### **Definitions of "Dogmatic" as an adjective**

- *Characterized by assertion of unproved or unprovable principles.*
- *Inclined to lay down principles as undeniably true.*
- *Relating to or involving dogma.*
- *Of or pertaining to or characteristic of a doctrine or code of beliefs accepted as authoritative.*



## Synonyms of "Dogmatic" as an adjective (26 Words)

### adamant

Impervious to pleas, persuasion, requests, reason- W.Churchill.  
*He is **adamant** in his refusal to change his mind.*

### arrogant

Having or revealing an exaggerated sense of one's own importance or abilities.  
*He s **arrogant** and opinionated.*

### assertive

Having or showing a confident and forceful personality.  
*Pointing directly at a listener is an **assertive** act.*

### **authoritarian**

Favouring or enforcing strict obedience to authority at the expense of personal freedom.  
*An **authoritarian** regime.*

### **authoritative**

Having authority or ascendancy or influence.  
*His voice was calm and **authoritative**.*

### **dictatorial**

Of or characteristic of a dictator.  
*A **dictatorial** regime.*

<b>doctrinaire</b>	Seeking to impose a doctrine in all circumstances without regard to practical considerations. <i>The administration s <b>doctrinaire</b> economic policy.</i>
<b>dogmatical</b>	Characterized by assertion of unproved or unprovable principles.
<b>domineering</b>	Tending to domineer. <i>How can I do my job with a <b>domineering</b> boss yelling in my ear.</i>
<u><b>emphatic</b></u>	(of certain Arabic consonants) pronounced with both dental articulation and constriction of the pharynx. <i>An <b>emphatic</b> no.</i>
<u><b>entrenched</b></u>	(of an attitude, habit, or belief) firmly established and difficult or unlikely to change; ingrained. <i>An <b>entrenched</b> resistance to change.</i>
<b>high-handed</b>	Given to haughty disregard of others.
<u><b>imperative</b></u>	Relating to verbs in the imperative mood. <i>Immediate action was <b>imperative</b>.</i>
<b>imperious</b>	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy. <i>His <b>imperious</b> demands.</i>
<b>inflexible</b>	Not able to be changed or adapted to particular circumstances. <i><b>Inflexible</b> rules.</i>
<u><b>insistent</b></u>	Demanding attention- H.L.Mencken. <i>She was very <b>insistent</b> that I call her.</i>
<b>opinionated</b>	Obstinate in your opinions. <i>An arrogant and <b>opinionated</b> man.</i>
<u><b>overbearing</b></u>	Expecting unquestioning obedience. <i>Insufferably <b>overbearing</b> behavior toward the waiter.</i>
<b>peremptory</b>	Insisting on immediate attention or obedience, especially in a brusquely imperious way. <i>Spoke in <b>peremptory</b> tones.</i>
<b>pontifical</b>	Denoting or governed by or relating to a bishop or bishops. <i>A <b>pontifical</b> commission.</i>
<b>rigid</b>	Not adaptable in outlook, belief, or response. <i>A table made of <b>rigid</b> plastic.</i>
<b>unbending</b>	Reserved, formal, or strict in one's behaviour or attitudes; austere and inflexible. <i>An <b>unbending</b> will to dominate.</i>

<b>unchallengeable</b>	Not open to challenge. <i>A position of <b>unchallengeable</b> supremacy.</i>
<b>uncompromising</b>	Not making concessions. <i>The <b>uncompromising</b> ugliness of the era's buildings.</i>
<b>unquestionable</b>	Not able to be disputed or doubted. <i>His musicianship is <b>unquestionable</b>.</i>
<b>unyielding</b>	Stubbornly unyielding T S Eliot. <i>The Atlantic hurled its waves at the <b>unyielding</b> rocks.</i>

## Associations of "Dogmatic" (30 Words)

<b>ascendancy</b>	Occupation of a position of dominant power or influence. <i>The poor have a moral <b>ascendancy</b> over the rich.</i>
<b>authority</b>	A person or organization having political or administrative power and control. <i>He hit the ball with <b>authority</b>.</i>
<b>cavalier</b>	A gallant or courtly gentleman. <i>Anne was irritated by his <b>cavalier</b> attitude.</i>
<b>centralize</b>	Bring (activities or processes) together in one place. <i>A firm may <b>centralize</b> some of its administrative accounting and marketing activities.</i>
<b>commanding</b>	(of a place or position) dominating from above; giving a wide view of an area. <i>A <b>commanding</b> view of the ocean.</i>
<b>confirm</b>	Administer the rite of confirmation to. <i>Two recent experiences have <b>confirmed</b> me in this view.</i>
<b>coordinator</b>	Someone whose task is to see that work goes harmoniously. <i>A full time <b>coordinator</b> was appointed to oversee the referral process.</i>
<b>dictator</b>	(in ancient Rome) a chief magistrate with absolute power, appointed in an emergency. <i>My boss is a <b>dictator</b> who makes everyone work overtime.</i>

<b><u>dominance</u></b>	The predominance of one or more species in a plant or animal community. <i>All had in conformity with the principle of <b>dominance</b> round seeds with yellow cotyledons.</i>
<b>dominate</b>	Look down on. <i>A picturesque city <b>dominated</b> by the cathedral tower.</i>
<b>dominated</b>	Harassed by persistent nagging.
<b>domineer</b>	Rule or exercise power over (somebody) in a cruel and autocratic manner. <i>She doesn't <b>domineer</b> preferring to lead by inspiration rather than by intimidation.</i>
<b>domineering</b>	Tending to domineer. <i>How can I do my job with a <b>domineering</b> boss yelling in my ear.</i>
<b>imperious</b>	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy. <i>His <b>imperious</b> demands.</i>
<b>jurisdiction</b>	(law) the right and power to interpret and apply the law. <i>Several different tax <b>jurisdictions</b>.</i>
<b>legislative</b>	Relating to a legislature or composed of members of a legislature. <i><b>Legislative</b> proposals.</i>
<b>mighty</b>	(Southern regional intensive) very; to a great degree. <i>Struck a <b>mighty</b> blow.</i>
<b><u>oppressive</u></b>	Inflicting harsh and authoritarian treatment. <i><b>Oppressive</b> sorrows.</i>
<b>potency</b>	Capacity to produce strong physiological or chemical effects. <i>The toxin's <b>potency</b>.</i>
<b>potentate</b>	A ruler who is unconstrained by law.
<b>predominate</b>	Have or exert control or power. <i>Hispanics <b>predominate</b> in this neighborhood.</i>
<b>prescriptive</b>	Relating to the imposition or enforcement of a rule or method. <i>For her own mother she felt no more than a <b>prescriptive</b> affection.</i>
<b><u>prevail</u></b>	Be widespread or current in a particular area or at a particular time. <i>She was <b>prevailed</b> upon to give an account of her work.</i>
<b>puissant</b>	Having great power or influence. <i>He would become a <b>puissant</b> man.</i>
<b>reassert</b>	Assert again. <i>He moved quickly to <b>reassert</b> his control.</i>

- reign** The period during which a monarch is sovereign.  
*He was helpless under the **reign** of his egotism.*
- ruler** A person who rules or commands.
- superintendence** The management or arrangement of an activity or organization;  
supervision.  
*Under his vigilant **superintendence** a building was erected.*
- supremacy** The state or condition of being superior to all others in authority, power,  
or status.  
*The **supremacy** of the king.*
