### Definitions of "Diverge" as a verb

- *Develop in a different direction.*
- *(of an opinion, theory, or approach) differ.*
- *(of a road, route, or line) separate from another route and go in a different direction.*
- *Have no limits as a mathematical series.*
- *Be at variance with; be out of line with.*
- *Depart from (a set course or standard).*
- *Extend in a different direction.*

| <b>drift</b>                      | Live unhurriedly, irresponsibly, or freely.<br><i><b>Drift</b> the boats downstream.</i>   |
| <b>fork</b>                       | Lift with a pitchfork.<br><i>Pitch<b>fork</b> hay.</i>   |
| <b>go in different directions</b> | Be sounded, played, or expressed.  |
| <b>go separate ways</b>           | Lead, extend, or afford access.  |
| <b>part</b>                       | Force take or pull apart.<br><i>Even quite small companies <b>parted</b> with large sums.</i>  |

| <b>swerve</b>                     | Change or cause to change direction abruptly.<br><i>A lorry <b>swerved</b> across her path.</i>  |
| <b>turn aside</b>                 | Twist suddenly so as to sprain.  |
| <b>turn away</b>                  | Direct at someone.   |
| <b>vary</b>                       | Change from one condition, form, or state to another.<br><i>His moods <b>vary</b> depending on the weather.</i>  |
| <b>veer</b>                       | Turn sharply; change direction abruptly.<br><i>The conversation eventually <b>veered</b> away from theatrical things.</i>                              |

| <b>partition</b>      | The act of dividing or partitioning separation by the creation of a boundary that divides or keeps apart.<br><i>This takes a copy of hard disk <b>partition</b> information during installation.</i> |
| <b>rend</b>           | Cause great emotional pain to.<br><i>The speculation and confusion which was <b>rending</b> the civilized world.</i>   |
| <b>rive</b>           | Split or tear apart violently.<br><i>The wood was <b>riven</b> with deep cracks.</i>   |
| <u><b>rupture</b></u> | State of being torn or burst open.<br><i>If the main artery <b>ruptures</b> he could die.</i>  |
