Distinguishable as an Adjective

Definitions of "Distinguishable" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “distinguishable” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Capable of being perceived as different or distinct.*
- *(often followed by `from') not alike; different in nature or quality.*
- *Clear enough to be recognized or identified as different; discernible.*
- *Clear enough to be discerned or perceived.*



Synonyms of "Distinguishable" as an adjective (5 Words)

- detectable** Able to be discovered or identified.
*A **detectable** note of sarcasm.*
- discernible** Able to be discerned; perceptible.
*The newspaper reports no **discernible** progress in the negotiations.*
- distinct** (used for emphasis) so clearly apparent to the mind as to be unmistakable; definite.
*Claudius was the first to invade Britain with **distinct** intentions of conquest.*
- identifiable** Capable of being identified.
*There are no easily **identifiable** features on the shoreline.*
- recognizable** Capable of being recognized.
*There was no **recognizable** photograph of him.*

- *This particular case is distinguishable from others.*
- *A project distinguishable into four stages of progress.*

characteristic	The integer part positive or negative of the representation of a logarithm in the expression $\log 643\,2808$ the characteristic is 2. <i>He began with a characteristic attack on extremism.</i>
characterize	(of a feature or quality) be typical or characteristic of. <i>The disease is characterized by weakening of the immune system.</i>
classifiable	Capable of being classified.
<u>classify</u>	Arrange or order by classes or categories. <i>How would you classify these pottery shards are they prehistoric.</i>
<u>codify</u>	Arrange (laws or rules) into a systematic code. <i>This would codify existing intergovernmental cooperation on drugs.</i>
compare	Be of an equal or similar nature or quality. <i>The survey compares prices in different countries.</i>
contrast	The opposition or dissimilarity of things that are compared. <i>Careful adjustment of the contrast to suit the prevailing light is critical.</i>
diametrical	Of or along a diameter. <i>He s the diametrical opposite of Gabriel.</i>
<u>differ</u>	Be of different opinions. <i>The second set of data differed from the first.</i>
<u>differential</u>	Involving or containing one or more derivatives. <i>The differential achievements of boys and girls.</i>
differentiate	Recognize or ascertain what makes (someone or something) different. <i>Little now differentiates the firm s products from its rivals.</i>
differentiated	Exhibiting biological specialization; adapted during development to a specific function or environment.
discern	Distinguish (someone or something) with difficulty by sight or with the other senses. <i>Pupils quickly discern what is acceptable to the teacher.</i>
<u>discriminate</u>	Recognize or perceive the difference. <i>I could not discriminate the different tastes in this complicated dish.</i>
<u>distinction</u>	A discrimination between things as different and distinct. <i>He learned the distinction between gold and lead.</i>
<u>distinctive</u>	Of a feature that helps to distinguish a person or thing- Curtis Wilkie. <i>Juniper berries give gin its distinctive flavour.</i>
feature	Have as a feature. <i>This restaurant features the most famous chefs in France.</i>
gap	Make an opening or gap in. <i>There was a gap in his account.</i>

identify	Give the name or identifying characteristics of refer to by name or some other identifying characteristic property. <i>The men identified themselves as federal police.</i>
inconsistent	Acting at variance with one's own principles or former behaviour. Inconsistent statements cannot both be true at the same time.
individuation	The quality of being individual.
pigeonhole	Put a document in a pigeonhole. <i>I was pigeonholed as a youth writer.</i>
<u>segregate</u>	Someone who is or has been segregated. <i>The gene pairs segregate at reduction division.</i>
separate	Have the connection undone having become separate. Separate the eggs and beat the egg yolks.
sort	Look at (a group of things) one after another in order to classify them or make a selection. <i>She served a creamy sort of dessert thing.</i>
<u>sorting</u>	The basic cognitive process of arranging into classes or categories. <i>The bottleneck in mail delivery is the process of sorting.</i>
taxonomist	A biologist who specializes in the classification of organisms into groups on the basis of their structure and origin and behavior.
<u>unlike</u>	Not like; different from. <i>They distributed unlike or unequal sums to the various charities.</i>
