- *Make known to the public information that was previously known only to a few people or that was meant to be kept a secret.*



## Synonyms of "Divulge" as a verb (21 Words)

<b>break</b>	Undergo breaking. <i>The idea was to better the prisoners not to <b>break</b> them.</i>
<b>bring out</b>	Bring into a different state.
<b>broadcast</b>	Broadcast over the airwaves as in radio or television. <b>Broadcast</b> seeds.
<b>communicate</b>	Pass on (an infectious disease) to another person or animal. <i>The dining room <b>communicates</b> with the kitchen.</i>
<u><a href="#">declare</a></u>	Declare to be. <i>He <b>declared</b> last April.</i>
<b>disclose</b>	Disclose to view as by removing a cover. <i>They <b>disclosed</b> her name to the press.</i>

<b>discover</b>	Make a discovery make a new finding. <i>Firemen <b>discovered</b> a body in the debris.</i>
<b>expose</b>	Expose or make accessible to some action or influence. <i>Students were <b>exposed</b> to statistics in high school.</i>
<b>give away</b>	Give food to.
<b>impart</b>	Bestow a quality on. <i>Shiitake mushrooms <b>impart</b> a wonderfully woody flavour to the salad.</i>
<b>let on</b>	Make it possible through a specific action or lack of action for something to happen.
<b>let out</b>	Consent to, give permission.
<b>make known</b>	Represent fictitiously, as in a play, or pretend to be or act like.
<b>pass on</b>	Go unchallenged; be approved.
<b>proclaim</b>	Indicate clearly. <i>She <b>proclaimed</b> that what I had said was untrue.</i>
<b>promulgate</b>	State or announce. <i>In January 1852 the new Constitution was <b>promulgated</b>.</i>
<b>publish</b>	Communicate (a libel) to a third party. <i><b>Publish</b> a magazine or newspaper.</i>
<b>reveal</b>	Make known to the public information that was previously known only to a few people or that was meant to be kept a secret. <i>The clouds were breaking up to <b>reveal</b> a clear blue sky.</i>
<b>tell</b>	Express in words. <i><b>Tell</b> me what is bothering you.</i>
<b>uncover</b>	Make visible. <i><b>Uncover</b> your belly.</i>
<b>unwrap</b>	Remove the outer cover or wrapping of. <i>Let s <b>unwrap</b> the gifts.</i>

<b>disclose</b>	Disclose to view as by removing a cover. <i>He cleared away the grass and <b>disclosed</b> a narrow opening descending into the darkness.</i>
<b>disclosed</b>	Made known (especially something secret or concealed). <i>The <b>disclosed</b> purpose of their wicked plan.</i>
<u><b>disclosure</b></u>	The speech act of making something evident. <i>The government s <b>disclosures</b> about missile programmes.</i>
<b>evince</b>	Reveal the presence of (a quality or feeling); indicate. <i>The news stories <b>evinced</b> the usual mixture of sympathy and satisfaction.</i>
<u><b>expose</b></u>	Expose while ridiculing especially of pretentious or false claims and ideas. <i>The situation <b>exposed</b> a conflict within the government.</i>
<b>exposure</b>	The state of being vulnerable or exposed. <i>They were suffering from <b>exposure</b>.</i>
<b>express</b>	Serve as a means for expressing something. <i>Italians <b>express</b> coffee rather than filter it.</i>
<b>expressionism</b>	A style of painting, music, or drama in which the artist or writer seeks to express the inner world of emotion rather than external reality.
<u><b>formulate</b></u>	Create or prepare methodically. <i>The argument is sufficiently clear that it can be <b>formulated</b> mathematically.</i>
<b>giveaway</b>	A gift of public land or resources for the private gain of a limited group. <i>The Patriots have 16 takeaways and two <b>giveaways</b> during their five game winning streak.</i>
<u><b>impart</b></u>	Make (information) known. <i>Shiitake mushrooms <b>impart</b> a wonderfully woody flavour to the salad.</i>

<b><u>manifest</u></b>	Record in a ship's manifest. <i>The ghost <b>manifests</b> each year on the same day.</i>
<b><u>outlook</u></b>	A place from which a view is possible; a vantage point. <i>The pleasant <b>outlook</b> from the club window.</i>
<b>overexposure</b>	Excessive exposure, especially to something harmful. <i>At certain times a celebrity may suffer from <b>overexposure</b>.</i>
<b>reveal</b>	Disclose directly or through prophets. <i>The clouds were breaking up to <b>reveal</b> a clear blue sky.</i>
<b>revealing</b>	Making interesting or significant information known, especially of a personal nature. <i>A very <b>revealing</b> dress.</i>
<b><u>revelation</u></b>	The last book of the New Testament recounting a divine revelation of the future to St John. <i>An attempt to reconcile Darwinian theories with biblical <b>revelation</b>.</i>
<b>shallowness</b>	Lack of depth of character, insight, or serious thought. <i>Because of the <b>shallowness</b> of the water there are big temperature fluctuations.</i>
<b><u>signify</u></b>	Make known with a word or signal. <i><b>Signify</b> your agreement by signing the letter below.</i>
<b>symbolize</b>	Represent or identify by using a symbol; use symbols. <i>The ceremonial dagger <b>symbolizes</b> justice.</i>
<b><u>uncover</u></b>	Make known to the public information that was previously known only to a few people or that was meant to be kept a secret. <i>The newspaper <b>uncovered</b> the President's illegal dealings.</i>
<b>unveil</b>	Remove the veil from. <i>Women must not <b>unveil</b> themselves in public in some religious societies.</i>
