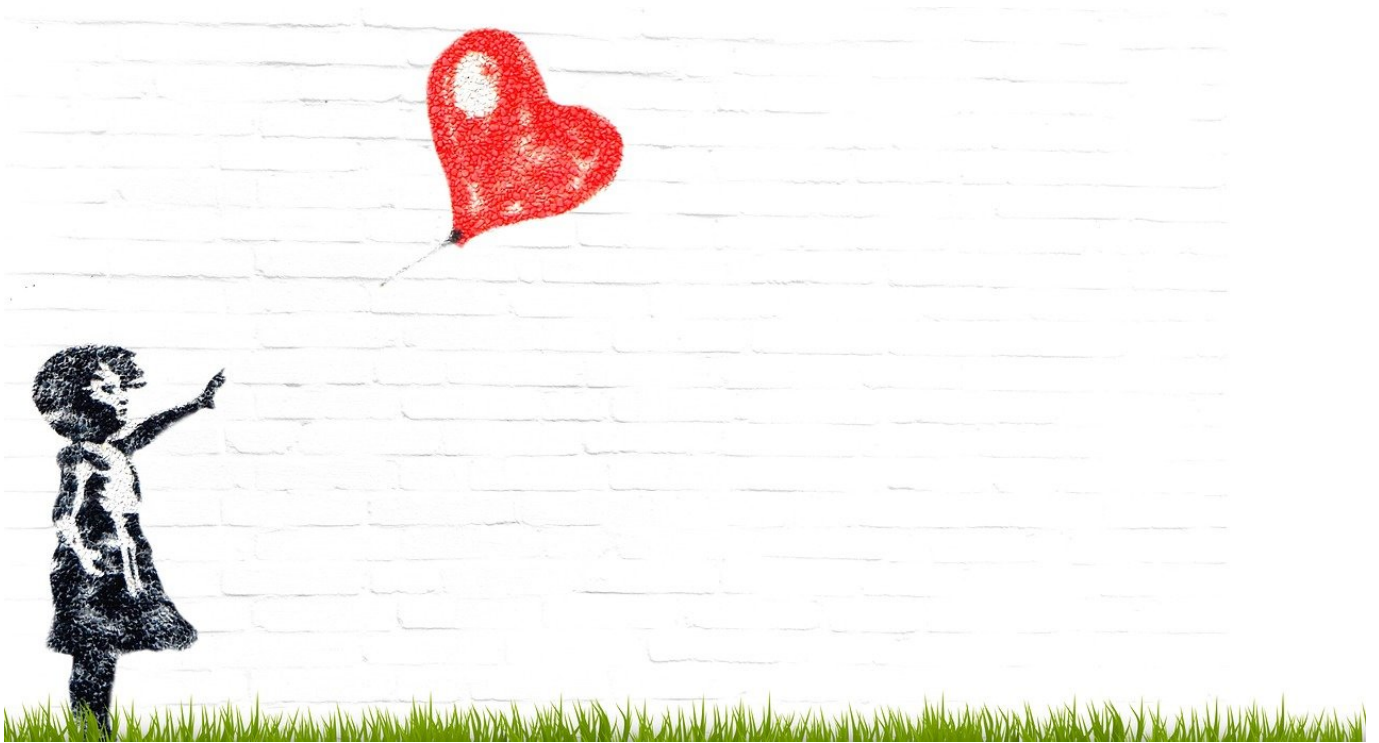

## Synonyms of "Divorce" as a noun (17 Words)

<b><u>alienation</u></b>	(law) the voluntary and absolute transfer of title and possession of real property from one person to another. <i>A sense of <b>alienation</b> from our environment.</i>
<b>annulment</b>	The act of annulling something. <i>Grounds for an <b>annulment</b>.</i>
<b>breach</b>	A failure to perform some promised act or obligation. <i>A <b>breach</b> in the mountain wall.</i>
<b><u>dissolution</u></b>	The termination of a meeting. <i>An advanced state of <b>dissolution</b>.</i>
<b><u>distance</u></b>	The distance from the winning post which a horse must have reached when the winner finishes in order to qualify for a subsequent heat. <i>Watching them from a <b>distance</b>.</i>
<b>disunion</b>	The breaking up of something such as a federation. <i>His rejection of <b>disunion</b> was consistent with his nationalism.</i>
<b>disunity</b>	Lack of unity (usually resulting from dissension). <i>The <b>disunity</b> among opposition parties.</i>

<b>division</b>	A group of organisms forming a subdivision of a larger category. <i>The villagers lived in a communal building and there were no solid <b>divisions</b> between neighbours.</i>
<b>divorcement</b>	The legal dissolution of a marriage.
<b><u>estrangement</u></b>	The fact of no longer being on friendly terms or part of a social group. <i>A parent s rights in the event of divorce or <b>estrangement</b>.</i>
<b>official separation</b>	A worker who holds or is invested with an office.
<b>parting</b>	The act of departing politely. <i>The <b>parting</b> of the Red Sea.</i>
<b>partition</b>	The act of dividing or partitioning separation by the creation of a boundary that divides or keeps apart. <i>This takes a copy of hard disk <b>partition</b> information during installation.</i>
<b><u>rupture</u></b>	An instance of breaking or bursting suddenly and completely. <i>The patient died after <b>rupture</b> of an aneurysm.</i>
<b><u>separation</u></b>	The process of distinguishing between two or more things. <i>Religion involved the <b>separation</b> of the sacred and the profane.</i>
<b>severance</b>	Dismissal or discharge from employment. <i>A complete <b>severance</b> of links with the Republic.</i>
<b><u>split</u></b>	A single thickness of split hide. <i>The <b>split</b> between the rich and the poor.</i>

## Divorce as a Verb

### Definitions of "Divorce" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "divorce" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Get a divorce; formally terminate a marriage.*
- *Separate or dissociate (something) from something else, typically with an undesirable effect.*
- *Part; cease or break association with.*
- *Legally dissolve one's marriage with (someone).*
- *Dissociate oneself from (something).*







## Synonyms of "Divorce" as a verb (34 Words)

<a href="#">alienate</a>	Make (someone) become unsympathetic or hostile. <i>The association does not wish to <b>alienate</b> its members.</i>
<b>annul one's marriage</b>	Declare invalid.
<b>annul one's marriage to</b>	Cancel officially.
<b>break up</b>	Make known to the public information that was previously known only to a few people or that was meant to be kept a secret.
<b>break up with</b>	Separate from a clinch, in boxing.
<b>cut off</b>	Cut off the testicles of male animals such as horses.
<b>detach</b>	Come to be detached. <i>A figure in brown <b>detached</b> itself from the shadows.</i>
<b>disassociate</b>	Part; cease or break association with. <i>She <b>disassociated</b> herself from the organization when she found out the identity of the president.</i>
<b>disconnect</b>	Make disconnected disjoin or unfasten. <i>He <b>disconnected</b> the main power cables from the batteries.</i>
<b>disjoin</b>	Become separated disconnected or disjoint. <i>They asked that their parish be <b>disjoined</b> from Lewis and added to Harris.</i>
<b>disjoint</b>	Make disjoint separated or disconnected undo the joining of. <i><b>Disjoint</b> the chicken before cooking it.</i> (especially in abstract contexts) disconnect or separate.
<a href="#">dissociate</a>	<i>These compounds are <b>dissociated</b> by solar radiation to yield atoms of chlorine.</i>
<b>dissolve one's marriage</b>	Cause to lose control emotionally.
<b>dissolve one's marriage to</b>	Become or cause to become soft or liquid.
<b>disunite</b>	Force, take, or pull apart. <i>The depiction of the protesters is designed to discredit and <b>disunite</b> the movement.</i>
<a href="#">divide</a>	Form a boundary between (two people or things). <i>Cities where politicians frequently <b>divide</b> along racial lines.</i>
<b>end one's marriage</b>	Have an end, in a temporal, spatial, or quantitative sense; either spatial or metaphorical.
<b>end one's marriage to</b>	Bring to an end or halt.

<b>get a divorce</b>	Cause to move; cause to be in a certain position or condition.
<b>get a divorce from</b>	Reach and board.
<b>isolate</b>	Place or set apart. <i>His difficulty will be to <b>isolate</b> the factors which are most significant.</i>
<b>keep apart</b>	Stick to correctly or closely.
<b>part</b>	Come apart. <i>Moses <b>parted</b> the Red Sea.</i>
<b>part company</b>	Force, take, or pull apart.
<b>part company with</b>	Discontinue an association or relation; go different ways.
<b>part from</b>	Go one's own way; move apart.
<b>separate</b>	Become separated into pieces or fragments. <i>The friends <b>separated</b> after the party.</i>
<b>separate from</b>	Divide into two or more branches so as to form a fork.
<b>set apart</b>	Put or set (seeds, seedlings, or plants) into the ground.
<b>sever</b>	Divide by cutting or slicing, especially suddenly and forcibly. <i><b>Sever</b> a relationship.</i>
<b>split</b>	Discontinue an association or relation; go different ways. <i>The party was deeply <b>split</b> over its future direction.</i>
<b>split from</b>	Go one's own way; move apart.
<b>split up</b>	Discontinue an association or relation; go different ways.
<b>split up with</b>	Come open suddenly and violently, as if from internal pressure.





### **Usage Examples of "Divorce" as a verb**

- *Religion cannot be divorced from morality.*
- *The couple divorced after only 6 months.*
- *She divorced him in 1965.*
- *A desire to divorce myself from history.*
- *They divorced eight years later.*



## Associations of "Divorce" (30 Words)

### adultery

Extramarital sex that willfully and maliciously interferes with marriage relations.

***Adultery** is often cited as grounds for divorce.*

### alienate

Transfer ownership of (property rights) to another person or group.

*The boring work **alienated** his employees.*

### alienation

Separation resulting from hostility.

*Unemployment may generate a sense of political **alienation**.*

### alimony

Court-ordered support paid by one spouse to another after they are separated.

*He is said to have paid 300 000 **alimony** to his first wife.*

### couple

Join to form a pair.

*The engaged **couple**.*

<b>dissociate</b>	Part; cease or break association with. <i>You must <b>dissociate</b> these two events.</i>
<b>estrangle</b>	Arouse hostility or indifference in where there had formerly been love, affection, or friendliness. <i>Years of boarding school <b>estranged</b> the child from her home.</i>
<b>estranged</b>	Caused to be unloved. <i>Harriet felt more <b>estranged</b> from her daughter than ever.</i>
<b>estrangement</b>	The feeling of being alienated from other people. <i>A parent's rights in the event of divorce or <b>estrangement</b>.</i>
<b>ex</b>	Out of fashion. <i>All his <b>exes</b> live in Texas.</i>
<b>fiance</b>	A man who is engaged to be married.
<b>girlfriend</b>	Any female friend. <i>He lives with his <b>girlfriend</b>.</i>
<b>husband</b>	Use cautiously and frugally. <i>She <b>husbanded</b> their financial resources through difficult times.</i>
<b>isolate</b>	A culture of microorganisms isolated for study. <i>His difficulty will be to <b>isolate</b> the factors which are most significant.</i>
<b>isolation</b>	A defense mechanism in which memory of an unacceptable act or impulse is separated from the emotion originally associated with it. <i><b>Isolation</b> from family and friends may also contribute to anxiety.</i>
<b>loneliness</b>	The fact of being without companions; solitariness. <i>The <b>loneliness</b> of a sailor's life.</i>
<b>marry</b>	Take in marriage. <i>They had no plans to <b>marry</b>.</i>
<b>newlywed</b>	Someone recently married.
<b>paramour</b>	A lover, especially the illicit partner of a married person.
<b>polygamy</b>	The practice or custom of having more than one wife or husband at the same time.
<b>schism</b>	Division of a group into opposing factions. <i>Another <b>schism</b> like that and they will wind up in bankruptcy.</i>
<b>segregate</b>	Someone who is or has been segregated. <i>We don't <b>segregate</b> in this county.</i>
<b>separate</b>	Become separated into pieces or fragments. <i><b>Separate</b> the eggs and beat the egg yolks.</i>



<b><u>separation</u></b>	The generation of a turbulent boundary layer between the surface of a body and a moving fluid, or between two fluids moving at different speeds. <i>She and her husband have agreed to a trial <b>separation</b>.</i>
<b><u>sequester</u></b>	Set apart from others. <i>Non precipitating water softeners use complex phosphates to <b>sequester</b> calcium and magnesium ions.</i>
<b>severance</b>	The action of ending a connection or relationship. <i>Employees were offered <b>severance</b> terms.</i>
<b><u>spouse</u></b>	A husband or wife, considered in relation to their partner.
<b>wed</b>	Perform a marriage ceremony. <i>They were <b>wed</b> in London.</i>
<b>widower</b>	A man who has lost his spouse by death and has not married again. <i>Her new found passion has turned me into a tennis <b>widower</b>.</i>
<b><u>wife</u></b>	The wife of a person with a specified occupation. <i>A clergy <b>wife</b>.</i>
