**shattered** Very upset.

Our **shattered** dreams of peace and prosperity.


**upset** Unhappy, disappointed, or worried.

With everything so **upset**.

worried Anxious or troubled about actual or potential problems.

There was a **worried** frown on his face.







#### Usage Examples of "Distraught" as an adjective

- Distraught parents looking for a runaway teenager.
- *He is terribly distraught.*
- Distraught with grief.



# Associations of "Distraught" (30 Words)

A cause of pain or harm. affliction

Poor people in great affliction.

An acute but unspecific feeling of anxiety; usually reserved for philosophical anxiety about the world or about personal freedom. <u>angst</u>

The existential **angst** of the middle classes.

Cause emotional anguish or make miserable. <u>anguish</u>

She shut her eyes in **anguish**.



Feeling or showing worry, nervousness, or unease about something with

**anxious** an uncertain outcome.

There were some **anxious** moments.

**dejected** Sad and depressed; dispirited.

He stood in the street looking **dejected**.

**dejection** Solid excretory product evacuated from the bowels.

He was slumped in deep **dejection**.

**despondency** Feeling downcast and disheartened and hopeless.

An air of **despondency**.

Prevent (hopes or expectations) from being realized.

**disappoint** The governing coalition had bitterly **disappoint**ed the hopes of its

voters.

disappointment A person or thing that causes disappointment.

His hopes were so high he was doomed to **disappointment**.

distrait Having the attention diverted especially because of anxiety.

He seemed oddly **distrait**.

**distressed** Impoverished.

I was **distressed** at the news of his death.

gloom

A state of partial or total darkness.

A black yew **gloom** d the stagnant air.

Something that causes great unhappiness.

Time heals **grief**s and guarrels.

heartache Intense sorrow caused by loss of a loved one (especially by death.

A good friend understands your **heartache**s as well as your joys.

horrible Provoking horror- Winston Churchill.

A **horrible** massacre.

Characterized by or arising from psychoneurotic hysteria- Morris

**hysterical** Fishbein.

Janet became **hysterical** and began screaming.

inattentive Not showing due care or attention.

An **inattentive** babysitter.

**loneliness** Sadness resulting from being forsaken or abandoned.

The **loneliness** of a sailor s life.

Miserly.

miserable

He felt depressed and miserable.

Mourn Observe the customs of mourning after the death of a loved one.

She **mourn**ed for her friends who died in the accident.



sad Of things that make you feel sad.

He told her the **sad** story of his life.

**sadness** The quality of excessive mournfulness and uncheerfulness.

A source of great sadness.

**Sorrow** An event or circumstance that causes sorrow.

He tried to express his **sorrow** at her loss.

terrible Used to emphasize the extent of something unpleasant or bad.

**Terrible** handwriting.

throes Violent pangs of suffering.

He convulsed in his death **throes**.

The dramatic genre represented by tragedies.

Greek **tragedy**.

troubled Characterized by or indicative of distress or affliction or danger or need.

His **troubled** private life.

**upset**The act of upsetting something.

She looked pale and **upset**.

Things that cause sorrow or distress; troubles.

To add to his **woe**s customers have been spending less.
