<u>arrogant</u>	Having or revealing an exaggerated sense of one's own importance or abilities. <i>He s arrogant</i> and opinionated.
<u>assertive</u>	Having or showing a confident and forceful personality. Pointing directly at a listener is an <b>assertive</b> act.
authoritarian	Favouring or enforcing strict obedience to authority at the expense of personal freedom. An <b>authoritarian</b> regime.
authoritative	Having authority or ascendancy or influence. <i>His voice was calm and <b>authoritative</b></i> .
dictatorial	Of or characteristic of a dictator. A <b>dictatorial</b> regime.



doctrinaire	Seeking to impose a doctrine in all circumstances without regard to practical considerations. The administration s <b>doctrinaire</b> economic policy.
dogmatical	Characterized by assertion of unproved or unprovable principles.
domineering	Tending to domineer. How can I do my job with a <b>domineering</b> boss yelling in my ear.
<u>emphatic</u>	(of certain Arabic consonants) pronounced with both dental articulation and constriction of the pharynx. <i>An emphatic no.</i>
<u>entrenched</u>	(of an attitude, habit, or belief) firmly established and difficult or unlikely to change; ingrained. An <b>entrenched</b> resistance to change.
high-handed	Given to haughty disregard of others.
<u>imperative</u>	Relating to verbs in the imperative mood. <i>Immediate action was <b>imperative</b></i> .
imperious	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy. <i>His imperious demands</i> .
inflexible	Not able to be changed or adapted to particular circumstances. <i>Inflexible rules</i> .
<u>insistent</u>	Demanding attention- H.L.Mencken. She was very <b>insistent</b> that I call her.
opinionated	Obstinate in your opinions. An arrogant and <b>opinionated</b> man.
<u>overbearing</u>	Expecting unquestioning obedience. Insufferably <b>overbearing</b> behavior toward the waiter.
peremptory	Insisting on immediate attention or obedience, especially in a brusquely imperious way. <i>Spoke in peremptory tones.</i>
pontifical	Denoting or governed by or relating to a bishop or bishops. A <b>pontifical</b> commission.
rigid	Not adaptable in outlook, belief, or response. A table made of <b>rigid</b> plastic.
unbending	Reserved, formal, or strict in one's behaviour or attitudes; austere and inflexible. An <b>unbending</b> will to dominate.



unchallengeable	Not open to challenge. A position of <b>unchallengeable</b> supremacy.
<u>uncompromising</u>	Not making concessions. The <b>uncompromising</b> ugliness of the era s buildings.
<u>unquestionable</u>	Not able to be disputed or doubted. <i>His musicianship is <b>unquestionable</b></i> .
unyielding	Stubbornly unyielding T S Eliot. <i>The Atlantic hurled its waves at the <b>unyielding</b> rocks.</i>

ascendancy	Occupation of a position of dominant power or influence. The poor have a moral <b>ascendancy</b> over the rich.
authority	A person or organization having political or administrative power and control. <i>He hit the ball with <b>authority</b>.</i>
cavalier	A gallant or courtly gentleman. Anne was irritated by his <b>cavalier</b> attitude.
centralize	Bring (activities or processes) together in one place. A firm may <b>centralize</b> some of its administrative accounting and marketing activities.
<u>commanding</u>	(of a place or position) dominating from above; giving a wide view of an area. A <b>commanding</b> view of the ocean.
confirm	Administer the rite of confirmation to. Two recent experiences have <b>confirm</b> ed me in this view.
coordinator	Someone whose task is to see that work goes harmoniously. A full time <b>coordinator</b> was appointed to oversee the referral process.

<u>dominance</u>	The predominance of one or more species in a plant or animal community. All had in conformity with the principle of <b>dominance</b> round seeds with yellow cotyledons.
dominate	Look down on. A picturesque city <b>dominate</b> d by the cathedral tower.
dominated	Harassed by persistent nagging.
domineer	Rule or exercise power over (somebody) in a cruel and autocratic manner. She doesn t <b>domineer</b> preferring to lead by inspiration rather than by intimidation.

legislative	Relating to a legislature or composed of members of a legislature. <i>Legislative</i> proposals.
mighty	(Southern regional intensive) very; to a great degree. Struck a <b>mighty</b> blow.
<u>oppressive</u>	Inflicting harsh and authoritarian treatment. <i>Oppressive</i> sorrows.
potency	Capacity to produce strong physiological or chemical effects. <i>The toxin s <b>potency</b></i> .
potentate	A ruler who is unconstrained by law.
predominate	Have or exert control or power. Hispanics <b>predominate</b> in this neighborhood.
prescriptive	Relating to the imposition or enforcement of a rule or method. For her own mother she felt no more than a <b>prescriptive</b> affection.
<u>prevail</u>	Be widespread or current in a particular area or at a particular time. She was <b>prevail</b> ed upon to give an account of her work.
puissant	Having great power or influence. <i>He would become a <b>puissant</b> man.</i>
reassert	Assert again. He moved quickly to <b>reassert</b> his control.



reign	The period during which a monarch is sovereign. He was helpless under the <b>reign</b> of his egotism.
<u>ruler</u>	A person who rules or commands.
superintendence	The management or arrangement of an activity or organization; supervision. <i>Under his vigilant <b>superintendence</b> a building was erected.</i>
<u>supremacy</u>	The state or condition of being superior to all others in authority, power, or status. The <b>supremacy</b> of the king.
