code of belief	A set of rules or principles or laws (especially written ones).

<u>creed</u>	A formal statement of Christian beliefs, especially the Apostles' Creed or the Nicene Creed. <i>Liberalism was more than a political creed.</i>
<u>decree</u>	The issuing of a decree. <i>Presidential decrees.</i>
<u>dictate</u>	A guiding principle. <i>The dictates of reason.</i>
<u>dictum</u>	A formal pronouncement from an authoritative source. <i>The old dictum might is right.</i>
direction	Something that provides direction or advice as to a decision or course of action. <i>The campaign s lack of direction.</i>
<u>directive</u>	A pronouncement encouraging or banning some activity. <i>A new EC directive.</i>
<u>dogma</u>	A doctrine or code of beliefs accepted as authoritative. <i>The rejection of political dogma.</i>
guideline	A general rule, principle, or piece of advice. <i>The organization has issued guidelines for people working with prisoners.</i>
injunction	(law) a judicial remedy issued in order to prohibit a party from doing or continuing to do a certain activity. <i>Injunction were formerly obtained by writ but now by a judicial order.</i>
instruction	A direction or order. <i>He issued instructions to the sheriff.</i>
ism	A distinctive practice, system, or philosophy, typically a political ideology or an artistic movement. <i>He loathed isms and any form of dogma.</i>
<u>law</u>	Systems of law as a subject of study or as the basis of the legal profession. <i>He d never been in trouble with the law in his life.</i>

mandate	<p>The commission that is given to a government and its policies through an electoral victory. <i>The last mandate of Trudeau from 1980 to 1984 was a remarkable chapter in Canadian history.</i></p>
order	<p>An institution founded by a monarch along the lines of a medieval crusading monastic order for the purpose of honouring meritorious conduct. <i>We shall consider these questions in the inverse order of their presentation.</i></p>
ordinance	<p>A statute enacted by a city government. <i>His strict observance of religious ordinances was no doubt quickened by the remorse he felt.</i></p>
philosophy	<p>A particular system of philosophical thought. <i>The philosophy of science.</i></p>
prescription	<p>An instruction written by a medical practitioner that authorizes a patient to be issued with a medicine or treatment. <i>The unnecessary prescription of antibiotics.</i></p>
principle	<p>A basic truth or law or assumption. <i>The principles of internal combustion engines.</i></p>
rule	<p>A rule describing or prescribing a linguistic practice. <i>Such accidents are the exception rather than the rule.</i></p>
school of thought	<p>The period of instruction in a school; the time period when school is in session.</p>
set of beliefs	<p>Any electronic equipment that receives or transmits radio or tv signals.</p>
statute	<p>A written law passed by a legislative body. <i>Immunities granted to trade unions by statute.</i></p>
teaching	<p>Ideas or principles taught by an authority. <i>The teachings of the Koran.</i></p>
tenet	<p>A religious doctrine that is proclaimed as true without proof. <i>The tenets of classical liberalism.</i></p>
working principle	<p>A mine or quarry that is being or has been worked.</p>

belief	A vague idea in which some confidence is placed. <i>We re prepared to fight for our beliefs.</i>
credibility	The quality of being convincing or believable. <i>The government s loss of credibility.</i>
credible	Credulous. <i>Credible information.</i>
credo	Any system of principles or beliefs. <i>He announced his credo in his first editorial.</i>

<u>credulity</u>	Tendency to believe readily. <i>Moneylenders prey upon their credulity and inexperience.</i>

<u>faith</u>	A particular religion. <i>The Christian faith.</i>
homiletics	The branch of theology that deals with sermons and homilies.
homily	A tedious moralizing lecture. <i>She delivered her homily about the need for patience.</i>
logic	The system of operations performed by a computer that underlies the machine's representation of logical operations. <i>The logic of private competition was to replace small firms by larger firms.</i>
metaphysics	The philosophical study of being and knowing. <i>They would regard the question of the initial conditions for the universe as belonging to the realm of metaphysics or religion.</i>
missionary	Relating to or characteristic of a missionary or a religious mission. <i>Our taxi driver shared a sense of missionary zeal with us.</i>
philosophy	A belief (or system of beliefs) accepted as authoritative by some group or school. <i>The philosophy of science.</i>
positivism	A humanistic religious system founded on positivism.
pragmatist	An adherent of philosophical pragmatism. <i>American pragmatists have influenced a great deal of recent philosophy of many types.</i>
<u>preach</u>	Give moral advice to someone in a pompously self-righteous way. <i>He preached the word of God.</i>

principle	A general scientific theorem or law that has numerous special applications across a wide field. <i>The combination of male and female principles.</i>
prophecy	Deliver a sermon. <i>Jacques was prophecying a bumper harvest.</i>
sociology	The study of the development, structure, and functioning of human society.
sophism	A deliberately invalid argument displaying ingenuity in reasoning in the hope of deceiving someone.
sophistry	The use of clever but false arguments, especially with the intention of deceiving. <i>Trying to argue that I had benefited in any way from the disaster was pure sophistry.</i>
sylogistic	Of or relating to or consisting of syllogism.
tenet	A principle or belief, especially one of the main principles of a religion or philosophy. <i>The tenets of classical liberalism.</i>
transcendental	Existing outside of or not in accordance with nature-Aldous Huxley. <i>Find transcendental motives for sublunary action.</i>
transcendentalism	Any system of philosophy emphasizing the intuitive and spiritual above the empirical and material.
