asleep	Lacking sensation. <i>A man lay asleep.</i>
awake	Not in a state of sleep; completely conscious. <i>Still not fully awake.</i>
bed	Place plants in a prepared bed of soil. <i>He sat on the edge of the bed.</i>
daydream	Have a daydream indulge in a fantasy. <i>She was lost in a daydream.</i>
doze	A light fitful sleep. <i>I dozed off for a few seconds.</i>
dreamy	Dreamy in mood or nature. <i>The atmosphere is tranquil and dreamy.</i>

drowse	Make sleepy. <i>Let not your prudence drowse.</i>
drowsiness	A very sleepy state. <i>This drug can cause drowsiness.</i>
<u>drowsy</u>	Causing sleepiness. <i>Made drowsy by the long ride.</i>
<u>envision</u>	Picture to oneself; imagine possible. <i>She envisioned the admiring glances of guests seeing her home.</i>
hypnosis	A hypnotic state. <i>I was regressed under hypnosis.</i>
hypnotism	The act of inducing hypnosis. Based on or having the nature of an illusion.
illusory	<i>Secret activities offer presidents the alluring but often illusory promise that they can achieve foreign policy goals without the bothersome debate and open decision that are staples of democracy.</i>
<u>imaginary</u>	Existing only in the imagination. <i>Chris had imaginary conversations with her.</i>
mesmerism	The act of inducing hypnosis.
nap	A soft or fuzzy surface texture. <i>She took to napping on the beach in the afternoons.</i>
<u>nightmare</u>	A frightening or unpleasant dream. <i>The nightmare of racial hatred.</i>
oversleep	Sleep longer or later than one intended. <i>We talked until the early hours and consequently I overslept.</i>
<u>reverie</u>	An abstracted state of absorption. <i>His own compositions can move from impressionist reveries to an orchestral chordal approach.</i>
rouse	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>She roused and looked around.</i>
sleep	A gummy secretion found in the corners of the eyes after sleep. <i>He sleeps in Holywell cemetery.</i>
<u>sleepy</u>	Needing or ready for sleep. <i>He turned off the road into a sleepy little town.</i>
<u>slumber</u>	Sleep. <i>Calm as a child in dreamless slumber.</i>
snore	Make a snorting or grunting sound while asleep. <i>She sings a version of Passionate Kisses that s a certified snore.</i>

somnolence A very sleepy state.

somnolent Inclined to or marked by drowsiness.
*The sound had a **somnolent** effect.*

subconscious The subconscious part of the mind not in technical use in psychoanalysis where unconscious is preferred.
*My **subconscious** fear.*

visualize Form a mental image of; imagine.
*Mathematicians often **visualize**.*

waken Cause to become awake or conscious.
*They combined to **waken** a forgotten and futile hope.*

waking Marked by full consciousness or alertness.
*Worked every moment of my **waking** hours.*
