## Associations of "Downsides" (30 Words)

<b>backwards</b>	At or to or toward the back or rear. <i>Count <b>backwards</b> from twenty to ten.</i>
<a href="#">blemish</a>	Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective. <i>Her face was <b>blemished</b>.</i>
<a href="#">con</a>	Commit to memory; learn by heart. <i>I <b>conned</b> him into giving me your home number.</i>
<b>damage</b>	Suffer or be susceptible to damage. <i>The snow <b>damaged</b> the roof.</i>
<b>damaging</b>	(sometimes followed by `to') causing harm or injury. <i><b>Damaging</b> to career and reputation.</i>
<a href="#">deface</a>	Spoil the surface or appearance of (something), for example by drawing or writing on it. <i>He <b>defaced</b> library books.</i>
<b>defect</b>	A shortcoming, imperfection, or lack. <i>Genetic <b>defects</b>.</i>
<b>deficiency</b>	The amount by which something, especially revenue, falls short; a deficit. <i>Water is the critical <b>deficiency</b> in desert regions.</i>
<b>demerit</b>	A mark against a person for misconduct or failure; usually given in school or armed forces. <i>The merits and <b>demerits</b> of these proposals.</i>
<b>disadvantage</b>	Put at a disadvantage hinder harm. <i>Situations of serious social and economic <b>disadvantage</b>.</i>
<b>disfigure</b>	Spoil the appearance of. <i>The vandals <b>disfigured</b> the statue.</i>
<a href="#">drawback</a>	A feature that renders something less acceptable; a disadvantage or problem. <i>The main <b>drawback</b> of fitting catalytic converters is the cost.</i>

<b><u>error</u></b>	Part of a statement that is not correct. <i>The book was full of <b>errors</b>.</i>
<b>failing</b>	Failure to reach a minimum required performance. <i>Pride is a terrible <b>failing</b>.</i>
<b><u>fault</u></b>	Of a rock formation be broken by a fault or faults. <i>It was John s <b>fault</b>.</i>
<b>flaw</b>	Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective. <i>He had his <b>flaws</b> but he was great nonetheless.</i>
<b><u>flawed</u></b>	Having or characterized by a fundamental weakness or imperfection. <i>A <b>flawed</b> hero.</i>
<b><u>harm</u></b>	Cause or do harm to. <i>I can t see any <b>harm</b> in it.</i>
<b><u>inadequacy</u></b>	Unsatisfactoriness by virtue of being inadequate. <i>Juvenile offenses often reflect an <b>inadequacy</b> in the parents.</i>
<b>injury</b>	An accident that results in physical damage or hurt. <i>She suffered an <b>injury</b> to her back.</i>
<b>insufficiency</b>	A lack of competence. <i><b>Insufficiency</b> of adequate housing.</i>
<b>misconceive</b>	Interpret in the wrong way. <i>Criticism of the trade surplus in Washington is <b>misconceived</b>.</i>
<b><u>misunderstanding</u></b>	Putting the wrong interpretation on. <i>There must have been some kind of <b>misunderstanding</b>.</i>
<b>neurotoxin</b>	Any toxin that affects neural tissues.
<b>nitpick</b>	Be overly critical; criticize minor details. <i>The state is <b>nitpicking</b> about minor administrative matters.</i>
<b>problem</b>	Denoting or relating to people whose behaviour causes difficulties to themselves and others. <i>Motivation of staff can also be a <b>problem</b>.</i>
<b><u>shortcoming</u></b>	A fault or failure to meet a certain standard, typically in a person's character, a plan, or a system. <i>He is so forthright about his <b>shortcomings</b> it s hard to chastise him.</i>
<b>sideways</b>	(of movement) at an angle. <i>He would be moved <b>sideways</b> rather than demoted.</i>
<b>unforced</b>	Not resulting from undue effort; not forced. <i>An <b>unforced</b> cheerfulness.</i>
<b>upside</b>	An upward movement of share prices. <i><b>Upside</b> potential.</i>
