- Propel.
- Pour (a liquid) slowly in a thin stream.
- Let or cause to fall in drops.



- Allow saliva to run from the mouth.
- (in soccer, hockey, and basketball) take (the ball) forwards past opponents with slight touches of the feet or the stick, or (in basketball) by continuous bouncing.
- Propel.
- Run or flow slowly, as in drops or in an unsteady stream.
- Let saliva drivel from the mouth.
- (of a liquid) fall slowly in drops or a thin stream.


