<b>handout</b>	A quantity of financial or other material aid given to a person or organization. <i>Dependence on central government <b>handouts</b>.</i>
<b>insurance money</b>	Protection against future loss.
<b>offering</b>	The verbal act of offering. <i><b>Offerings</b> during Lent will always be gratefully received.</i>
<b>pogey</b>	Unemployment or welfare benefit. <i>So you want me to end up on <b>pogey</b>.</i>
<b>pogy</b>	Any of various large surfperches, especially the redbtail surfperch, <i>Amphistichus rhodotus</i> , of the Pacific coast.
<b>presentation</b>	A visual representation of something. <i>A sales <b>presentation</b>.</i>
<b>public assistance allowance</b>	A body of people sharing some common interest.
<b>social security</b>	A party of people assembled to promote sociability and communal activity.



**social security payments**

A party of people assembled to promote sociability and communal activity.

**state benefit**

The three traditional states of matter are solids (fixed shape and volume) and liquids (fixed volume and shaped by the container) and gases (filling the container).

**unemployment benefit**

The state of being unemployed or not having a job.

**welfare**

Statutory procedure or social effort designed to promote the basic physical and material well-being of people in need.  
*The protection of rights to education housing and **welfare**.*

## Synonyms of "Dole" as a verb (15 Words)

<b>allocate</b>	Distribute according to a plan or set apart for a special purpose. <i>In past years we didn't <b>allocate</b> enough funds to infrastructure maintenance.</i>
<b>allot</b>	Allow to have. <i>Equal time was <b>allotted</b> to each.</i>
<b><u>apportion</u></b>	Assign. <i>They did not <b>apportion</b> blame or liability to any one individual.</i>
<b>assign</b>	Give an assignment to a person to a post or assign a task to a person. <i>The teacher <b>assigned</b> him to lead his classmates in the exercise.</i>
<b>deal out</b>	Give out as one's portion or share.
<b>disburse</b>	Pay out (money from a fund). <i>67 million of the pledged aid had already been <b>disbursed</b>.</i>
<b>dispense</b>	Give or apply (medications). <i>Let's <b>dispense</b> with the formalities shall we.</i>
<b>distribute</b>	Distribute or disperse widely. <i>The journal is <b>distributed</b> worldwide.</i>
<b>divide up</b>	Come apart.
<b>give out</b>	Bestow, especially officially.
<b>hand out</b>	Place into the hands or custody of.
<b>issue</b>	Make out and issue. <i>Water <b>issued</b> from the hole in the wall.</i>
<b>pass out</b>	Pass into a specified state or condition.
<b>pass round</b>	Move past.
<b>share out</b>	Give out as one's portion or share.

<b>deflation</b>	The action or process of deflating or being deflated. <i>The <b>deflation</b> of the illusion that the 1960s were a perpetual party.</i>
<b>earnings</b>	Income derived from an investment or product. <i>They saved a quarter of all their <b>earnings</b>.</i>
<b>emolument</b>	A salary, fee, or profit from employment or office. <i>The directors <b>emoluments</b>.</i>
<b>employer</b>	A person or organization that employs people. <i>The National Health Service was the largest <b>employer</b> in Europe.</i>
<b>financially</b>	From a financial point of view. <i>The company is now <b>financially</b> stable.</i>
<b>idle</b>	Be idle exist in a changeless situation. <i><b>Idle</b> funds.</i>
<b>installment</b>	A part of a published serial.
<b>insurance</b>	Money paid out as compensation under an insurance policy. <i>When will I be able to collect the <b>insurance</b>.</i>
<b>invoice</b>	Send an invoice for goods or services provided. <i>She <b>invoiced</b> the company for her expenses.</i>
<b>need</b>	A fitting reward. <i>He must extract from her some <b>need</b> of approbation.</i>
<b>overtime</b>	Payment for overtime. <i>Fewer opportunities for <b>overtime</b>.</i>
<b>paid</b>	Marked by the reception of pay. <i>A <b>paid</b> informer.</i>
<b>pay</b>	Something that remunerates. <i>How much does this savings certificate <b>pay</b> annually.</i>
<b>payment</b>	The action or process of paying someone or something or of being paid. <i>Three interest free monthly <b>payments</b>.</i>
<b>receivable</b>	Able to be received. <i>Accounts <b>receivable</b>.</i>
<b>remuneration</b>	Something that remunerates. <i>They work in excess of their contracted hours for no additional <b>remuneration</b>.</i>



<b>salary</b>	Pay a salary to. <i>He received a <b>salary</b> of 24 000.</i>
<b>taxation</b>	Government income due to taxation. <i>It should be financed out of <b>taxation</b>.</i>
<b>unemployed</b>	(of a thing) not in use. <i>You have to put your left foot under the clutch when it is <b>unemployed</b>.</i>
<b>unemployment</b>	The number or proportion of unemployed people. <i>The rate of <b>unemployment</b> is an indicator of the health of an economy.</i>
<b>unremunerative</b>	Bringing little or no profit or income. <i>An <b>unremunerative</b> occupation.</i>
<b>wage</b>	Carry on (wars, battles, or campaigns). <i>We were struggling to get better <b>wages</b>.</i>
<b>worker</b>	A person who works hard. <i>He was a bogus <b>worker</b> of miracles.</i>
