## Synonyms of "Distorted" as an adjective (16 Words)

### awry

Away from the usual or expected course; amiss.  
*I got the impression that something was **awry**.*

### bent

Sharply curved or having an angle.  
***Bent** on going to the theater.*

### contorted

Twisted (especially as in pain or struggle).  
***Contorted** limbs.*

### crooked

Annoyed; exasperated.  
***Crooked** teeth.*

### deformed

So badly formed or out of shape as to be ugly.  
***Deformed** thalidomide babies.*

### disfigured

Having the appearance spoiled.  
*A **disfigured** face.*

### ill-shapen

So badly formed or out of shape as to be ugly.

### irregular

Contrary to rule or accepted order or general practice.  
***Irregular** warfare.*

### malformed

Not conforming to a standard type.  
*Her ribs are **malformed**.*

**misrepresented** Having an intended meaning altered or misrepresented.

### misshapen

So badly formed or out of shape as to be ugly.  
***Misshapen** old fingers.*

### out of shape

Knocked unconscious by a heavy blow.

**perverted**

(of a thing) having been corrupted or distorted from its original course, meaning, or state.

*This sudden surge of **perverted** patriotism.*

**twisted**

(of a personality or a way of thinking) unpleasantly or unhealthily abnormal; warped.

*A man with a **twisted** mind.*

**warped**

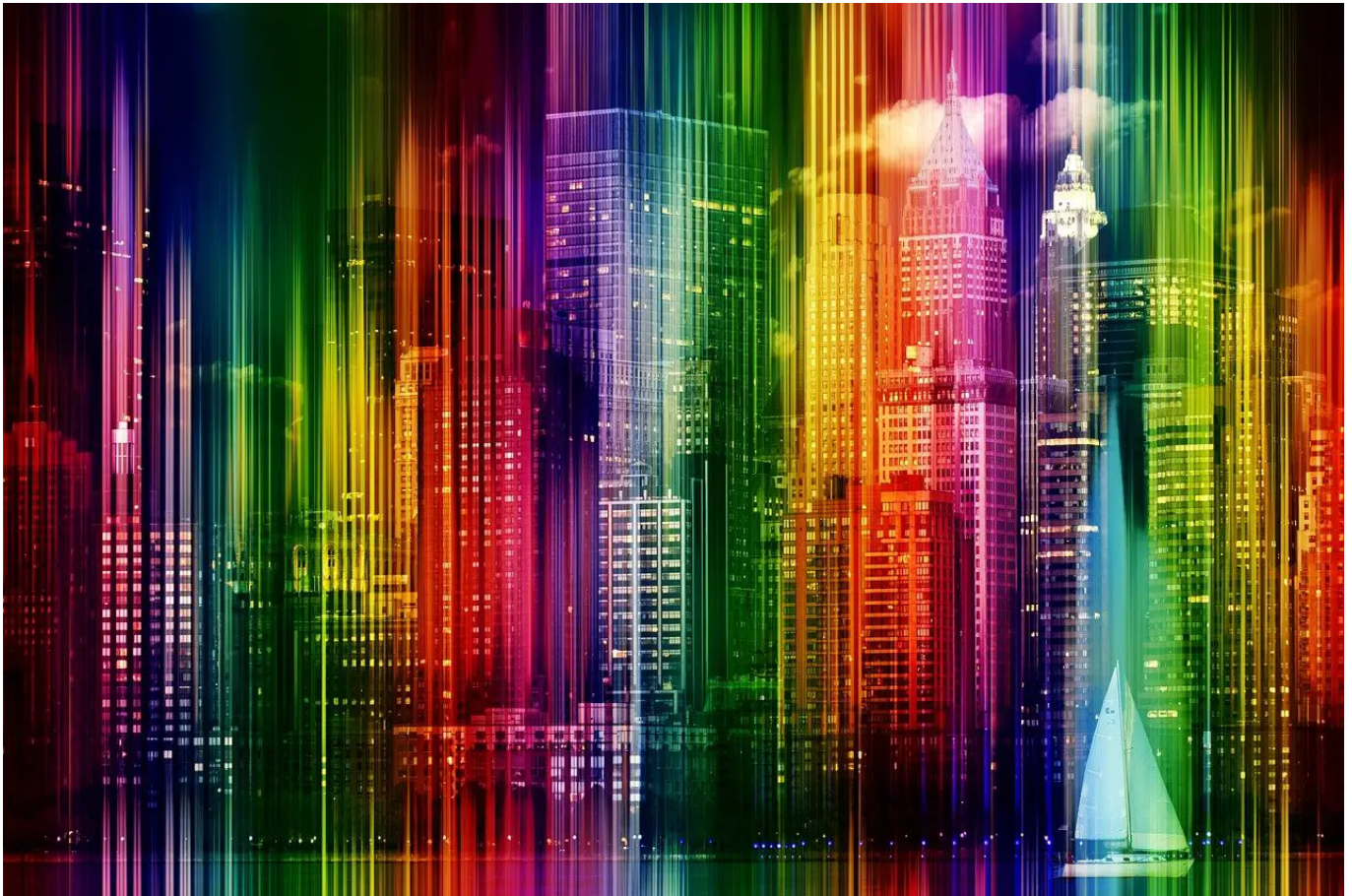
Abnormal or strange; distorted.

*The floors were **warped** and cracked.*

**wry**

(of a person's face or features) twisted into an expression of disgust, disappointment, or annoyance.

*With a **wry** Scottish wit.*

## Associations of "Distorted" (30 Words)

<b>artful</b>	Clever or skilful, especially in a crafty or cunning way. <i>The <b>artful</b> dodger.</i>
<b>changed</b>	Changed in constitution or structure or composition by metamorphism. <i>He s an altered or <b>changed</b> man since his election to Congress.</i>
<b>contort</b>	Twist or bend out of the normal shape. <i>A <b>contorted</b> version of the truth.</i>
<b><u>crooked</u></b>	Bent or twisted out of shape or out of place. <i>A dress with a <b>crooked</b> hemline.</i>
<b>deform</b>	Become distorted or misshapen undergo deformation. <i>He was physically <b>deformed</b> by a rare bone disease.</i>
<b><u>deformed</u></b>	So badly formed or out of shape as to be ugly. <i>His <b>deformed</b> hands.</i>

<b>disfigure</b>	Spoil the appearance of. <i>Litter <b>disfigures</b> the countryside.</i>
<b>disingenuous</b>	Not straightforward or candid; giving a false appearance of frankness. <i>An ambitious <b>disingenuous</b> philistine and hypocritical operator who exemplified the most disagreeable traits of his time.</i>
<b>dramatically</b>	By a strikingly large amount or to a strikingly large extent; greatly. <i><b>Dramatically</b> and technically the film falls far short.</i>
<b>exaggerated</b>	Enlarged to an abnormal degree. <i>Comic book characters are drawn with <b>exaggerated</b> features so you will remember them.</i>
<b>extremely</b>	To an extreme degree. <i>This is an <b>extremely</b> difficult thing to do.</i>
<b>garble</b>	A garbled account or transmission. <i>Upon winning a race a driver spews out a litany of commercial <b>garble</b>.</i>
<b>insincere</b>	Lacking sincerity. <i>Their praise was extravagant and <b>insincere</b>.</i>
<b>insinuate</b>	Introduce or insert (oneself) in a subtle manner. <i>He <b>insinuated</b> himself into the king's confidence.</i>
<b>morbid</b>	Caused by or altered by or manifesting disease or pathology. <i>His <b>morbid</b> fascination with the horrors of contemporary warfare.</i>
<b>mutant</b>	A mutant form. <i>Frequently only a small percentage of the offspring of <b>mutants</b> resemble their parents.</i>
<b>mutate</b>	(with reference to a cell, DNA molecule, etc.) undergo or cause to undergo change in a gene or genes. <i>Cells <b>mutate</b>.</i>
<b>overstate</b>	To enlarge beyond bounds or the truth. <i>I <b>overstated</b> my case to make my point.</i>
<b>pervert</b>	A person whose behavior deviates from what is acceptable especially in sexual behavior. <i>Hector is a man who is simply <b>perverted</b> by his time.</i>
<b>transformed</b>	Given a completely different form or appearance. <i>Shocked to see the <b>transformed</b> landscape.</i>
<b>turn</b>	To break and turn over earth especially with a plow. <i>Wright <b>turned</b> his ankle in the first minute of the game.</i>
<b>twisted</b>	(of a joint) injured by wrenching; sprained. <i>A man with a <b>twisted</b> mind.</i>

**varied**

Widely different.

*His work is interesting and **varied**.*

**warp**

In weaving arrange yarn so as to form the warp of a piece of cloth.

*No mind is more capable of **warps** than his.*

**warped**

Bent or twisted out of shape, typically as a result of the effects of heat or damp.

*A **warped** sense of humour.*

**wind**

Wind instruments or specifically woodwind instruments forming a band or a section of an orchestra.

*The fall nearly **winded** him.*

**worm**

Used in names of other animals that resemble worms in some way e.g. slow worm, shipworm.

*Food for **worms**.*

**wrench**

Turn something especially a nut or bolt with a wrench.

***Wrench** one's ankle.*

**wrest**

Take (something, especially power or control) after considerable effort or difficulty.

***Wrest** a meaning from the old text.*
