<b>give weight to</b>	Give or supply.
<b><u>log</u></b>	Enter into a log as on ships and planes. <i>There are plans to <b>log</b> 250 000 hectares of virgin rainforest.</i>
<b>prove</b>	Prove formally demonstrate by a mathematical formal proof. <i>The scheme has <b>proved</b> a great success.</i>
<b>put on record</b>	Cause to be in a certain state; cause to be in a certain relation.
<b>ratify</b>	Approve and express assent, responsibility, or obligation. <i>Both countries were due to <b>ratify</b> the treaty by the end of the year.</i>
<b>record</b>	Produce a programme or a piece or collection of music by recording a performance. <i>They <b>recorded</b> an episode of the show.</i>
<b><u>register</u></b>	Entrust a letter or parcel to a post office for transmission by registered post. <i><b>Register</b> for an election.</i>
<b>report</b>	Be responsible for reporting the details of as in journalism. <i>The teacher should <b>report</b> on the child s progress.</i>
<b>set down</b>	Set to a certain position or cause to operate correctly.
<b>set down in black and white</b>	Become gelatinous.
<b>set down in writing</b>	Adapt for performance in a different way.
<b><u>substantiate</u></b>	Represent in bodily form. <i>The president s trip will <b>substantiate</b> good relations with the former enemy country.</i>

<b>depository</b>	A facility where things can be deposited for storage or safekeeping. <i>Irish libraries became depositories for material from all over the world.</i>
<b>documentation</b>	Documentary validation. <i>User <b>documentation</b>.</i>
<b>dramaturgy</b>	The theory and practice of dramatic composition. <i>Studies of Shakespeare s <b>dramaturgy</b>.</i>
<b><u>file</u></b>	Smooth with a file. <i>MI5 were keeping a <b>file</b> on him.</i>
<b>lease</b>	Grant property on lease let. <i>She <b>leased</b> the site to a local company.</i>
<b>letter</b>	Classify with letters. <i>In high school she <b>lettered</b> in soccer basketball and softball.</i>
<b><u>library</u></b>	A collection of books and periodicals held in a library. <i>A university <b>library</b>.</i>
<b><u>museum</u></b>	A depository for collecting and displaying objects having scientific or historical or artistic value. <i>It is difficult to avoid the feeling that the city is now a living <b>museum</b>.</i>
<b>postscript</b>	Textual matter that is added onto a publication; usually at the end. <i>As a <b>postscript</b> to this Paul did finally marry.</i>
<b>record</b>	Sound recording consisting of a disk with a continuous groove used to reproduce music by rotating while a phonograph needle tracks in the groove. <i>There is no <b>record</b> of his having graduated.</i>
<b>registered</b>	Of a letter or parcel sent by registered post. <b>Registered</b> bonds.

<b>registration</b>	The series of letters and figures identifying a motor vehicle assigned on registration and displayed on a number plate. <i>The <b>registration</b> of births marriages and deaths.</i>
<b>repository</b>	A person to whom a secret is entrusted. <i>A deep <b>repository</b> for nuclear waste.</i>
<b><u>transcribe</u></b>	Synthesize (RNA) using a template of existing DNA (or vice versa), so that the genetic information is copied. <i>His largest early work was <b>transcribed</b> for organ.</i>
<b>transcript</b>	A length of RNA or DNA that has been transcribed respectively from a DNA or RNA template. <i>He read a <b>transcript</b> of the interrogation.</i>
<b>transcription</b>	The act of making a record (especially an audio record). <i>Our usual <b>transcription</b> is given in brackets.</i>
<b>verify</b>	Make sure or demonstrate that (something) is true, accurate, or justified. <i><b>Verify</b> a claim.</i>
