<b>electrifying</b>	Causing a surge of emotion or excitement. <i>She gave an <b>electrifying</b> performance.</i>
<b>emotional</b>	(of a person) having feelings that are easily excited and openly displayed. <i>He would become <b>emotional</b> over nothing at all.</i>
<b>emotive</b>	Characterized by emotion. <i>Animal experimentation is an <b>emotive</b> subject.</i>

<b>overripe</b>	Too ripe and beginning to turn soft. <i>An <b>overripe</b> melodrama.</i>

<b>thrilling</b>	Causing excitement and pleasure; exhilarating. <i>A <b>thrilling</b> wind blew off the frozen lake.</i>
<b>tidy</b>	Neat and tidy. <i>She was a <b>tidy</b> little girl.</i>
<b>uncommon</b>	Marked by an uncommon quality especially superlative or extreme of its kind J R Lowell. <i>He owed his greatest debt to his mother s <b>uncommon</b> character and ability.</i>
<b>unexpected</b>	Not expected or regarded as likely to happen. <i><b>Unexpected</b> news.</i>
<b>unreal</b>	Lacking material form or substance unreal. <i>The fantastically <b>unreal</b> world of government bureaucracy.</i>

<b>irresistible</b>	Overpoweringly attractive. <i>He found the delicious looking cakes <b>irresistible</b>.</i>
<b>peak</b>	The pointed top of a mountain. <i>He climbed his last Swiss <b>peak</b> at the age of 80.</i>
<b>reverse</b>	Reverse the position order relation or condition of. <i>The lorry <b>reversed</b> into the back of a bus.</i>
<b>saintliness</b>	The quality of resembling a saint. <i>Her selfless behaviour borders on <b>saintliness</b>.</i>
