## **Drily as an Adverb**

### **Definitions of "Drily" as an adverb**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “drily” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *In a matter-of-fact or ironically humorous way.*
- *In a dry way or condition.*
- *In a dry laconic manner.*



## Synonyms of "Drily" as an adverb (2 Words)

**dryly** In a dry laconic manner he said dryly.  
*I know that he said **dryly**.*

**laconically** In a dry laconic manner.

- *Evans swallowed drily.*
- *'How very observant', he said drily.*



## Associations of "Drily" (30 Words)

<b>anhydrous</b>	Without water; especially without water of crystallization.
<b>arid</b>	Lacking sufficient water or rainfall. <i>An <b>arid</b> climate.</i>
<b>aridity</b>	A deficiency of moisture (especially when resulting from a permanent absence of rainfall).
<b>blacken</b>	Make or become black. <i>Stone <b>blackened</b> by the soot of ages.</i>
<b>char</b>	Material that has been charred. <i>Without a drenching rain the forest fire will <b>char</b> everything.</i>

<b>climatic</b>	Relating to climate. <i>Under certain <b>climatic</b> conditions desert locusts increase in number.</i>
<b>dehydrate</b>	Preserve by removing all water and liquids from. <i>Carry <b>dehydrated</b> food on your camping trip.</i>
<b>desert</b>	Desert a cause a country or an army often in order to join the opposing cause country or army. <i>The tourists have <b>deserted</b> the beaches.</i>
<b>desiccant</b>	A hygroscopic substance used as a drying agent. <i>A small packet of <b>desiccant</b> to absorb any moisture.</i>
<b>desiccate</b>	Preserve by removing all water and liquids from. <i>A prissy and emotionless creature settles into a mold of <b>desiccated</b> snobbery.</i>
<b>desiccated</b>	Thoroughly dried out. <i><b>Desiccated</b> representatives of the political establishment.</i>
<b>desiccation</b>	Dryness resulting from the removal of water. <i>Stems were stored in plastic bags to prevent <b>desiccation</b>.</i>
<b>dried</b>	Preserved by removal or evaporation of moisture. <i><b>Dried</b> lavender flowers.</i>
<b>drought</b>	Thirst. <i>Farmers most affected by the <b>drought</b> hope that there may yet be sufficient rain early in the growing season.</i>
<b>dryness</b>	Lack or absence of rainfall or humidity. <i>It does little to rescue the ordinary moment from <b>dryness</b> and tedium.</i>
<b>evaporate</b>	Cause to change into a vapor. <i>This gets the oil hot enough to <b>evaporate</b> any moisture.</i>
<b>evaporation</b>	The process of turning from liquid into vapour. <i>Thousands of employees witnessed the rapid <b>evaporation</b> of their retirement plans.</i>
<b>famish</b>	Die of food deprivation. <i>They had <b>famished</b> the city into surrender.</i>
<b>humidity</b>	Wetness in the atmosphere. <i>The <b>humidity</b> should be supplied by regularly spraying the leaves.</i>
<b>moisturize</b>	Make (more) humid. <i>Revitalize your face <b>moisturize</b> your skin.</i>
<b>parch</b>	Cause to wither or parch from exposure to heat. <i>A piece of grassland <b>parched</b> by the sun.</i>

<b>parched</b>	Toasted or roasted slightly. <i>I m <b>parched</b> I ll die without a drink.</i>
<b>precipitation</b>	The process of forming a chemical precipitate. <i>He is responsible for the <b>precipitation</b> of his own demise.</i>
<b>scorch</b>	A plant disease that produces a browning or scorched appearance of plant tissues. <i>The meat had <b>scorched</b>.</i>
<b>sear</b>	Burn or scorch the surface of (something) with a sudden, intense heat. <i>When summer <b>sears</b> the plains.</i>
<b>semiarid</b>	Somewhat arid. <i>A <b>semiarid</b> region with little annual rainfall.</i>
<b>shrivel</b>	Wither, as with a loss of moisture. <i>The flowers simply <b>shrivelled</b> up.</i>
<b>singe</b>	Be lightly or superficially burned. <i>My eyebrows <b>singed</b> when I bent over the flames.</i>
<b>thirst</b>	A physiological need to drink. <i>They quenched their <b>thirst</b> with spring water.</i>
<b>withered</b>	(of a part of the body) shrunken or wrinkled from age or disease. <i>A lanky scarecrow of a man with <b>withered</b> face and lantern jaws.</i>
