

**thwart**

Hinder or prevent (the efforts, plans, or desires) of.

*The government had been able to **thwart** all attempts by opposition leaders to form new parties.*
