- *The training of soldiers to march (as in ceremonial parades) or to perform the manual of arms.*
- *Similar to the mandrill but smaller and less brightly colored.*
- *A tool with a sharp point and cutting edges for making holes in hard materials (usually rotating rapidly or by repeated blows).*
- *Systematic training by multiple repetitions.*
- *A tool or machine with a rotating cutting tip or reciprocating hammer or chisel, used*

for making holes.

- *(military) the training of soldiers to march (as in ceremonial parades) or to perform the manual of arms.*
- *The correct or recognized procedure or way of doing something.*
- *A tool with a rotating tip used by a dentist for cutting away part of a tooth before filling it.*
- *Intensive instruction or training in something, typically by means of repeated exercises.*
- *A rehearsal of the procedure to be followed in an emergency.*
- *A predatory mollusc that bores into the shells of other molluscs in order to feed on the soft tissue.*
- *Instruction or training in military exercises.*

awl	A small pointed tool used for piercing holes, especially in leather.
bit	The cutting part of a drill usually pointed and threaded and is replaceable in a brace or bitstock or drill press. <i>Give the duck a bit of bread.</i>
boring tool	The act of drilling a hole in the earth in the hope of producing petroleum.
brace and bit	Two items of the same kind.
bradawl	A tool for boring holes, resembling a small, sharpened screwdriver.
coaching	A vehicle carrying many passengers; used for public transport.
custom	Regular dealings with a shop or business by customers. <i>It is our custom to visit the Lake District in October.</i>
drilling tool	The training of soldiers to march (as in ceremonial parades) or to perform the manual of arms.
<u>exercise</u>	An action, often used negatively and without consequences. <i>An exercise in futility.</i>
gimlet	Hand tool for boring holes.
grounding	The loose soft material that makes up a large part of the land surface. <i>A good grounding in mathematics.</i>
instruction	The activities of educating or instructing; activities that impart knowledge or skill. <i>Our instruction was carefully programmed.</i>
mandrillus leucophaeus	Similar to the mandrill but smaller and less brightly colored.
method	An acting technique introduced by Stanislavsky in which the actor recalls emotions or reactions from his or her own life and uses them to identify with the character being portrayed. <i>Historical study is the rigorous combination of knowledge and method.</i>
order	The position in which a rifle is held after ordering arms. <i>Law and order.</i>
pattern	A regular and intelligible form or sequence discernible in the way in which something happens or is done. <i>The house had been built on the usual pattern.</i>
practice	The carrying out or exercise of a profession, especially that of a doctor or lawyer. <i>It must have taken a lot of practice to become so fluent.</i>

practice session	Systematic training by multiple repetitions.
procedure	A mode of conducting legal and parliamentary proceedings. <i>The procedure of obtaining a driver s license.</i>
programme	A system of projects or services intended to meet a public need. <i>A weekly programme of films.</i>
recitation	Written matter that is recited from memory. <i>The program included songs and recitations of well loved poems.</i>
<u>regimen</u>	(medicine) a systematic plan for therapy (often including diet). <i>A regimen of one or two injections per day.</i>
rotary tool	Electrical converter consisting of a synchronous machine that converts alternating to direct current or vice versa.
routine	An unvarying or habitual method or procedure. <i>As a matter of routine a report will be sent to the director.</i>
<u>schedule</u>	An appendix to a formal document or statute, especially as a list, table, or inventory. <i>They need a clear schedule of fixtures and fittings.</i>
system	A procedure or process for obtaining an objective. <i>The system of bright stars known as the Gould Belt.</i>
teaching	A doctrine that is taught. <i>He prepared for teaching while still in college.</i>
training	The result of good upbringing (especially knowledge of correct social behavior). <i>In service training for staff.</i>

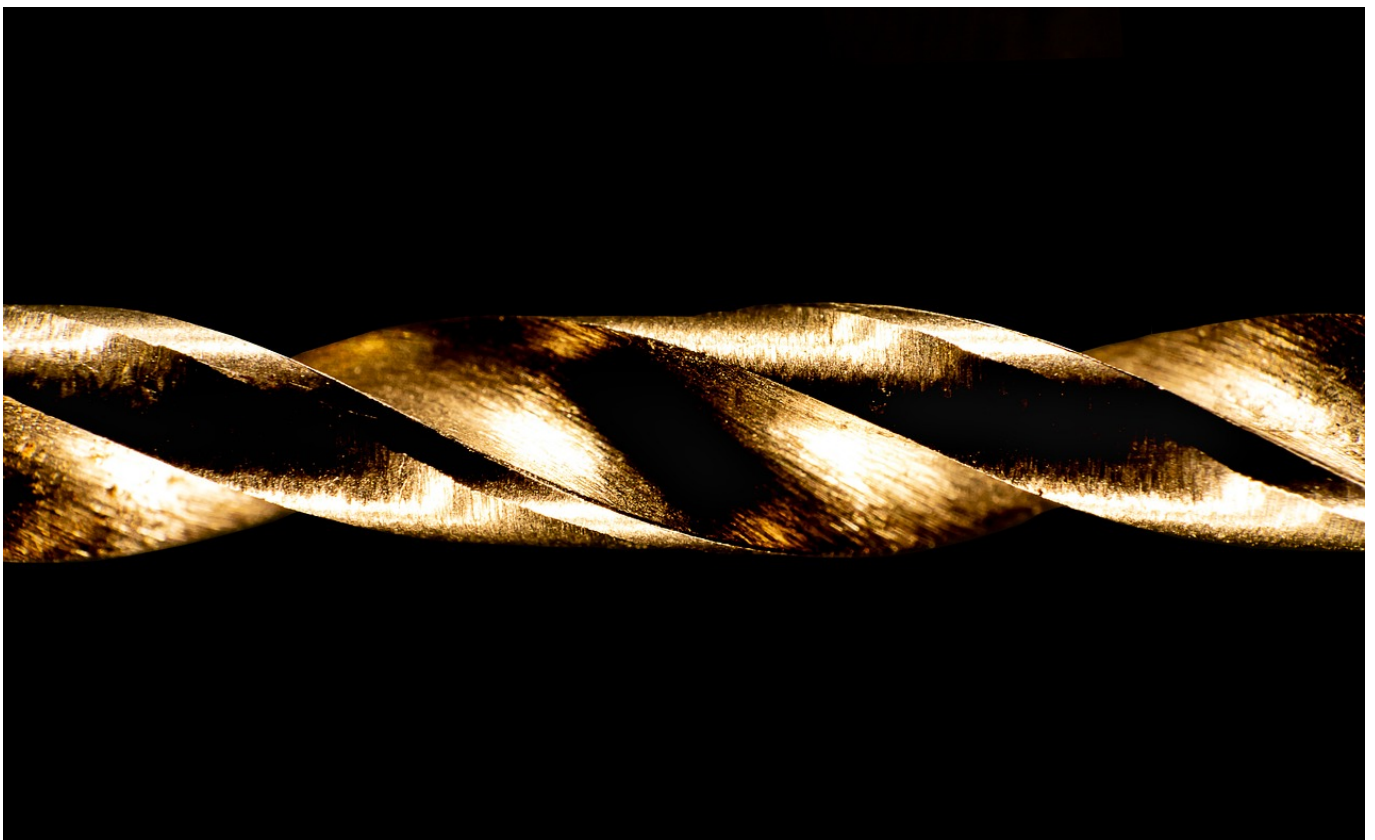
Drill as a Verb

- *Make a hole in (something) by boring with a drill.*
- *Learn by repetition.*
- *Sink a borehole in order to obtain oil or water.*
- *Subject (someone) to military training exercises.*
- *Produce (a hole) in something by or as if by boring with a drill.*
- *Teach by repetition.*

- *Undergo military training or do military exercises.*
- *(of a dentist) cut away part of (a tooth) before filling it.*
- *Make a hole, especially with a pointed power or hand tool.*
- *(of a person) take part in military training exercises.*
- *Make a hole in or through something by using a drill.*
- *(of a sports player) hit (a shot) hard and in a straight line.*
- *Train in the military, e.g., in the use of weapons.*

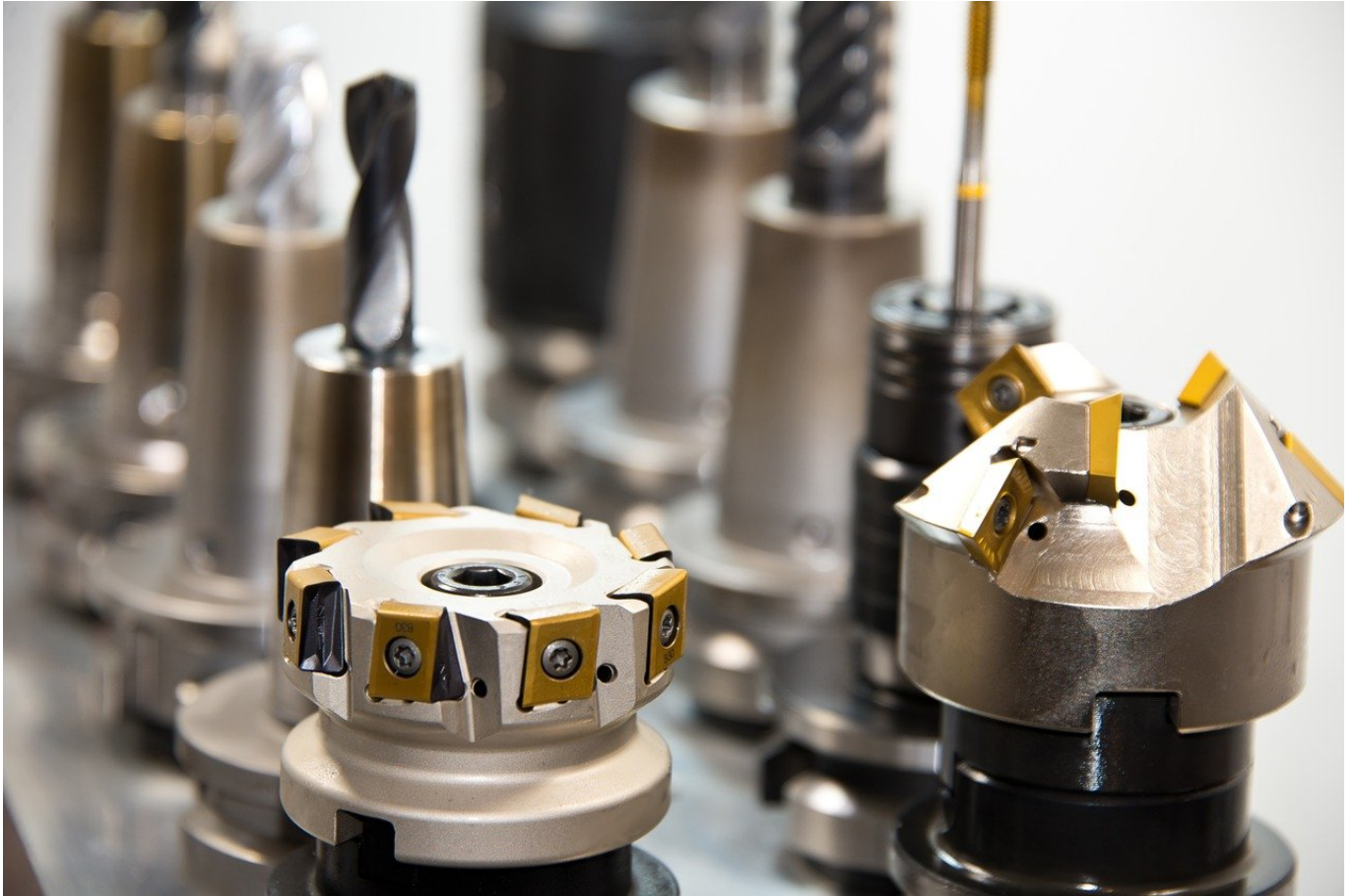
bore	Cause to be bored. <i>His eyes bored into hers.</i>
bore a hole in	Cause to be bored.
coach	Teach and supervise someone act as a trainer or coach to as in sports. <i>Fly or coach to the shores of the Mediterranean.</i>
cut a hole in	Cause to stop operating by disengaging a switch.

<u>discipline</u>	Develop (children's) behavior by instruction and practice; especially to teach self-control. <i>The teacher disciplined the pupils rather frequently.</i>
drill a hole in	Make a hole, especially with a pointed power or hand tool.
<u>exercise</u>	Do physical exercise. <i>Macdougall was greatly exercised about the exchange rate.</i>

practise	Scheme or plot for an evil purpose. <i>What a tangled web we weave when we first practise to deceive.</i>
put someone through their paces	Cause to be in a certain state; cause to be in a certain relation.
rehearse	Supervise (a performer or group) during a rehearsal. <i>Criticisms of factory farming have been rehearsed often enough.</i>
teach	Work as a teacher. <i>She teaches at the local high school.</i>
<u>train</u>	Create by training and teaching. <i>Last October I started training for the London Marathon.</i>
