<b>absorbing</b>	Intensely interesting; engrossing. <i>An <b>absorbing</b> account of their marriage.</i>
<b>agreeable</b>	Willing to agree to something. <i>A compromise which might be <b>agreeable</b> to both coal owners and unions.</i>
<b>amusing</b>	Causing laughter and providing entertainment. <i>An <b>amusing</b> fellow.</i>
<b>amusive</b>	Providing enjoyment; pleasantly entertaining.
<b>appealing</b>	Attractive or interesting. <i>An <b>appealing</b> look.</i>
<b>beguiling</b>	Charming or enchanting, often in a deceptive way. <i>A <b>beguiling</b> mixture of English French and Italian.</i>
<b>captivating</b>	Capturing interest as if by a spell. <i>Roosevelt was a <b>captivating</b> speaker.</i>

<b><u>compelling</u></b>	Not able to be refuted; inspiring conviction. <i>There is <b>compelling</b> evidence that the recession is ending.</i>
<b><u>delightful</u></b>	Greatly pleasing or entertaining. <i>A <b>delightful</b> secluded garden.</i>
<b>engaging</b>	Attracting or delighting. <i>An <b>engaging</b> frankness.</i>
<b>enjoyable</b>	Affording satisfaction or pleasure. <i>The company was <b>enjoyable</b>.</i>
<b><u>entertaining</u></b>	Agreeably diverting. <i>Films should be <b>entertaining</b>.</i>
<b><u>fascinating</u></b>	Extremely interesting. <i>A <b>fascinating</b> story.</i>
<b>fun</b>	Amusing, entertaining, or enjoyable. <i>A school <b>fun</b> day.</i>
<b>interesting</b>	Arousing curiosity or interest; holding or catching the attention. <i>It will be very <b>interesting</b> to see what they come up with.</i>
<b>intriguing</b>	Disturbingly provocative. <i>An <b>intriguing</b> story.</i>
<b><u>pleasant</u></b>	Giving a sense of happy satisfaction or enjoyment. <i>We had a <b>pleasant</b> evening together.</i>
<b>pleasing</b>	Satisfying or appealing. <i>The <b>pleasing</b> austerity of the surroundings.</i>
<b><u>pleasurable</u></b>	Affording satisfaction or pleasure. <i><b>Pleasurable</b> activities.</i>
<b><u>riveting</u></b>	Completely engrossing; compelling. <i>The book is a <b>riveting</b> account of the legendary freedom fighter.</i>

<b>amusing</b>	Providing enjoyment; pleasantly entertaining. <i>Such a likeable <b>amusing</b> man.</i>
<b><u>badinage</u></b>	Humorous or witty conversation. <i>He developed a nice line in <b>badinage</b> with the Labour leader.</i>
<b>buffoonery</b>	Acting like a clown or buffoon. <i>The film is full of wordplay and <b>buffoonery</b>.</i>
<b>comic</b>	A professional performer who tells jokes and performs comical acts. <i>A <b>comic</b> actor.</i>
<b>comical</b>	Amusing, especially in a ludicrous or absurd way. <i>A series of <b>comical</b> misunderstandings.</i>
<b>droll</b>	Curious or unusual in a way that provokes dry amusement. <i>His unique brand of <b>droll</b> self mockery.</i>

<b><u>entertaining</u></b>	Agreeably diverting. <i>An <b>entertaining</b> puppet show.</i>
<b>exciting</b>	Causing great enthusiasm and eagerness. <i>An <b>exciting</b> account of her trip.</i>
<b><u>exhilaration</u></b>	A feeling of excitement, happiness, or elation. <i>They felt the <b>exhilaration</b> of victory.</i>
<b>fun</b>	A source of fun. <i>It was a <b>fun</b> evening.</i>
<b>funny</b>	Slightly but undefinably unwell. <i>A <b>funny</b> story.</i>
<b><u>hilarious</u></b>	Extremely amusing. <i><b>Hilarious</b> broad comedy.</i>
<b>humor</b>	The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. <i>She didn't appreciate my <b>humor</b>.</i>
<b>humorous</b>	Having or showing a sense of humour. <i><b>Humorous</b> stories.</i>
<b>interesting</b>	Arousing curiosity or interest; holding or catching the attention. <i>An <b>interesting</b> debate.</i>
<b>jesting</b>	Characterized by jokes and good humor. <i>Laughing and <b>jesting</b> were out of the question.</i>
<b>jocose</b>	Playful or humorous. <i>A <b>jocose</b> allusion.</i>
<b>jocular</b>	Characterized by jokes and good humor. <i>His voice was <b>jocular</b>.</i>
<b><u>kicking</u></b>	An assault in which the victim is kicked repeatedly. <i>The team's <b>kicking</b> was excellent.</i>
<b><u>laughable</u></b>	Arousing or provoking laughter. <i>If it didn't make me so angry it would be <b>laughable</b>.</i>
<b>laughing</b>	Showing or feeling mirth or pleasure or happiness. <i><b>Laughing</b> children.</i>
<b><u>ludicrous</u></b>	Broadly or extravagantly humorous; resembling farce. <i><b>Ludicrous</b> green hair.</i>
<b><u>quirky</u></b>	(informal) strikingly unconventional. <i>Her sense of humour was decidedly <b>quirky</b>.</i>
<b>repartee</b>	Conversation or speech characterized by quick, witty comments or replies. <i>He had a quick mind and a splendid gift of <b>repartee</b>.</i>



<b>ridiculous</b>	Deserving or inviting derision or mockery; absurd. <i>Her conceited assumption of universal interest in her rather dull children was <b>ridiculous</b>.</i>
<b>risible</b>	Arousing or provoking laughter. <i><b>Risible</b> courtroom antics.</i>
<b>slapstick</b>	Characterized by horseplay and physical action. <i>A loud and exhilarating rattle of bladders and <b>slapsticks</b>.</i>
<b>waggish</b>	Witty or joking- James Fenimore Cooper. <i>A <b>waggish</b> riposte.</i>
<b>witticism</b>	A witty remark. <i>Maurice roared with laughter at his own <b>witticisms</b>.</i>
<b>witty</b>	Combining clever conception and facetious expression. <i>A <b>witty</b> remark.</i>
