- *Make known (private or sensitive information).*
- *Make known to the public information that was previously known only to a few people or that was meant to be kept a secret.*

break	Undergo breaking. <i>The idea was to better the prisoners not to break them.</i>
bring out	Bring into a different state.
broadcast	Broadcast over the airwaves as in radio or television. Broadcast seeds.
communicate	Pass on (an infectious disease) to another person or animal. <i>The dining room communicates with the kitchen.</i>
<u>declare</u>	Declare to be. <i>He declared last April.</i>
disclose	Disclose to view as by removing a cover. <i>They disclosed her name to the press.</i>

discover	Make a discovery make a new finding. <i>Firemen discovered a body in the debris.</i>
expose	Expose or make accessible to some action or influence. <i>Students were exposed to statistics in high school.</i>
give away	Give food to.
impart	Bestow a quality on. <i>Shiitake mushrooms impart a wonderfully woody flavour to the salad.</i>
let on	Make it possible through a specific action or lack of action for something to happen.
let out	Consent to, give permission.
make known	Represent fictitiously, as in a play, or pretend to be or act like.
pass on	Go unchallenged; be approved.
proclaim	Indicate clearly. <i>She proclaimed that what I had said was untrue.</i>
promulgate	State or announce. <i>In January 1852 the new Constitution was promulgated.</i>
publish	Communicate (a libel) to a third party. <i>Publish a magazine or newspaper.</i>
reveal	Make known to the public information that was previously known only to a few people or that was meant to be kept a secret. <i>The clouds were breaking up to reveal a clear blue sky.</i>
tell	Express in words. <i>Tell me what is bothering you.</i>
uncover	Make visible. <i>Uncover your belly.</i>
unwrap	Remove the outer cover or wrapping of. <i>Let s unwrap the gifts.</i>

disclosed	Made known (especially something secret or concealed). <i>The disclosed purpose of their wicked plan.</i>
<u>disclosure</u>	The speech act of making something evident. <i>The government s disclosures about missile programmes.</i>
evince	Reveal the presence of (a quality or feeling); indicate. <i>The news stories evinced the usual mixture of sympathy and satisfaction.</i>
<u>expose</u>	Expose while ridiculing especially of pretentious or false claims and ideas. <i>The situation exposed a conflict within the government.</i>
exposure	The state of being vulnerable or exposed. <i>They were suffering from exposure.</i>
express	Serve as a means for expressing something. <i>Italians express coffee rather than filter it.</i>
expressionism	A style of painting, music, or drama in which the artist or writer seeks to express the inner world of emotion rather than external reality.
<u>formulate</u>	Create or prepare methodically. <i>The argument is sufficiently clear that it can be formulated mathematically.</i>
giveaway	A gift of public land or resources for the private gain of a limited group. <i>The Patriots have 16 takeaways and two giveaways during their five game winning streak.</i>
<u>impart</u>	Make (information) known. <i>Shiitake mushrooms impart a wonderfully woody flavour to the salad.</i>

manifest	Record in a ship's manifest. <i>The ghost manifests each year on the same day.</i>
outlook	A place from which a view is possible; a vantage point. <i>The pleasant outlook from the club window.</i>
overexposure	Excessive exposure, especially to something harmful. <i>At certain times a celebrity may suffer from overexposure.</i>
reveal	Disclose directly or through prophets. <i>The clouds were breaking up to reveal a clear blue sky.</i>
revealing	Making interesting or significant information known, especially of a personal nature. <i>A very revealing dress.</i>
revelation	The last book of the New Testament recounting a divine revelation of the future to St John. <i>An attempt to reconcile Darwinian theories with biblical revelation.</i>
shallowness	Lack of depth of character, insight, or serious thought. <i>Because of the shallowness of the water there are big temperature fluctuations.</i>
signify	Make known with a word or signal. <i>Signify your agreement by signing the letter below.</i>
symbolize	Represent or identify by using a symbol; use symbols. <i>The ceremonial dagger symbolizes justice.</i>
uncover	Make known to the public information that was previously known only to a few people or that was meant to be kept a secret. <i>The newspaper uncovered the President's illegal dealings.</i>
unveil	Remove the veil from. <i>Women must not unveil themselves in public in some religious societies.</i>
unwrap	Remove the wrapping from (a package). <i>Let's unwrap the gifts.</i>
