## **Distinguishable as an Adjective**

### **Definitions of "Distinguishable" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “distinguishable” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Capable of being perceived as different or distinct.*
- *(often followed by `from') not alike; different in nature or quality.*
- *Clear enough to be recognized or identified as different; discernible.*
- *Clear enough to be discerned or perceived.*



## Synonyms of "Distinguishable" as an adjective (5 Words)

- detectable** Able to be discovered or identified.  
*A **detectable** note of sarcasm.*
- discernible** Able to be discerned; perceptible.  
*The newspaper reports no **discernible** progress in the negotiations.*
- distinct** (used for emphasis) so clearly apparent to the mind as to be unmistakable; definite.  
*Claudius was the first to invade Britain with **distinct** intentions of conquest.*
- identifiable** Capable of being identified.  
*There are no easily **identifiable** features on the shoreline.*
- recognizable** Capable of being recognized.  
*There was no **recognizable** photograph of him.*

<b>contrast</b>	The opposition or dissimilarity of things that are compared. <i>Careful adjustment of the <b>contrast</b> to suit the prevailing light is critical.</i>
<b>diametrical</b>	Of or along a diameter. <i>He s the <b>diametrical</b> opposite of Gabriel.</i>
<b>differ</b>	Be of different opinions. <i>The second set of data <b>differed</b> from the first.</i>
<b>differential</b>	Involving or containing one or more derivatives. <i>The <b>differential</b> achievements of boys and girls.</i>
<b>differentiate</b>	Recognize or ascertain what makes (someone or something) different. <i>Little now <b>differentiates</b> the firm s products from its rivals.</i>
<b>differentiated</b>	Exhibiting biological specialization; adapted during development to a specific function or environment.
<b>discern</b>	Distinguish (someone or something) with difficulty by sight or with the other senses. <i>Pupils quickly <b>discern</b> what is acceptable to the teacher.</i>
<b>discriminate</b>	Recognize or perceive the difference. <i>I could not <b>discriminate</b> the different tastes in this complicated dish.</i>
<b>distinction</b>	A discrimination between things as different and distinct. <i>He learned the <b>distinction</b> between gold and lead.</i>
<b>distinctive</b>	Of a feature that helps to distinguish a person or thing- Curtis Wilkie. <i>Juniper berries give gin its <b>distinctive</b> flavour.</i>
<b>feature</b>	Have as a feature. <i>This restaurant <b>features</b> the most famous chefs in France.</i>
<b>gap</b>	Make an opening or gap in. <i>There was a <b>gap</b> in his account.</i>

<b>identify</b>	Give the name or identifying characteristics of refer to by name or some other identifying characteristic property. <i>The men identified themselves as federal police.</i>
<b>inconsistent</b>	Acting at variance with one's own principles or former behaviour. <b>Inconsistent</b> statements cannot both be true at the same time.
<b>individuation</b>	The quality of being individual.
<b>pigeonhole</b>	Put a document in a pigeonhole. <i>I was <b>pigeonholed</b> as a youth writer.</i>
<b><u>segregate</u></b>	Someone who is or has been segregated. <i>The gene pairs <b>segregate</b> at reduction division.</i>
<b>separate</b>	Have the connection undone having become separate. <b>Separate</b> the eggs and beat the egg yolks.
<b>sort</b>	Look at (a group of things) one after another in order to classify them or make a selection. <i>She served a creamy <b>sort</b> of dessert thing.</i>
<b><u>sorting</u></b>	The basic cognitive process of arranging into classes or categories. <i>The bottleneck in mail delivery is the process of <b>sorting</b>.</i>
<b>taxonomist</b>	A biologist who specializes in the classification of organisms into groups on the basis of their structure and origin and behavior.
<b><u>unlike</u></b>	Not like; different from. <i>They distributed <b>unlike</b> or unequal sums to the various charities.</i>
