attack	Attack someone physically or emotionally. <i>Crystal Palace attacked swiftly down the left.</i>
background	Form a background to. <i>Windswept land backgrounded by the Rockies.</i>
belittle	Cause to seem less serious; play down. <i>Don t belittle his influence.</i>

cast aspersions on	Deposit.
criticize	Find fault with; express criticism of; point out real or perceived flaws. <i>A literary text may be criticized on two grounds the semantic and the expressive.</i>
decry	Publicly denounce. <i>They decried human rights abuses.</i>
defame	Charge falsely or with malicious intent. <i>He claimed that the article defamed his family.</i>
deflate	Become deflated or flaccid as by losing air. <i>He deflated one of the tyres.</i>
denigrate	Charge falsely or with malicious intent. <i>Doom and gloom merchants who denigrate their own country.</i>
deprecate	Express strong disapproval of; deplore. <i>What I deprecate is persistent indulgence.</i>
detract from	Take away a part from; diminish.
diminish	Cause to seem less impressive or valuable. <i>The trial has aged and diminished him.</i>
discredit	Harm the good reputation of. <i>This newspaper story discredits the politicians.</i>
disparage	Regard or represent as being of little worth. <i>He never missed an opportunity to disparage his competitors.</i>
downgrade	Reduce to a lower grade, rank, or level of importance. <i>Some jobs had gradually been downgraded from skilled to semi skilled.</i>
insult	Speak to or treat with disrespect or scornful abuse. <i>You re insulting the woman I love.</i>
minimise	Cause to seem less serious; play down.
minimize	Reduce (something, especially something undesirable) to the smallest possible amount or degree. <i>The aim is to minimize costs.</i>
play down	Participate in games or sport.
pour scorn on	Rain heavily.
run down	Be affected by; be subjected to.
slight	Raze or destroy (a fortification). <i>A Council determined whether the Fort should be kept or slighted.</i>
speak evil of	Use language.

speak ill of	Give a speech to.
understate	Describe or represent (something) as being smaller or less good or important than it really is. <i>The press have understated the extent of the problem.</i>
vilify	Speak or write about in an abusively disparaging manner. <i>He has been vilified in the press.</i>

<u>compress</u>	Be squeezed or pressed together or into a smaller space. <i>She compressed her lips.</i>
condone	Accept (behaviour that is considered morally wrong or offensive). <i>The college cannot condone any behaviour that involves illicit drugs.</i>
connive	Encourage or assent to illegally or criminally. <i>She connived with a senior official to rig the results of last year s election.</i>
<u>contraction</u>	The process or result of becoming smaller or pressed together. <i>Goodbye is a contraction of God be with you.</i>
<u>crass</u>	Showing no intelligence or sensitivity. <i>An act of crass stupidity.</i>
decrease	Decrease in size extent or range. <i>The rate of decrease became greater.</i>
disparagingly	In a disparaging manner. <i>These mythological figures are described disparagingly as belonging only to a story.</i>
<u>disregard</u>	The action or state of paying no attention to something. <i>The body of evidence is too substantial to disregard.</i>
downgrade	An instance of reducing someone or something's rank, status, or level of importance. <i>Some jobs had gradually been downgraded from skilled to semi skilled.</i>
education	The United States federal department that administers all federal programs dealing with education including federal aid to educational institutions and students created 1979. <i>Petrus is a good workman it is an education to watch him.</i>

flatten	Humiliate or depress (someone). <i>Flatten a road.</i>
ignore	Fail to consider (something significant). <i>He ignored her outraged question.</i>
intelligence	Information in general; news. <i>British intelligence has secured numerous local informers.</i>
irrelevant	Not connected with or relevant to something. <i>Theory can sometimes be hastily dismissed as irrelevant to the classroom.</i>
lighthearted	Carefree and happy and lighthearted. <i>Her lighthearted nature.</i>
minimize	Represent as less significant or important. <i>Let s minimize the risk.</i>
neglect	The trait of neglecting responsibilities and lacking concern. <i>He neglected to write to her.</i>
obscurity	The state of being indistinct or indefinite for lack of adequate illumination. <i>He is too good a player to slide into obscurity.</i>
omit	Leave undone or leave out. <i>He was omitted from the second Test.</i>
overlook	Be oriented in a certain direction. <i>The apartment overlooks the Hudson.</i>
rebuff	Reject (someone or something) in an abrupt or ungracious manner. <i>I asked her to be my wife and was rebuffed in no uncertain terms.</i>
reduce	Reduce in scope while retaining essential elements. <i>The need for businesses to reduce costs.</i>
reducible	(of a subject or problem) capable of being simplified in presentation or analysis. <i>Shakespeare s major soliloquies are not reducible to categories.</i>
reduction	A thick and concentrated liquid or sauce made by boiling. <i>The reduction of classical genetics to molecular biology.</i>
scoff	Speak to someone or about something in a scornfully derisive or mocking way. <i>You a scientist he scoffed.</i>
snub	Reject outright and bluntly. <i>She snubbed his proposal.</i>

- understate** Represent as less significant or important.

- understatement** A statement that is restrained in ironic contrast to what might have been said.
*To say I am delighted is an **understatement**.*
- undervalue** Rate (something) insufficiently highly; fail to appreciate.
*Through overfamiliarity it is easy to **undervalue** this concerto.*
- vanish** Pass away rapidly.
*The effect **vanished** when day broke.*
