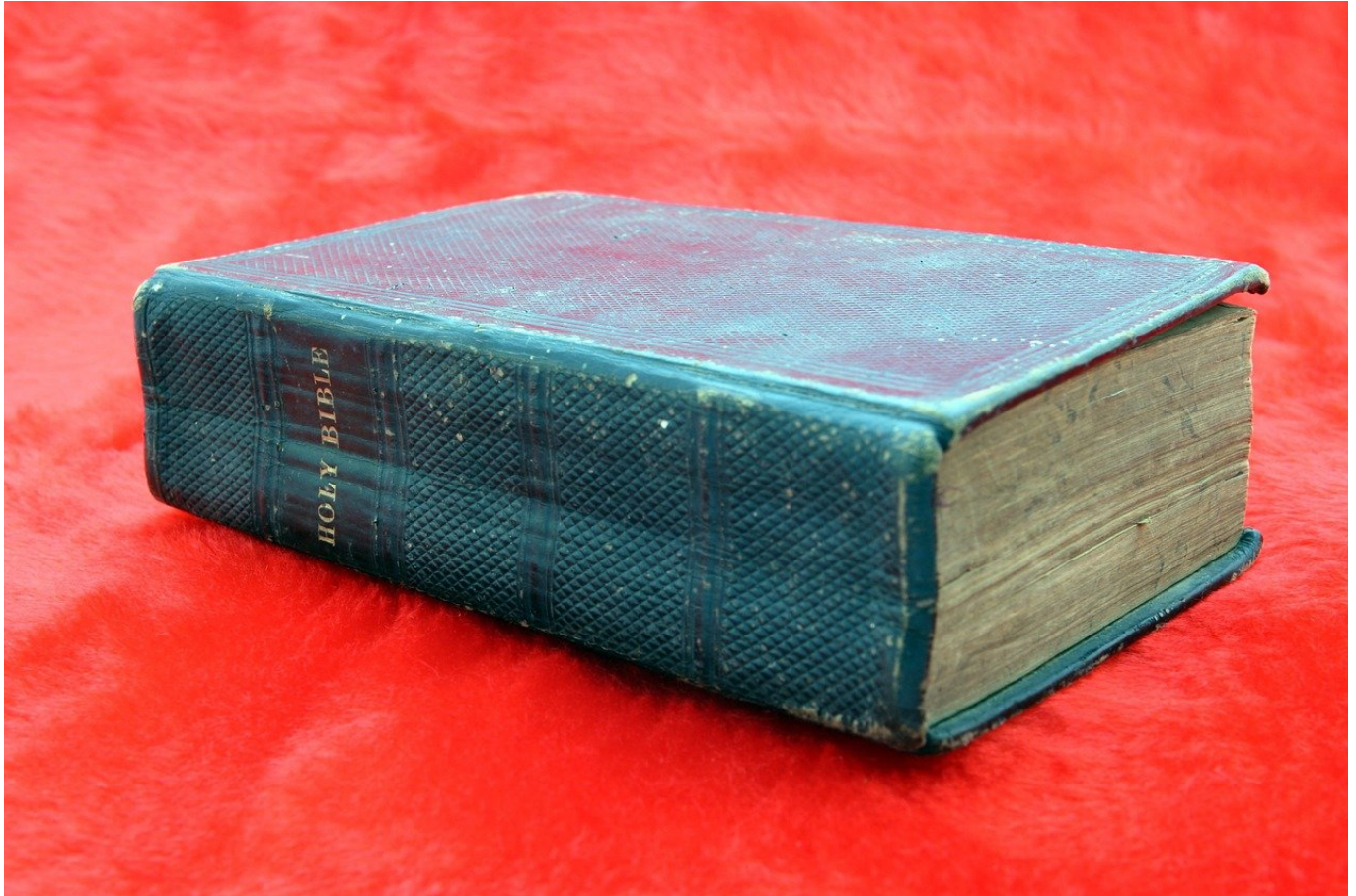

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “dogma” as a noun can have the following definitions:

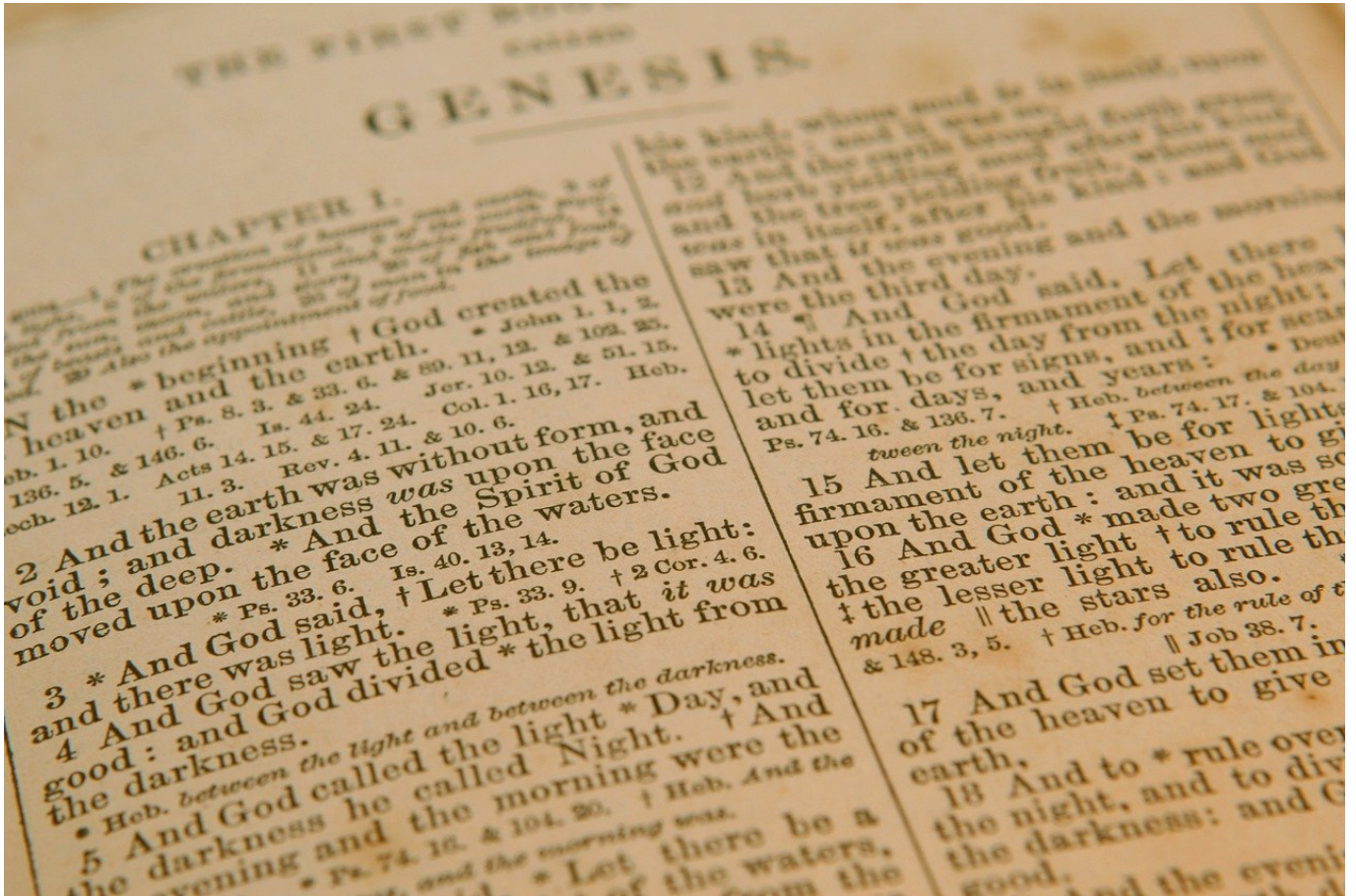
- *A doctrine or code of beliefs accepted as authoritative.*
- *A religious doctrine that is proclaimed as true without proof.*
- *A principle or set of principles laid down by an authority as incontrovertibly true.*



## Synonyms of "Dogma" as a noun (15 Words)

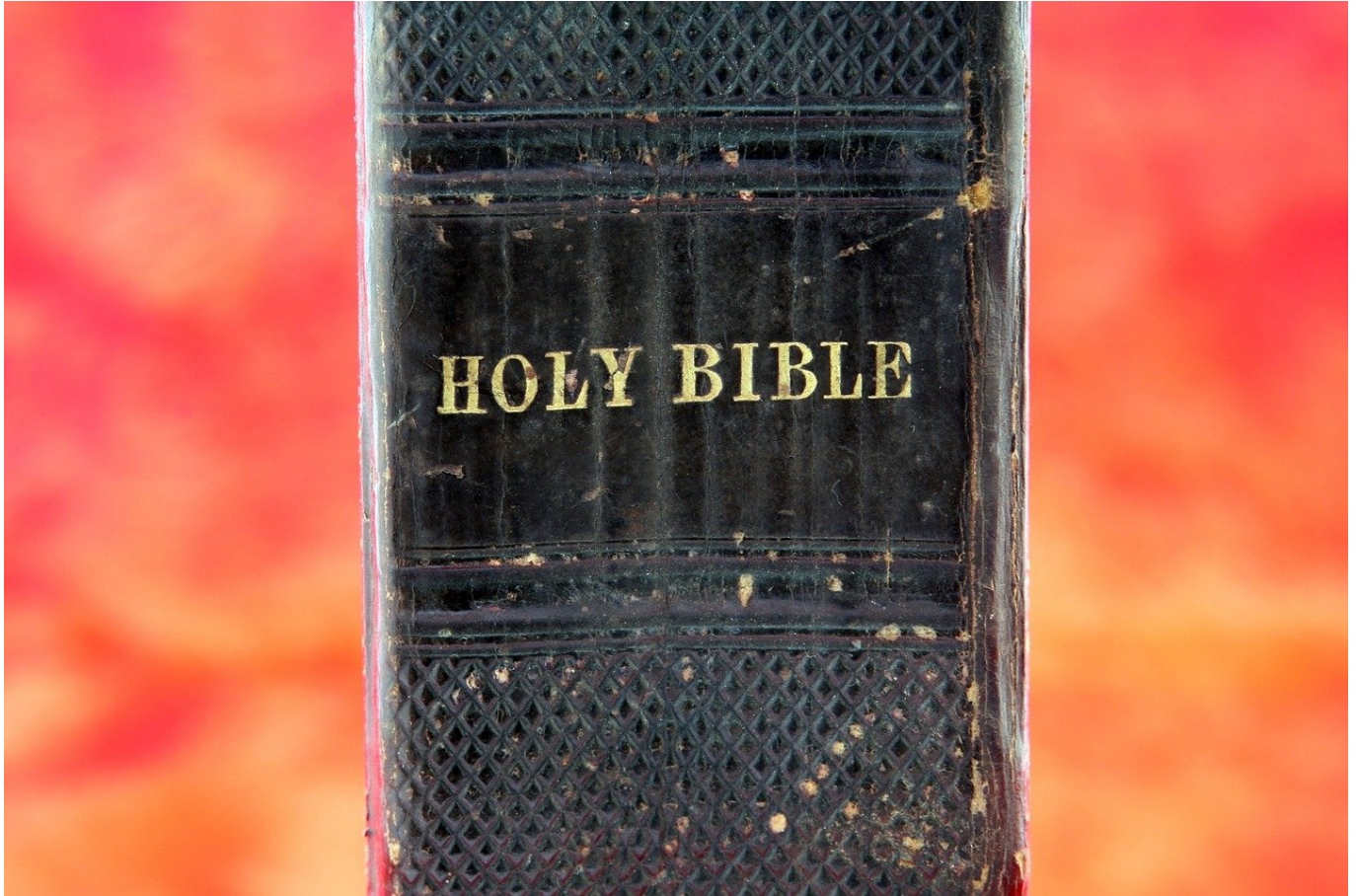
<b>article of faith</b>	One of a class of artifacts.
<b>belief</b>	Trust, faith, or confidence in (someone or something). <i>We re prepared to fight for our <b>beliefs</b>.</i>
<b>blind faith</b>	Something intended to misrepresent the true nature of an activity.
<b>canon</b>	A contrapuntal piece of music in which a melody in one part is imitated exactly in other parts. <i>The appointment violated the <b>canons</b> of fair play and equal opportunity.</i>
<b><u>certainty</u></b>	Firm conviction that something is the case. <i>The passing of the act made a general election a <b>certainty</b>.</i>
<b><u>conviction</u></b>	A firmly held belief or opinion. <i>She takes pride in stating her political <b>convictions</b>.</i>

<b>ethic</b>	The principles of right and wrong that are accepted by an individual or a social group. <i>The Puritan <b>ethic</b>.</i>
<b>law</b>	Systems of law as a subject of study or as the basis of the legal profession. <i>The <b>laws</b> of thermodynamics.</i>
<b>maxim</b>	A short, pithy statement expressing a general truth or rule of conduct. <i>The <b>maxim</b> that actions speak louder than words.</i>
<b>precept</b>	A rate or tax set by a precept. <i>The Commissioner issued <b>precepts</b> requiring the companies to provide information.</i>
<b>principle</b>	A fundamental quality determining the nature of something. <i>The <b>principle</b> of jet propulsion.</i>
<b>rule</b>	A strip of wood or other rigid material used for measuring length or marking straight lines a ruler. <i>Such accidents are the exception rather than the <b>rule</b>.</i>
<b>teaching</b>	The activities of educating or instructing; activities that impart knowledge or skill. <i>I went into <b>teaching</b> because I like working with children.</i>
<b>tenet</b>	A principle or belief, especially one of the main principles of a religion or philosophy. <i>The <b>tenets</b> of classical liberalism.</i>
<b>unquestioning belief</b>	A vague idea in which some confidence is placed.

<b>belief</b>	Trust, faith, or confidence in (someone or something). <i>A <b>belief</b> that climate can be modified beneficially.</i>
<b>believe</b>	Follow a credo have a faith be a believer. <i>I <b>believed</b> his report.</i>
<b>believing</b>	The cognitive process that leads to convictions. <i>Seeing is <b>believing</b>.</i>
<b>christendom</b>	The collective body of Christians throughout the world and history (found predominantly in Europe and the Americas and Australia).
<b>confidence</b>	The telling of private matters or secrets with mutual trust. <i>The priest could not reveal her <b>confidences</b>.</i>
<b>confiding</b>	Willing to entrust personal matters. <i>She was in a <b>confiding</b> mood.</i>

<b>credibility</b>	The quality of being convincing or believable. <i>The book s anecdotes have scant regard for <b>credibility</b>.</i>
<b>credible</b>	Capable of persuading people that something will happen or be successful. <i>Few people found his story <b>credible</b>.</i>
<b>credo</b>	A statement of the beliefs or aims which guide someone's actions. <i>He announced his <b>credo</b> in his first editorial.</i>
<b>credulity</b>	Tendency to believe readily. <i>Moneylenders prey upon their <b>credulity</b> and inexperience.</i>
<b>credulous</b>	Disposed to believe on little evidence. <i>A ceremony staged for <b>credulous</b> tourists.</i>
<b>creed</b>	The written body of teachings of a religious group that are generally accepted by that group. <i>People of many <b>creeds</b> and cultures.</i>
<b>doctrine</b>	A belief or set of beliefs held and taught by a Church, political party, or other group. <i>The <b>doctrine</b> of predestination.</i>
<b>ecumenical</b>	Promoting or relating to unity among the world's Christian Churches. <i>He was a member of <b>ecumenical</b> committees.</i>
<b>faith</b>	Loyalty or allegiance to a cause or a person. <i>A member of his own <b>faith</b> contradicted him.</i>
<b>minster</b>	A large or important church, typically one of cathedral status in the north of England that was built as part of a monastery. <i>York <b>Minster</b>.</i>
<b>missionary</b>	Relating to or characteristic of a missionary or a religious mission. <i><b>Missionary</b> work.</i>
<b>mormon</b>	Of or pertaining to or characteristic of the Mormon Church.
<b>pantheism</b>	A doctrine which identifies God with the universe, or regards the universe as a manifestation of God.
<b>preach</b>	Earnestly advocate (a belief or course of action). <i>Our pastor will <b>preach</b> the sermon.</i>
<b>principle</b>	(law) an explanation of the fundamental reasons (especially an explanation of the working of some device in terms of laws of nature). <i>The <b>principles</b> of democracy.</i>
<b>protestant</b>	Protesting.
<b>religious</b>	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience. <i>Both men were deeply <b>religious</b> and moralistic.</i>

- superstitious** Showing ignorance of the laws of nature and faith in magic or chance.  
*Many **superstitious** beliefs and practices are connected with sneezing.*
- synod** A council convened to discuss ecclesiastical business.  
*The deanery **synod**.*
- tenet** A religious doctrine that is proclaimed as true without proof.  
*The **tenets** of classical liberalism.*
- theism** The doctrine or belief in the existence of a God or gods.  
*There are many different forms of **theism**.*
- theological** Relating to the study of the nature of God and religious belief.  
***Theological** writings.*
- trusted** Regarded as reliable or truthful.  
*A sure or **trusted** friend.*
- trustful** Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust.  
*A **trustful** acceptance of authority.*
