# Synonyms of "Doom" as a noun (10 Words)

catastrophe	An event causing great and usually sudden damage or suffering; a disaster. An environmental <b>catastrophe</b> .
day of reckoning	The time after sunrise and before sunset while it is light outside.
destruction	A cause of someone's ruin. Gambling was his <b>destruction</b> .
disaster	Denoting a genre of films that use natural or accidental catastrophe as the mainspring of plot and setting. <i>His policies were a <b>disaster</b></i> .
doomsday	An unpleasant or disastrous destiny. Bede believed that the time of <b>doomsday</b> is concealed from mankind.
<u>downfall</u>	A sudden decline in strength or number or importance. <i>His intractability will prove to be his <b>downfall</b>.</i>
end of the world	The last section of a communication.



rack and ruin	A form of torture in which pain is inflicted by stretching the body.
ruin	A ruined building. The financial cost could mean <b>ruin</b> .
ruination	Destruction achieved by causing something to be wrecked or ruined. <i>Commercial malpractice causes the <b>ruination</b> of thousands of people.</i>



### Usage Examples of "Doom" as a noun

- The aircraft was sent crashing to its doom in the water.
- A day like that of the last doom.
- Everyone was aware of the approaching doom but was helpless to avoid it.





## Doom as a Verb

### Definitions of "Doom" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "doom" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Decree or designate beforehand.
- Cause to have an unfortunate and inescapable outcome.
- Condemn to certain death or destruction.
- Make certain of the failure or destruction of.
- Pronounce a sentence on (somebody) in a court of law.






# Synonyms of "Doom" as a verb (13 Words)

<u>condemn</u>	Officially declare (something) to be unfit for use. The pool has been <b>condemn</b> ed as a health hazard.
<u>consign</u>	Send to an address. <i>He <b>consign</b>ed three paintings to Sotheby s.</i>
<u>designate</u>	Decree or designate beforehand. He was <b>designate</b> d as prime minister.
destine	Design or destine. She was <b>destine</b> d to become a great pianist.
<u>fate</u>	Be destined to happen, turn out, or act in a particular way. <i>The regime was</i> <b>fate</b> <i>d to end badly.</i>
foredoom	Doom beforehand. The policy is <b>foredoom</b> ed to failure.
foreordain	Foreordain by divine will or decree. Progress is not <b>foreordain</b> ed.



Mean or intend to express or convey. The water shortage <b>mean</b> s that we have to stop taking long showers.
Order by virtue of superior authority; decree. The minister was <b>ordain</b> ed only last month.
Foreordain by divine will or decree. Calvinists believed that every person was <b>predestine</b> d by God to go to heaven or to hell.
Foreordain or determine beforehand. You might think the company s success was <b>preordain</b> ed.
Pronounce a sentence on somebody in a court of law. Ten army officers were <b>sentence</b> d to life imprisonment.








### Usage Examples of "Doom" as a verb

- This decision will doom me to lose my position.
- Fuel was spilling out of the damaged wing and the aircraft was doomed.
- Her plan was doomed to failure.



# Associations of "Doom" (30 Words)

bier	A coffin along with its stand. We followed the <b>bier</b> to the graveyard.
casualty	A decrease of military personnel or equipment. <i>The Insurers acquire all the Policyholder s rights in respect of the <b>casualty</b> <i>which caused the loss.</i></i>



<u>cemetery</u>	A tract of land used for burials. A military <b>cemetery</b> .
<u>dead</u>	Exactly. Was <b>dead</b> tired.
death	The personification of death. It was the <b>death</b> of all his plans.
<u>decease</u>	Pass from physical life and lose all bodily attributes and functions necessary to sustain life. Upon your <b>decease</b> the capital will pass to your grandchildren.
deceased	The recently dead person in question. The will of Christopher Smith <b>deceased</b> .
<u>demise</u>	Transfer by a lease or by a will. <i>The <b>demise</b>d property.</i>
destine	Design or destine. She was <b>destine</b> d to become a great pianist.
die	A cutting tool that is fitted into a diestock and used for cutting male external screw threads on screws or bolts or pipes or rods. <i>The car</i> <b>die</b> <i>d</i> on the road.
fabled	Celebrated in fable or legend. The <b>fabled</b> kingdom.
<u>fate</u>	The ultimate agency regarded as predetermining the course of events (often personified as a woman. <i>Fate</i> decided his course for him.
funeral	A sermon delivered at a funeral. <i>Her <b>funeral</b> had to pass.</i>
holocaust	An act of mass destruction and loss of life (especially in war or by fire. <i>A nuclear holocaust.</i>
<u>impending</u>	(of an event regarded as threatening or significant) about to happen; forthcoming. A fortune teller with dire warnings about <b>impending</b> doom.
inter	Place (a corpse) in a grave or tomb, typically with funeral rites. <i>He was <b>inter</b>red with the military honours due to him.</i>
intestacy	The situation of being or dying without a legally valid will.
intestate	A person who has died without having made a will. <i>Intestate property.</i>



misadventure	Death caused by a person accidentally while performing a legal act without negligence or intent to harm. The coroner recorded a verdict of death by <b>misadventure</b> .
mortal	Very great. A <b>mortal</b> illness.
<u>mortality</u>	The state of being subject to death. Post operative <b>mortality</b> was 90 per cent for some operations.
mortician	An undertaker.
mortuary	A building (or room) where dead bodies are kept before burial or cremation. A <b>mortuary</b> temple.
perish	Be suffering from extreme cold. I was <b>perish</b> ed with cold before the end of the day.
quietus	Euphemisms for death (based on an analogy between lying in a bed and in a tomb.
sepulchral	Suited to or suggestive of a grave or burial. The <b>sepulchral</b> darkness of the catacombs.
tombstone	A stone that is used to mark a grave. Thrill seeking lads <b>tombstone</b> d off the rocks.
<u>unfortunate</u>	Not indicating a good chance of success; inauspicious. The delay at the airport was an <b>unfortunate</b> start to our holiday.
unfortunately	By bad luck. <b>Unfortunately</b> it rained all day.
unlucky	Having, bringing, or resulting from bad luck. Friday the 13th is an <b>unlucky</b> date.
