Associations of "Downsides" (30 Words)

backwards	At or to or toward the back or rear. <i>Count backwards from twenty to ten.</i>
blemish	Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective. <i>Her face was blemished.</i>
con	Commit to memory; learn by heart. <i>I conned him into giving me your home number.</i>
damage	Suffer or be susceptible to damage. <i>The snow damaged the roof.</i>
damaging	(sometimes followed by `to') causing harm or injury. <i>Damaging to career and reputation.</i>
deface	Spoil the surface or appearance of (something), for example by drawing or writing on it. <i>He defaced library books.</i>
defect	A shortcoming, imperfection, or lack. <i>Genetic defects.</i>
deficiency	The amount by which something, especially revenue, falls short; a deficit. <i>Water is the critical deficiency in desert regions.</i>
demerit	A mark against a person for misconduct or failure; usually given in school or armed forces. <i>The merits and demerits of these proposals.</i>
disadvantage	Put at a disadvantage hinder harm. <i>Situations of serious social and economic disadvantage.</i>
disfigure	Spoil the appearance of. <i>The vandals disfigured the statue.</i>
drawback	A feature that renders something less acceptable; a disadvantage or problem. <i>The main drawback of fitting catalytic converters is the cost.</i>

<u>error</u>	Part of a statement that is not correct. <i>The book was full of errors.</i>
failing	Failure to reach a minimum required performance. <i>Pride is a terrible failing.</i>
<u>fault</u>	Of a rock formation be broken by a fault or faults. <i>It was John s fault.</i>
flaw	Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective. <i>He had his flaws but he was great nonetheless.</i>
<u>flawed</u>	Having or characterized by a fundamental weakness or imperfection. <i>A flawed hero.</i>
<u>harm</u>	Cause or do harm to. <i>I can t see any harm in it.</i>
<u>inadequacy</u>	Unsatisfactoriness by virtue of being inadequate. <i>Juvenile offenses often reflect an inadequacy in the parents.</i>
injury	An accident that results in physical damage or hurt. <i>She suffered an injury to her back.</i>
insufficiency	A lack of competence. <i>Insufficiency of adequate housing.</i>
misconceive	Interpret in the wrong way. <i>Criticism of the trade surplus in Washington is misconceived.</i>
<u>misunderstanding</u>	Putting the wrong interpretation on. <i>There must have been some kind of misunderstanding.</i>
neurotoxin	Any toxin that affects neural tissues.
nitpick	Be overly critical; criticize minor details. <i>The state is nitpicking about minor administrative matters.</i>
problem	Denoting or relating to people whose behaviour causes difficulties to themselves and others. <i>Motivation of staff can also be a problem.</i>
<u>shortcoming</u>	A fault or failure to meet a certain standard, typically in a person's character, a plan, or a system. <i>He is so forthright about his shortcomings it s hard to chastise him.</i>
sideways	(of movement) at an angle. <i>He would be moved sideways rather than demoted.</i>
unforced	Not resulting from undue effort; not forced. <i>An unforced cheerfulness.</i>
upside	An upward movement of share prices. <i>Upside potential.</i>
