cleaner	A device for cleaning such as a vacuum cleaner. <i>She s one of the office cleaners.</i>
daily help	A newspaper that is published every day.
domestic help	A servant who is paid to perform menial tasks around the household.
domestic servant	A servant who is paid to perform menial tasks around the household.
domestic worker	A servant who is paid to perform menial tasks around the household.
home help	Base consisting of a rubber slab where the batter stands; it must be touched by a base runner in order to score.
house servant	A building where theatrical performances or motion-picture shows can be presented.
housekeeper	A person employed to perform cleaning and other domestic tasks in a hotel or institution.

housemaid	A female domestic employee, especially one who cleans reception rooms and bedrooms.
<u>maid</u>	A female domestic. <i>Mary eventually managed to find a job as a maid.</i>
<u>menial</u>	A person with a menial job.
<u>servant</u>	A devoted and helpful follower or supporter. <i>He was a great servant of the Labour Party.</i>

Definitions of "Domestic" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "domestic" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Of concern to or concerning the internal affairs of a nation.*
- *Of or for use in the home rather than in an industrial or office environment.*
- *Of or relating to the home.*
- *(of a person) fond of family life and running a home.*
- *Relating to the running of a home or to family relations.*
- *Existing or occurring inside a particular country; not foreign or international.*

- *(of an animal) tame and kept by humans.*
- *Produced in a particular country.*
- *Converted or adapted to domestic use.*
- *Of or involving the home or family.*

home	Made done or intended for use in the home. Home fans.
home-loving	Devoted to home duties and pleasures.
housewifely	Related or suited to a housewife. Housewifely virtues.
<u>indigenous</u>	Originating where it is found. Coriander is indigenous to southern Europe.
interior	Inside and toward a center. Interior decoration.
<u>internal</u>	Of or situated on the inside. Internal party maneuvering.
<u>local</u>	Of or belonging to or characteristic of a particular locality or neighborhood. Local anesthesia.
<u>national</u>	Of or relating to nationality. A national newspaper.
<u>native</u>	Used in names of animals or plants resembling others familiar elsewhere e g native bee. My native land.
not foreign	Not belonging to that in which it is contained; introduced from an outside source.
not international	From or between other countries.
not wild	Talking or behaving irrationally.
pet	Preferred above all others and treated with partiality.
<u>private</u>	Concerning things deeply private and personal. Private family matters.
stay-at-home	Used of your own ground.
tame	Not exciting, adventurous, or controversial. A tame Christmas party.
trained	Shaped or conditioned or disciplined by training; often used as a combining form. Trained volunteers provide a sympathetic ear and friendly advice.

borough	A town or district which is an administrative unit.
comfort	A freedom from financial difficulty that promotes a comfortable state. <i>The victim was comforted by friends before being taken to hospital.</i>
<u>consolation</u>	A person or thing providing consolation. <i>Second place was no consolation to him.</i>
county	A sporting team playing for a county. <i>A county grande dame.</i>

district	An area of a country or city, especially one characterized by a particular feature or activity. <i>A district health authority.</i>
domesticity	Home or family life. <i>Making a hobby of domesticity.</i>
domicile	Law the residence where you have your permanent home or principal establishment and to where whenever you are absent you intend to return every person is compelled to have one and only one domicile at a time. <i>His wife has a domicile of origin in Germany.</i>
dwelling	Housing that someone is living in. <i>The proposed dwelling is out of keeping with those nearby.</i>
ergonomic	Of or relating to ergonomics. <i>The ergonomic hazards of computer use.</i>
family	(biology) a taxonomic group containing one or more genera. <i>The family home.</i>
habitable	Fit for habitation. <i>The habitable world.</i>
habitation	A house or home. <i>He built his habitation close to the river.</i>
home	At or to or in the direction of one's home or family. <i>A home win.</i>
household	The establishment and affairs of a royal household. <i>It was a good Christian household.</i>
lightweight	A lightweight boxer or other competitor. <i>A lightweight intellect.</i>
local	A local train or bus service. <i>A pint in the local.</i>
locality	The position or site of something. <i>It is a rugged locality.</i>
manor	The landed estate of a lord (including the house on it). <i>The right to mine ores within the manor of Little Langdale.</i>
metropolitan	Relating to or denoting a metropolitan or his see. <i>A sophisticated metropolitan.</i>
municipal	Relating or belonging to or characteristic of a municipality. <i>National and municipal elections.</i>

<u>national</u>	Owned or maintained for the public by the national government. <i>Plans for a national art library.</i>
<u>neighborhood</u>	People living near one another. <i>He always blames someone else in the immediate neighborhood.</i>
portable	A small transportable building used as a classroom. <i>Portable versions of IBM s Systems Network Architecture technology.</i>
<u>reside</u>	Be situated. <i>The meaning of an utterance does not wholly reside in the semantic meaning.</i>
resident	A medical graduate engaged in specialized practice under supervision in a hospital. <i>Resident mute swans and wintering Bewick s swans.</i>
<u>sheltered</u>	Protected from danger or bad weather. <i>The plants need a shady sheltered spot in the garden.</i>
<u>solace</u>	Give moral or emotional strength to. <i>The soundlessness of nature impressed and solaced her.</i>
tame	Very restrained or quiet. <i>A big field of tame hay.</i>
