<b>college tutor</b>	An institution of higher education created to educate and grant degrees; often a part of a university.
<b>don river</b>	The head of an organized crime family.
<b>father</b>	A male parent also used as a term of address to your father. <i>They assumed that I was the <b>father</b> of the child.</i>
<b><u>fellow</u></b>	A member of a learned society. <i>The page has been torn away from its <b>fellows</b>.</i>
<b>lector</b>	A public lecturer at certain universities.
<b>lecturer</b>	A public lecturer at certain universities. <i>A senior <b>lecturer</b> in surgery at Leeds University.</i>

<b>preceptor</b>	Teacher at a university or college (especially at Cambridge or Oxford).
<b>professor</b>	An associate professor or an assistant professor. <i>The <b>professors</b> of true religion.</i>
<b>reader</b>	A proofreader. <i>A meter <b>reader</b>.</i>
<b>scholar</b>	A student who holds a scholarship. <i>Mr Bell declares himself no <b>scholar</b>.</i>
<b>university lecturer</b>	The body of faculty and students at a university.
<b>university teacher</b>	The body of faculty and students at a university.

## Synonyms of "Don" as a verb (4 Words)

**assume** Take or begin to have (power or responsibility).  
*I **assume** his train was late.*

**get into** Acquire as a result of some effort or action.

**put on** Cause (someone) to undergo something.

**wear** Have in one's aspect wear an expression of one's attitude or personality.  
*Any British registered boat may **wear** the red ensign.*

## Associations of "Don" (30 Words)

<b>apparel</b>	Embroidered ornamentation on ecclesiastical vestments. <i>She was refined in her choice of <b>apparel</b>.</i>
<b>arranged</b>	Deliberately arranged for effect. <i>An <b>arranged</b> marriage.</i>
<b><u>attire</u></b>	Clothing of a distinctive style or for a particular occasion. <i>Lady Agatha was <b>attired</b> in an elaborate evening gown.</i>
<b>caparison</b>	Put a caparison on. <i>His horse was <b>caparisoned</b> with coloured ribbons.</i>
<b>clad</b>	Covered with cladding. <i>Armor <b>clad</b>.</i>
<b>cleanly</b>	Habitually clean and careful to avoid dirt. <i>She played the piano accompaniment <b>cleanly</b>.</i>
<b>clothed</b>	Wearing or provided with clothing; sometimes used in combination- Bible. <i>Proud of her well <b>clothed</b> family.</i>
<b>clothes</b>	Bedclothes. <i>He always bought his <b>clothes</b> at the same store.</i>
<b>clothing</b>	A covering designed to be worn on a person's body. <i>Bring warm <b>clothing</b> and waterproofs.</i>
<b><u>costume</u></b>	Furnish with costumes as for a film or play. <i>Dancers in national <b>costume</b>.</i>
<b>decorated</b>	Provided with something intended to increase its beauty or distinction.
<b><u>dress</u></b>	Clean treat or apply a dressing to a wound. <i>Can the child <b>dress</b> by herself.</i>
<b><u>dressed</u></b>	Dressed in fancy or formal clothing. <i><b>Dressed</b> crab.</i>
<b><u>equip</u></b>	Provide with (something) usually for a specific purpose. <i>The expedition was <b>equipped</b> with proper clothing food and other necessities.</i>
<b>fit</b>	Make fit. <i>A close <b>fit</b> between teachers qualifications and their teaching responsibilities.</i>
<b>footwear</b>	Covering for a person's feet.
<b>garment</b>	An item of clothing. <i>Fashion <b>garments</b>.</i>

<b>laundry</b>	The action or process of washing clothes and linen. <i>I spent most of my weekend doing <b>laundry</b>.</i>
<b>masquerade</b>	A costume worn as a disguise at a masquerade party. <i>Idle gossip that <b>masquerades</b> as news.</i>
<b>neatly</b>	In a neat way. <i>She <b>neatly</b> sidestepped the question.</i>
<b>outfit</b>	Provide with equipment. <i>A first aid <b>outfit</b>.</i>
<b>sandal</b>	A shoe consisting of a sole fastened by straps to the foot. <i>They were dressed in open toed <b>sandals</b>.</i>
<b>skimpy</b>	Containing little excess. <i>A <b>skimpy</b> allowance.</i>
<b>suit</b>	Slang a businessman dressed in a business suit. <i>They buried him in his best <b>suit</b>.</i>
<b>swimsuit</b>	A woman's one-piece swimming costume.
<b>toga</b>	A loose flowing outer garment worn by the citizens of ancient Rome, made of a single piece of cloth and covering the whole body apart from the right arm.
<b>underwear</b>	Undergarment worn next to the skin and under the outer garments.
<b>uniform</b>	Denoting a garment forming part of a person's uniform. <i>The guards were <b>uniformed</b>.</i>
<b>uniformed</b>	Wearing a uniform. <i><b>Uniformed</b> policemen lined the President's route.</i>
<b>wear</b>	The wearing of something or the state of being worn as clothing. <i>Mountains are <b>wearing</b> down with each passing second.</i>
