public assistance allowance	A body of people sharing some common interest.
social security	A party of people assembled to promote sociability and communal activity.

state benefit

The three traditional states of matter are solids (fixed shape and volume) and liquids (fixed volume and shaped by the container) and gases (filling the container).

unemployment benefit

The state of being unemployed or not having a job.

welfare

*The protection of rights to education housing and **welfare**.*

allocate	Distribute according to a plan or set apart for a special purpose. <i>In past years we didn't allocate enough funds to infrastructure maintenance.</i>
allot	Allow to have. <i>Equal time was allotted to each.</i>
apportion	Assign. <i>They did not apportion blame or liability to any one individual.</i>
assign	Give an assignment to a person to a post or assign a task to a person. <i>The teacher assigned him to lead his classmates in the exercise.</i>
deal out	Give out as one's portion or share.
disburse	Pay out (money from a fund). <i>67 million of the pledged aid had already been disbursed.</i>
dispense	Give or apply (medications). <i>Let's dispense with the formalities shall we.</i>
distribute	Distribute or disperse widely. <i>The journal is distributed worldwide.</i>
divide up	Come apart.
give out	Bestow, especially officially.
hand out	Place into the hands or custody of.
issue	Make out and issue. <i>Water issued from the hole in the wall.</i>
pass out	Pass into a specified state or condition.
pass round	Move past.
share out	Give out as one's portion or share.

employer	A person or organization that employs people. <i>The National Health Service was the largest employer in Europe.</i>
financially	From a financial point of view. <i>The company is now financially stable.</i>
idle	Be idle exist in a changeless situation. <i>Idle funds.</i>
installment	A part of a published serial.
insurance	Money paid out as compensation under an insurance policy. <i>When will I be able to collect the insurance.</i>
invoice	Send an invoice for goods or services provided. <i>She invoiced the company for her expenses.</i>
meed	A fitting reward. <i>He must extract from her some meed of approbation.</i>
overtime	Payment for overtime. <i>Fewer opportunities for overtime.</i>
paid	Marked by the reception of pay. <i>A paid informer.</i>
pay	Something that remunerates. <i>How much does this savings certificate pay annually.</i>
payment	The action or process of paying someone or something or of being paid. <i>Three interest free monthly payments.</i>
receivable	Able to be received. <i>Accounts receivable.</i>
remuneration	Something that remunerates. <i>They work in excess of their contracted hours for no additional remuneration.</i>

salary	Pay a salary to. <i>He received a salary of 24 000.</i>
taxation	Government income due to taxation. <i>It should be financed out of taxation.</i>
unemployed	(of a thing) not in use. <i>You have to put your left foot under the clutch when it is unemployed.</i>
unemployment	The number or proportion of unemployed people. <i>The rate of unemployment is an indicator of the health of an economy.</i>
unremunerative	Bringing little or no profit or income. <i>An unremunerative occupation.</i>
wage	Carry on (wars, battles, or campaigns). <i>We were struggling to get better wages.</i>
worker	A person who works hard. <i>He was a bogus worker of miracles.</i>
