- *A distinguished female operatic singer; a female operatic star.*
- *A celebrated female opera singer.*

<b>lead</b>	A position of leadership especially in the phrase take the lead. <i>The <b>lead</b> was in the dummy.</i>
<b>leading actor</b>	Thin strip of metal used to separate lines of type in printing.
<b>leading actress</b>	Thin strip of metal used to separate lines of type in printing.
<b>leading lady</b>	Thin strip of metal used to separate lines of type in printing.
<b>leading man</b>	Thin strip of metal used to separate lines of type in printing.
<b>leading performer</b>	Thin strip of metal used to separate lines of type in printing.
<b>leading player</b>	The activity of leading.
<b>prima donna</b>	Used primarily as eating apples.
<a href="#"><u>star</u></a>	Used in names of starfishes and similar echinoderms with five or more radiating arms e g cushion star brittlestar. <i>The walls were painted with silver moons and <b>stars</b>.</i>

## Associations of "Diva" (30 Words)

### acting

The art or occupation of performing fictional roles in plays, films, or television.

*The **acting** supervisor.*

### actress

A female actor.

*I became a very good **actress** and they nearly always believed me.*

### artist

A person who creates paintings or drawings as a profession or hobby.

*A surgeon who is an **artist** with the scalpel.*

### ballet

Music written for a ballet.

*The Bolshoi **Ballet**.*

<b>ballroom</b>	Ballroom dancing. <i>The number of people learning <b>ballroom</b> has doubled in the last two years.</i>
<b>blues</b>	A piece of blues music. <i><b>Blues</b> has always had a strong following in Australia.</i>
<b>canto</b>	The highest part (usually the melody) in a piece of choral music. <i>Dante's Divine Comedy has 100 <b>cantos</b>.</i>
<b>choreographer</b>	Someone who creates new dances. <i>A professional <b>choreographer</b>.</i>
<b>choreography</b>	The art or practice of designing choreographic sequences. <i>The rumbustious <b>choreography</b> reflects the themes of the original play.</i>
<b>composer</b>	A person who writes music, especially as a professional occupation. <i>Mozart was her favourite <b>composer</b>.</i>
<b>dance</b>	Perform a particular dance or a role in a ballet. <i><b>Dances</b> include the waltz the quickstep and the foxtrot.</i>
<b>dancer</b>	A person who participates in a social gathering arranged for dancing (as a ball). <i>She thought he would become a ballet <b>dancer</b>.</i>
<b>disco</b>	The lighting and sound equipment used at a disco. <i>She filled every hour of the day playing tennis or <b>discoing</b> with friends.</i>
<b>glamorous</b>	(of a person) having a beauty or charm that is sexually attractive. <i><b>Glamorous</b> movie stars.</i>
<b>jazz</b>	Play or dance to jazz music. <i>Don't give me any of that <b>jazz</b>.</i>
<b>lied</b>	A type of German song, especially of the romantic period, typically for solo voice with piano accompaniment.
<b>music</b>	Musical activity singing or whistling etc. <i>He devoted his life to <b>music</b>.</i>
<b>musician</b>	Artist who composes or conducts music as a profession. <i>Your father was a fine <b>musician</b>.</i>
<b>opera</b>	Operas as a genre of classical music. <i>A very grand programme of <b>opera</b> and ballet.</i>
<b>performance</b>	An individual's use of a language, i.e. what a speaker actually says, including hesitations, false starts, and errors. <i>The jet's <b>performance</b> conformed to high standards.</i>
<b>pianist</b>	A person who plays the piano, especially professionally.

<b>piano</b>	(used chiefly as a direction or description in music) soft; in a quiet, subdued tone. <i>The <b>piano</b> passages in the composition.</i>
<b>pop</b>	Like a pop or with a pop. <i>He pulled a can of beer from the refrigerator and <b>popped</b> its tab.</i>
<b>repertoire</b>	A stock of plays, dances, or items that a company or a performer knows or is prepared to perform. <i>His <b>repertoire</b> of denigratory gestures.</i>
<b>singer</b>	United States inventor of an improved chain-stitch sewing machine (1811-1875). <i>A pop <b>singer</b>.</i>
<b>soloist</b>	A musician or singer who performs a solo. <i>He appears as a concerto <b>soloist</b> with all the great British orchestras.</i>
<b>song</b>	A musical composition suggestive of a song. <i>A bird will not learn its <b>song</b> unless it hears it at an early age.</i>
<b>soprano</b>	A female or boy singer with a soprano voice. <i><b>Soprano</b> voice.</i>
<b>superstar</b>	Someone who is dazzlingly skilled in any field. <i>He became a <b>superstar</b> overnight.</i>
<b>techno</b>	A style of fast heavy electronic dance music usually without vocals.
