abominable	Causing moral revulsion. <i>The uprising was suppressed with abominable cruelty.</i>
atrocious	Provoking horror. <i>Murder is an atrocious crime.</i>
awful	Inspiring awe or admiration or wonder. <i>I look awful in a swimsuit.</i>
bad	Feeling physical discomfort or pain though is occasionally used colloquially for bad. <i>A bad mistake.</i>
dire	Of a very poor quality. <i>A dire emergency.</i>

fearful	Experiencing or showing fear. <i>He s fearful that his career is over.</i>
fearsome	Causing fear or dread or terror. <i>The cat mewed displaying a fearsome set of teeth.</i>
<u>frightening</u>	Causing fear or dread or terror. <i>A frightening experience.</i>
frightful	Provoking horror- Winston Churchill. <i>Her hair was a frightful mess.</i>
green around the gills	Naive and easily deceived or tricked.
<u>grim</u>	Depressing or worrying to consider. <i>The grim aftermath of the bombing.</i>
<u>horrendous</u>	Extremely unpleasant, horrifying, or terrible. <i>She suffered horrendous injuries.</i>
horrible	Very unpleasant. <i>War is beyond all words horrible.</i>
<u>horrific</u>	Causing fear or dread or terror. <i>Horrific injuries.</i>
<u>ill</u>	Presaging ill fortune P B Shelley. <i>Ill predictions.</i>
indisposed	Averse; unwilling. <i>Clearly indisposed to grant their request.</i>
liverish	Slightly ill, as though having a disordered liver. <i>A liverish red.</i>
<u>nasty</u>	Disgustingly dirty; filled or smeared with offensive matter. <i>A nasty pigsty of a room.</i>
nauseated	Feeling nausea; feeling about to vomit.
nauseous	Causing or able to cause nausea. <i>A rancid odour that made him nauseous.</i>
<u>outrageous</u>	Shockingly bad or excessive. <i>Subjected to outrageous cruelty.</i>

<u>painful</u>	Very bad. <i>The painful process of growing up.</i>
peaky	Having or as if having especially high-pitched spots. <i>Absence of peaky highs and beefed up bass.</i>
<u>poorly</u>	Somewhat ill or prone to illness. <i>She looked poorly.</i>
queasy	Feeling nausea; feeling about to vomit. <i>In the morning he was still pale and queasy.</i>
<u>shocking</u>	Glaringly vivid and graphic; marked by sensationalism. <i>I ve got a shocking cold.</i>
sick	Lacking in intensity or brightness; dim or feeble. <i>Sick to death of flattery.</i>
terrible	Used to emphasize the extent of something unpleasant or bad. <i>A terrible crime.</i>
<u>unpleasant</u>	(of a person or their manner) unfriendly and inconsiderate; rude. <i>The symptoms are extremely unpleasant.</i>
<u>unspeakable</u>	Not able to be expressed in words. <i>A piece of unspeakable abuse.</i>
unwell	Somewhat ill or prone to illness. <i>Is unwell and can t come to work.</i>

appall	Strike with disgust or revulsion.
<u>appalling</u>	Causing consternation. <i>Is it better to view the appalling or merely hear of it.</i>
<u>atrocious</u>	Horrifyingly wicked. <i>An atrocious automobile accident.</i>
awful	Awfully very. <i>I felt awful for being so angry with him.</i>
beastly	In a beastly manner. <i>Don't be beastly to him.</i>
<u>chilling</u>	Horrifying or frightening. <i>A chilling account of the prisoners fate.</i>

fearful	Causing or likely to cause people to be afraid; horrifying. <i>He s fearful that his career is over.</i>
fearsome	Causing fear or dread or terror. <i>The cat mewed displaying a fearsome set of teeth.</i>
formidable	Inspiring fear- G.H.Johnston. <i>Had a formidable array of compositions to his credit.</i>
frightening	The act of inspiring with fear. <i>A frightening experience.</i>
frightful	Provoking horror. <i>In a frightful hurry.</i>
ghastly	Very objectionable, bad, or unpleasant. <i>One of the most ghastly crimes ever committed.</i>
hellish	Extremely (used for emphasis). <i>An unearthly hellish landscape.</i>
hideous	Grossly offensive to decency or morality; causing horror. <i>The whole hideous story.</i>
horrible	Provoking horror- Winston Churchill. <i>A horrible massacre.</i>
horrific	Causing horror. <i>Horrific injuries.</i>
horrifying	Provoking horror. <i>An alarming even horrifying picture.</i>
horror	A literary or film genre concerned with arousing feelings of horror. <i>A horror film.</i>
indescribable	Too unusual, extreme, or indefinite to be adequately described. <i>Indescribable beauty.</i>
ineffable	Too sacred to be uttered. <i>The ineffable Hebrew name that gentiles write as Jehovah.</i>
inexpressible	(of a feeling) too strong to be described or conveyed in words. <i>A mood of inexpressible longing.</i>
nasty	An unpleasant or harmful person or thing. <i>A nasty vicious looking hatchet.</i>
scared	Fearful; frightened. <i>We re both scared of spiders.</i>
scary	Frightening; causing fear. <i>It was scary the way they bonded with each other.</i>

- terrible** Extremely unpleasant or disagreeable.
*I was sick all night and felt **terrible** for two days.*
- terrifying** Causing extreme terror.
*A **terrifying** wail.*
- unspeakable** Defying expression or description.
*I felt an **unspeakable** tenderness towards her.*
- unutterable** Very difficult to pronounce correctly.
*I felt an **unutterable** fool.*
