

terrifying Causing extreme fear.

awe Capacity to inspire awe.

He stared over the edge with a feeling of **awe**.

chilling The process of becoming cooler; a falling temperature.

A **chilling** account of the prisoners fate.

claustrophobia Extreme or irrational fear of confined places.

a The small stuffy room had begun to give him **claustrophobia**.

dreadful (of a person) unwell or troubled.

You re a **dreadful** flirt.

Be afraid or feel anxious or apprehensive about a possible or probable

fear situation or event.

We should not **fear** the Communists.

fearfulness An emotion experienced in anticipation of some specific pain or danger

(usually accompanied by a desire to flee or fight.

fearsome Causing fear or dread or terror.

fright Frighten.

I got the **fright** of my life seeing her in the hotel.

frighten Drive out by frightening.
