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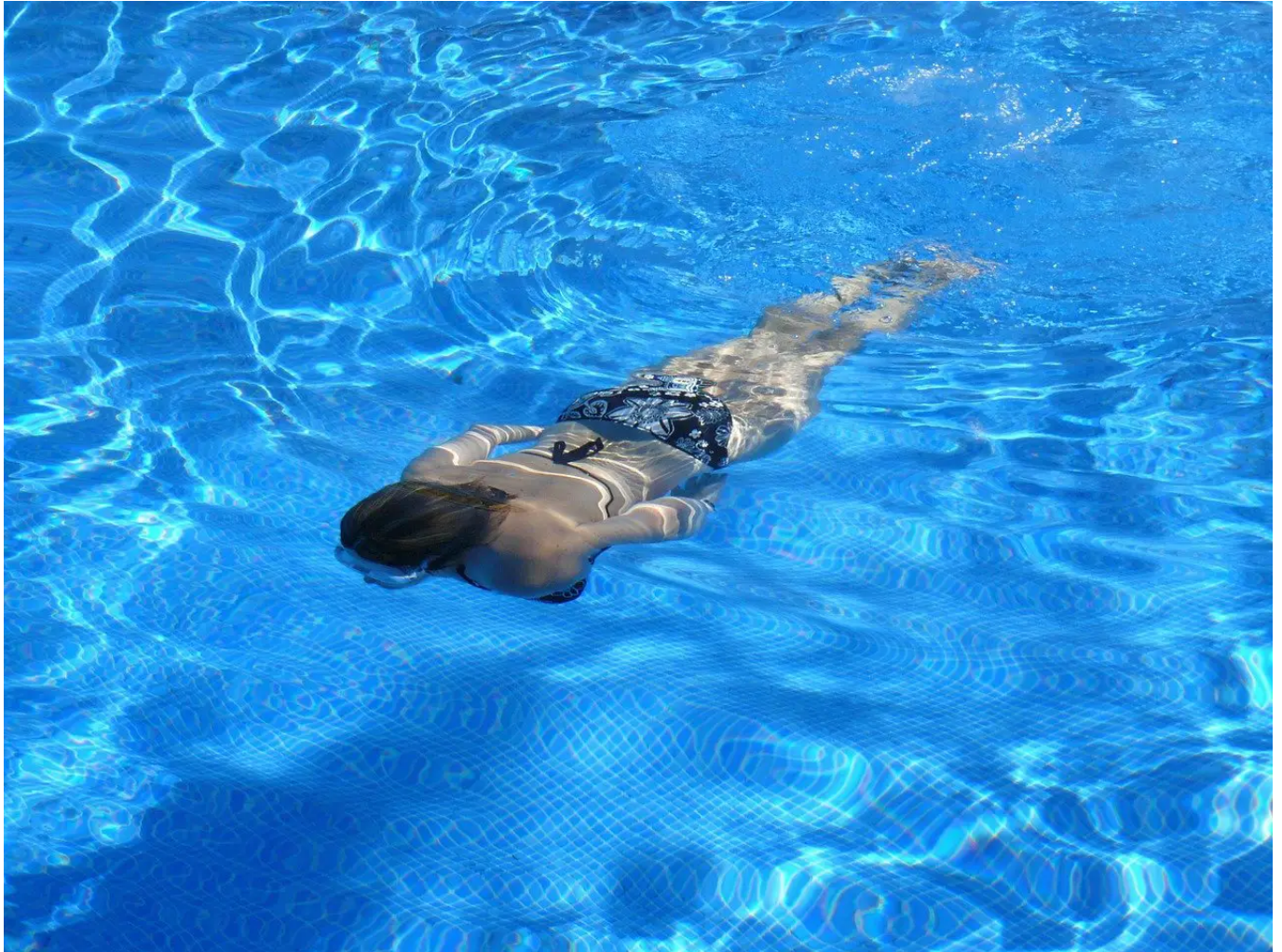

- *A cheap disreputable nightclub or dance hall.*
- *A deliberate fall by a player, intended to deceive the referee into awarding a foul.*
- *A steep nose-down descent by an aircraft.*

<b>going down</b>	Advancing toward a goal.
<b>honkytonk</b>	A cheap disreputable nightclub or dance hall.
<b>jump</b>	An obstacle to be jumped especially by a horse and rider in an equestrian competition. <i>She will make a sponsored <b>jump</b> at Thruxton Airfield.</i>
<b>leap</b>	The distance leaped or to be leaped. <i>It doesn't take a great <b>leap</b> of imagination to recognize that you have held an important leadership role.</i>
<b>lunge</b>	An exercise or gymnastic movement resembling the lunge of a fencer. <i>Lucy made a <b>lunge</b> for Gabriel's wrist.</i>
<b>nose dive</b>	A natural skill.
<b>nosedive</b>	A sudden dramatic deterioration. <i>The stock took a <b>nosedive</b>.</i>
<b>pitch</b>	A delivery of the ball by the pitcher. <i>Her voice rose steadily in <b>pitch</b>.</i>
<b>plummet</b>	A steep and rapid fall or drop. <i>The bird has a circular display flight followed by an earthward <b>plummet</b>.</i>
<b>plunge</b>	A swift and drastic fall in value or amount. <i>Fanatics went straight from the hot room to take a cold <b>plunge</b>.</i>
<b>spring</b>	The ability to spring back strongly elasticity. <i>He will hold office until the <b>spring</b> of next year.</i>
<b>swoop</b>	A swooping or snatching movement or action. <i>Four members were arrested following a <b>swoop</b> by detectives on their homes.</i>

- *Swim under water.*
- *Plunge head first into water with one's arms raised over one's head.*
- *Move quickly or suddenly in a specified direction.*
- *(of a player) deliberately fall when challenged in order to deceive the referee into awarding a foul.*
- *(of prices or profits) drop suddenly.*
- *Plunge into water.*
- *Swim under water using breathing equipment.*
- *Drop steeply.*
- *(of a fish or submarine) go to a deeper level in water.*

### bolt

Secure or lock with a bolt.

*New benefits have been **bolted** on to the social security system.*

### dart

Move along rapidly and lightly skim or dart.

*She **darted** across the street.*

<b>dash</b>	Break into pieces, as by striking or knocking over. <i>I must <b>dash</b> I m late.</i>
<b>descend</b>	Move or fall downwards. <i>He was scrupulous in refusing to <b>descend</b> to misrepresentation.</i>
<b>drop</b>	Let or cause to fall in drops. <i>Pre tax profits <b>dropped</b> by 37 per cent.</i>
<b>fall</b>	Descend in free fall under the influence of gravity. <i>All that <b>falls</b> under the general heading of corruption.</i>
<b>go headlong</b>	To be spent or finished.
<b>go under water</b>	Move away from a place into another direction.
<b>jump</b>	Jump from an airplane and descend with a parachute. <i>Her new novel <b>jumped</b> high on the bestseller list.</i>
<b>launch oneself</b>	Set up or found.
<b>leap</b>	Move forward by leaps and bounds. <i>The widow <b>leapt</b> into the funeral pyre.</i>
<b>lunge</b>	Make a lunge. <i>McCulloch raised his cudgel and <b>lunged</b> at him.</i>
<b>nosedive</b>	Of an aircraft make a nosedive. <i>The plane <b>nosedived</b> into the ground and exploded.</i>
<b>pitch</b>	Set one s voice or a piece of music at a particular pitch. <i>He should <b>pitch</b> his talk at a suitable level for the age group.</i>
<b>plummet</b>	Fall or drop straight down at high speed. <i>Hardware sales <b>plummeted</b>.</i>
<b>plunge</b>	Sink (a pot containing a plant) in the ground. <i>The ship <b>plunged</b> through the 20 foot seas.</i>
<b>plunk</b>	Pull lightly but sharply with a plucking motion. <i>I <b>plunked</b> down 14 95 for the new paperback edition.</i>
<b>rush</b>	Cause to move fast or to rush or race. <i>As soon as the campaign started they <b>rushed</b> into action.</i>
<b>scurry</b>	(of a person or small animal) move hurriedly with short quick steps. <i>Pedestrians scurried for cover.</i>
<b>sink</b>	Fall or sink heavily. <i>You can relax on the veranda as the sun <b>sinks</b> low.</i>
<b>submerge</b>	Completely cover or obscure. <i>The tensions <b>submerged</b> earlier in the campaign now came to the fore.</i>
<b>swim under water</b>	Travel through water.

<b>swoop</b>	Seize with a swooping motion. <i>Armed police <b>swooped</b> on a flat after a tip off.</i>
<b>throw oneself</b>	Get rid of.

- *The plane dived as it was buffeted by turbulence at 34,000 ft.*
- *She walked to the deep end, then she dived in.*

<b>dip</b>	A thick sauce in which pieces of food are dipped before eating. <i>He <b>dipped</b> into the pool.</i>
<b>divers</b>	Of varying types; several. <i>A person of <b>diverse</b> talents.</i>
<b>diving</b>	An athletic competition that involves diving into water. <i>He scored with a <b>diving</b> header.</i>

<b>drop</b>	A section of theatrical scenery lowered from the flies a drop cloth or drop curtain. <i>A chocolate <b>drop</b>.</i>
<b>drown</b>	Deliberately kill a person or animal by drowning. <i>They committed suicide by jumping into the sea and <b>drowning</b> themselves.</i>
<b>engulf</b>	(of a natural force) sweep over (something) so as to surround or cover it completely. <i>The toad can <b>engulf</b> nestling birds.</i>
<b>fall</b>	Go as if by falling. <i>The <b>fall</b> of the government.</i>
<b>immerse</b>	Cause to be immersed. <i>He <b>immersed</b> himself into his studies.</i>
<b>plummet</b>	Decrease rapidly in value or amount. <i>Hardware sales <b>plummeted</b>.</i>
<b>plunge</b>	Quickly immerse in liquid. <i>He <b>plunged</b> his hands into his pockets.</i>
<b>pool</b>	Join or form a pool of people. <i>We soon reached the <b>pool</b> at the foot of the waterfall.</i>
<b>scuba</b>	Scuba diving. <i>I want to do some <b>scuba</b>.</i>
<b>sea</b>	A roughly definable area of the sea. <i>She scanned the <b>sea</b> of faces for Stephen.</i>
<b>sink</b>	Fall or sink heavily. <i>They agreed to <b>sink</b> their differences.</i>
<b>slump</b>	Sit, lean, or fall heavily and limply. <i>The team went into a <b>slump</b>.</i>
<b>springboard</b>	A platform fixed to the side of a tree and used by a lumberjack when working at some height from the ground. <i>He uses other people's ideas as a <b>springboard</b> for his own.</i>
<b>submerge</b>	Descend below the surface of an area of water. <i>The U boat had had time to <b>submerge</b>.</i>
<b>submergence</b>	The process or state of being submerged in or covered with water. <i>Total <b>submergence</b> of plants results in heavy crop losses.</i>
<b>submerge</b>	Sink below the surface; go under or as if under water. <i>Pellets were then <b>submersed</b> in agar.</i>



<b>submersible</b>	A small submersible boat or other craft especially one designed for research and exploration. <i>A <b>submersible</b> pump.</i>
<b>submersion</b>	The act of wetting something by submerging it. <i>Five small islands threatened by <b>submersion</b>.</i>
<b>subside</b>	Lapse into silence or inactivity. <i>The mud <b>subsides</b> when the waters become calm.</i>
<b>surfing</b>	The activity of moving from page to page or site to site on the World Wide Web. <i>Why share your internet connection with people <b>surfing</b> and chatting.</i>
<u><a href="#">swim</a></u>	The act of swimming. <i>It was the <b>swimming</b> they enjoyed most.</i>
<b>swimmer</b>	A sperm cell. <i>The lab technician examining your sample takes a close look at how many of your <b>swimmers</b> are normally shaped.</i>
<u><a href="#">swimming</a></u>	The act of swimming. <i><b>Swimming</b> eyes.</i>
<b>underwater</b>	Submerged; flooded. <i>An epidemic of <b>underwater</b> mortgages.</i>
<u><a href="#">waterfall</a></u>	A cascade of water falling from a height, formed when a river or stream flows over a precipice or steep incline. <i>Each phase of a <b>waterfall</b> project must be complete prior to moving to the next phase.</i>
