change	Exchange something with someone else giving one thing and receiving something of the same kind in return. <i>Fame hasn't changed her one bit.</i>
changed	Changed in constitution or structure or composition by metamorphism. <i>Changed styles of dress.</i>
<u>conversion</u>	(in the context of online marketing) the proportion of people viewing an advertisement and going on to buy the product, click on a link, etc. <i>He insists that real conversion is a matter of the heart.</i>
convert	A person who has been converted to another religious or political belief. <i>Convert slaves to laborers.</i>
difference	The number that remains after subtraction; the number that when added to the subtrahend gives the minuend. <i>There are many differences between jazz and rock.</i>
different	Distinctly separate from the first. <i>Came to a different conclusion.</i>
<u>dissimilar</u>	Marked by dissimilarity. <i>A group of very dissimilar people.</i>
diversity	The condition or result of being changeable. <i>Equality and diversity should be supported for their own sake.</i>
each	(used of count nouns) every one considered individually. <i>The tickets cost 11 each.</i>
economic	Relating to economics or the economy. <i>An economical use of her time.</i>
feint	Any distracting or deceptive maneuver (as a mock attack). <i>The midfielder feinted to shoot.</i>
machiavellian	Of or relating to Machiavelli or the principles of conduct he recommended.
<u>maneuver</u>	A plan for attaining a particular goal. <i>He maneuvered to get the chairmanship.</i>
obstructionist	Someone who systematically obstructs some action that others want to take.
<u>ploy</u>	An activity done for amusement. <i>The eternal cross stitch I was set to do before I could indulge my own loys.</i>
stratagem	A plan or scheme, especially one used to outwit an opponent or achieve an end. <i>A series of devious stratagems.</i>

strategically	With regard to strategy. <i>Violence was deployed strategically.</i>
strategy	An elaborate and systematic plan of action. <i>Shifts in marketing strategy.</i>
tactics	The branch of military science dealing with detailed maneuvers to achieve objectives set by strategy.
<u>transform</u>	The product of a transformation. <i>Lasers have transformed cardiac surgery.</i>
transformation	A process by which one figure, expression, or function is converted into another one of similar value. <i>British society underwent a radical transformation.</i>
transformed	Given a completely different form or appearance. <i>Shocked to see the transformed landscape.</i>
transition	Undergo or cause to undergo a process or period of transition. <i>Students in transition from one programme to another.</i>
<u>variance</u>	Discord that splits a group. <i>Her light tone was at variance with her sudden trembling.</i>
variation	A deviation of a celestial body from its mean orbit or motion. <i>Who is responsible for these variations in taxation.</i>
<u>varied</u>	Incorporating a number of different types or elements; showing variation or variety. <i>The phenomena were very varied.</i>
variegation	The act of introducing variety (especially in investments or in the variety of goods and services offered).
<u>vary</u>	Change from one condition, form, or state to another. <i>His moods vary depending on the weather.</i>
