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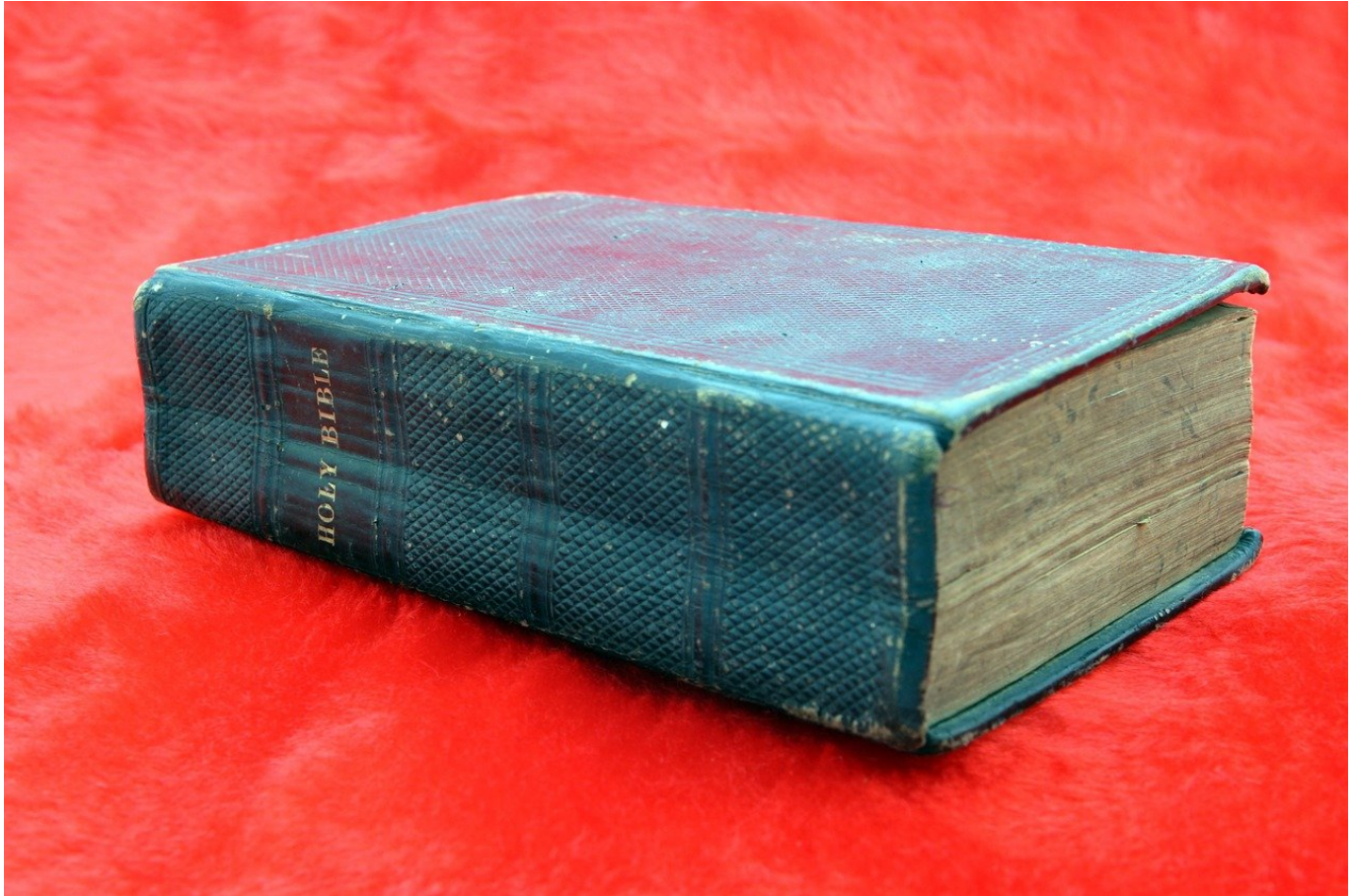

Definitions of "Dogma" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “dogma” as a noun can have the following definitions:

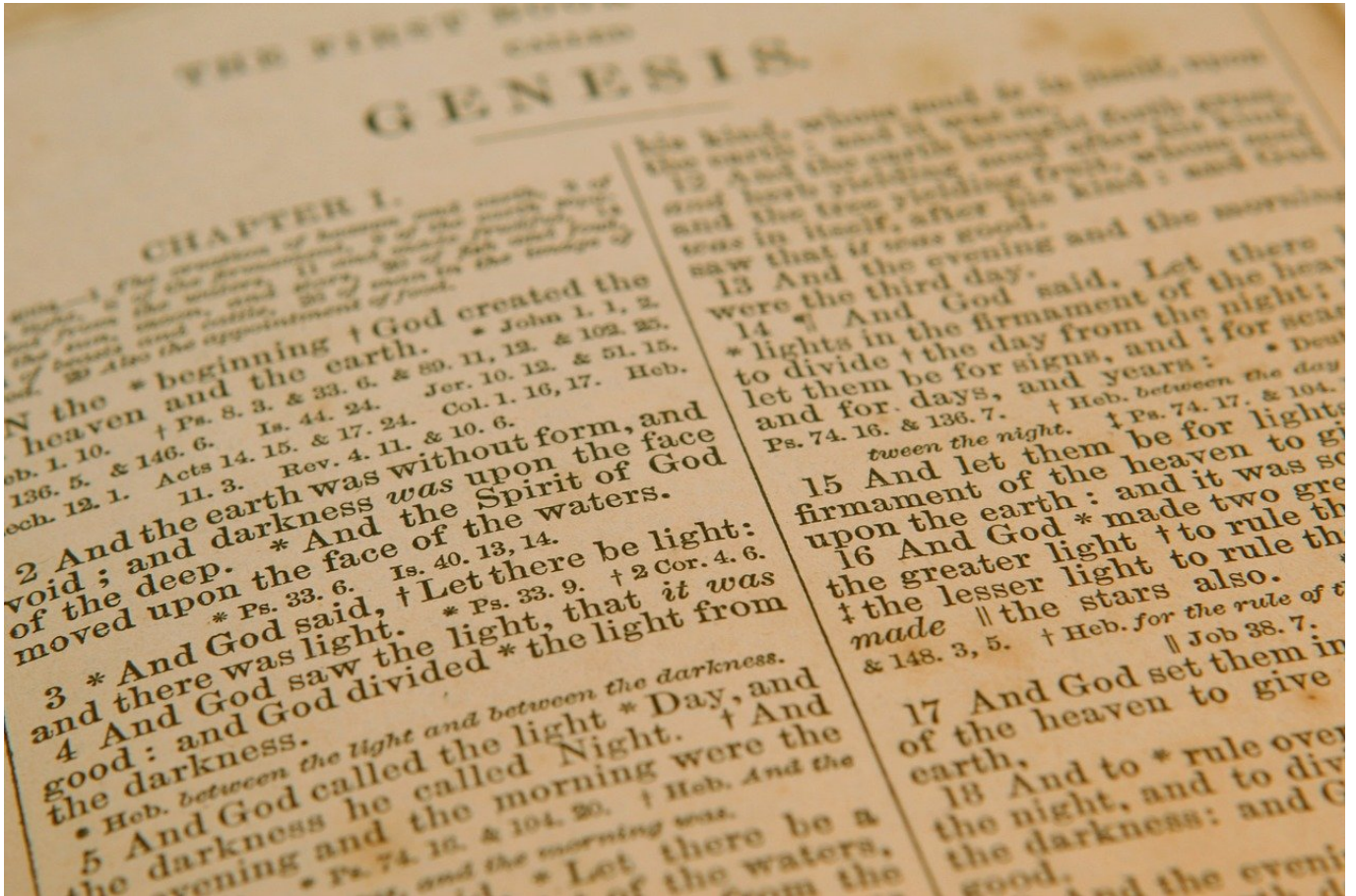
- *A doctrine or code of beliefs accepted as authoritative.*
- *A religious doctrine that is proclaimed as true without proof.*
- *A principle or set of principles laid down by an authority as incontrovertibly true.*



Synonyms of "Dogma" as a noun (15 Words)

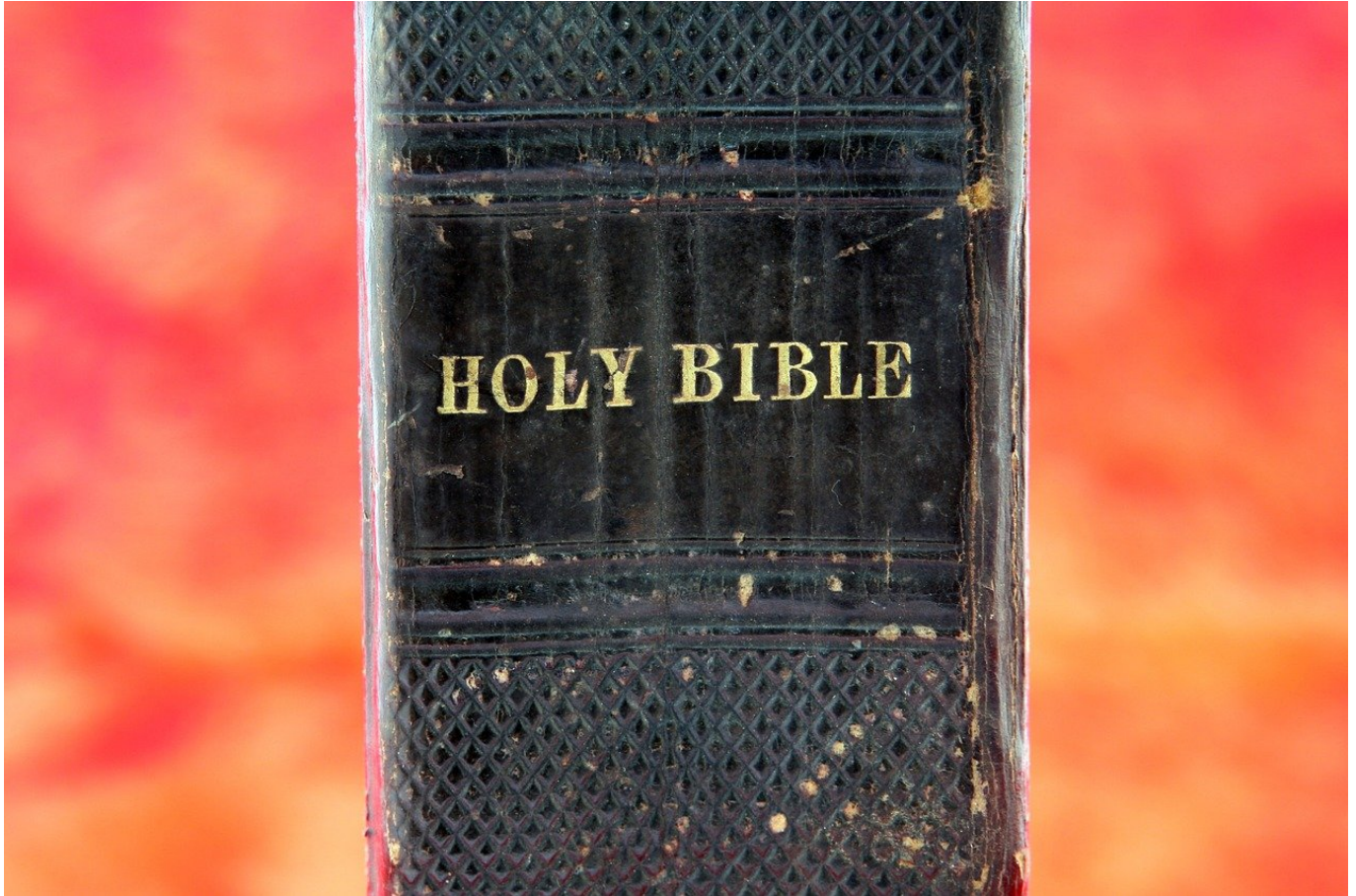
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| article of faith | One of a class of artifacts. |
| belief | Trust, faith, or confidence in (someone or something). <i>We re prepared to fight for our beliefs.</i> |
| blind faith | Something intended to misrepresent the true nature of an activity. |
| canon | A contrapuntal piece of music in which a melody in one part is imitated exactly in other parts. <i>The appointment violated the canons of fair play and equal opportunity.</i> |
| <u>certainty</u> | Firm conviction that something is the case. <i>The passing of the act made a general election a certainty.</i> |
| <u>conviction</u> | A firmly held belief or opinion. <i>She takes pride in stating her political convictions.</i> |

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| ethic | The principles of right and wrong that are accepted by an individual or a social group. <i>The Puritan ethic.</i> |
| law | Systems of law as a subject of study or as the basis of the legal profession. <i>The laws of thermodynamics.</i> |
| maxim | A short, pithy statement expressing a general truth or rule of conduct. <i>The maxim that actions speak louder than words.</i> |
| precept | A rate or tax set by a precept. <i>The Commissioner issued precepts requiring the companies to provide information.</i> |
| principle | A fundamental quality determining the nature of something. <i>The principle of jet propulsion.</i> |
| rule | A strip of wood or other rigid material used for measuring length or marking straight lines a ruler. <i>Such accidents are the exception rather than the rule.</i> |
| teaching | The activities of educating or instructing; activities that impart knowledge or skill. <i>I went into teaching because I like working with children.</i> |
| tenet | A principle or belief, especially one of the main principles of a religion or philosophy. <i>The tenets of classical liberalism.</i> |
| unquestioning belief | A vague idea in which some confidence is placed. |

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| belief | Trust, faith, or confidence in (someone or something). <i>A belief that climate can be modified beneficially.</i> |
| believe | Follow a credo have a faith be a believer. <i>I believed his report.</i> |
| believing | The cognitive process that leads to convictions. <i>Seeing is believing.</i> |
| christendom | The collective body of Christians throughout the world and history (found predominantly in Europe and the Americas and Australia). |
| confidence | The telling of private matters or secrets with mutual trust. <i>The priest could not reveal her confidences.</i> |
| confiding | Willing to entrust personal matters. <i>She was in a confiding mood.</i> |

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| credibility | The quality of being convincing or believable. <i>The book s anecdotes have scant regard for credibility.</i> |
| credible | Capable of persuading people that something will happen or be successful. <i>Few people found his story credible.</i> |
| credo | A statement of the beliefs or aims which guide someone's actions. <i>He announced his credo in his first editorial.</i> |
| credulity | Tendency to believe readily. <i>Moneylenders prey upon their credulity and inexperience.</i> |
| credulous | Disposed to believe on little evidence. <i>A ceremony staged for credulous tourists.</i> |
| creed | The written body of teachings of a religious group that are generally accepted by that group. <i>People of many creeds and cultures.</i> |
| doctrine | A belief or set of beliefs held and taught by a Church, political party, or other group. <i>The doctrine of predestination.</i> |
| ecumenical | Promoting or relating to unity among the world's Christian Churches. <i>He was a member of ecumenical committees.</i> |
| faith | Loyalty or allegiance to a cause or a person. <i>A member of his own faith contradicted him.</i> |
| minster | A large or important church, typically one of cathedral status in the north of England that was built as part of a monastery. <i>York Minster.</i> |
| missionary | Relating to or characteristic of a missionary or a religious mission. <i>Missionary work.</i> |
| mormon | Of or pertaining to or characteristic of the Mormon Church. |
| pantheism | A doctrine which identifies God with the universe, or regards the universe as a manifestation of God. |
| preach | Earnestly advocate (a belief or course of action). <i>Our pastor will preach the sermon.</i> |
| principle | (law) an explanation of the fundamental reasons (especially an explanation of the working of some device in terms of laws of nature). <i>The principles of democracy.</i> |
| protestant | Protesting. |
| religious | A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience. <i>Both men were deeply religious and moralistic.</i> |

- superstitious** Showing ignorance of the laws of nature and faith in magic or chance.
*Many **superstitious** beliefs and practices are connected with sneezing.*
- synod** A council convened to discuss ecclesiastical business.
*The deanery **synod**.*
- tenet** A religious doctrine that is proclaimed as true without proof.
*The **tenets** of classical liberalism.*
- theism** The doctrine or belief in the existence of a God or gods.
*There are many different forms of **theism**.*
- theological** Relating to the study of the nature of God and religious belief.
***Theological** writings.*
- trusted** Regarded as reliable or truthful.
*A sure or **trusted** friend.*
- trustful** Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust.
*A **trustful** acceptance of authority.*
