## Drip as a Noun

### Definitions of "Drip" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “drip” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The action or sound of liquid falling steadily in small drops.*
- *(architecture) a projection from a cornice or sill designed to protect the area below from rainwater (as over a window or doorway).*
- *A projection on a moulding, channelled to prevent rain from running down the wall below.*
- *The sound of a liquid falling drop by drop.*
- *An apparatus which passes fluid, nutrients, or drugs drop by drop into a patient's body on a continuous basis, usually intravenously.*
- *A weak and ineffectual person.*
- *A projection from a cornice or sill designed to protect the area below from rainwater*

*(as over a window or doorway.*

- *A method of brewing coffee by dripping boiling water through a filter filled with ground coffee beans.*
- *Flowing in drops; the formation and falling of drops of liquid.*
- *A small drop of a liquid.*



## Synonyms of "Drip" as a noun (14 Words)

<b>bead</b>	An ornamental plaster moulding resembling a string of beads or having a semicircular cross section. <i><b>Beads</b> of sweat on his forehead.</i>
<b>coward</b>	A person who shows fear or timidity. <i>They had run away the <b>cowards</b>.</i>
<b><u>dribble</u></b>	Saliva spilling from the mouth. <i>There was <b>dribble</b> down his chin.</i>
<b>drip mold</b>	Flowing in drops; the formation and falling of drops of liquid.
<b>drip mould</b>	The sound of a liquid falling drop by drop.
<b><u>dripping</u></b>	A liquid (as water) that flows in drops (as from the eaves of house). <i>Bread and <b>dripping</b>.</i>

- drop** The act of dropping something.  
*A **drop** of each sample was analyzed.*
- mouse** In general use any small mammal similar to a mouse such as a shrew or vole.  
*A **mouse** takes much more room than a trackball.*
- namby-pamby** An insipid weakling who is foolishly sentimental.
- plop** A short sound as of a small, solid object dropping into water without a splash.  
*The stone fell into the water with a soft **plop**.*
- splash** The sound like water splashing.  
*Add a red scarf to give a **splash** of colour.*
- spot** A blemish made by dirt.  
*An ideal picnic **spot**.*
- trickle** A small flow of liquid.  
*A **trickle** of blood.*
- weakling** A person who is physically weak and ineffectual.  
*A brood of **weaklings**.*

### Definitions of "Drip" as a verb

- *Let fall or be so wet as to shed small drops of liquid.*
- *Display a copious amount or degree of a particular quality or thing.*
- *Cause or allow (a liquid) to fall in small drops.*
- *(of liquid) fall in small drops.*
- *Fall in drops.*
- *Let or cause to fall in drops.*



## Synonyms of "Drip" as a verb (24 Words)

### **breathe**

Take air into the lungs and then expel it, especially as a regular physiological process.

*Before the queen's fair name was **breathed** upon.*

### **demonstrate**

Clearly show the existence or truth of (something) by giving proof or evidence.

*Their shameful silence **demonstrates** their ineptitude.*

### **display**

Attract attention by displaying some body part or posing of animals.

*Both players **displayed** a great deal of spirit.*

<b>dribble</b>	Pour (a liquid) slowly in a thin stream. <i>Rain <b>dribbled</b> down the window.</i>
<b>drizzle</b>	(in cooking) trickle a thin stream of (a liquid ingredient) over food. <i>When it <b>drizzles</b> in summer hiking can be pleasant.</i>
<b>drop</b>	Let or cause to fall in drops. <i>The spoon <b>dropped</b> with a clatter from her hand.</i>
<b>emit</b>	Produce and discharge (something, especially gas or radiation). <i>The ozone layer blocks some harmful rays which the sun <b>emits</b>.</i>
<b>exhibit</b>	Give an exhibition of to an interested audience. <i>The Metropolitan Museum is <b>exhibiting</b> Goya's works this month.</i>
<b>exude</b>	(of a place) have a strong atmosphere of. <i>Slime <b>exudes</b> from the fungus.</i>
<b>fall</b>	Fall or flow in a certain way. <i><b>Fall</b> by the wayside.</i>
<b>fall in drops</b>	Come as if by falling.
<b>flow</b>	Fall or flow in a certain way. <i>Her long black hair <b>flowed</b> down her back.</i>
<b>give out</b>	Transfer possession of something concrete or abstract to somebody.
<b>gush</b>	Gush forth in a sudden stream or jet. <i>Water <b>gushed</b> out of the washing machine.</i>
<b>leak</b>	Be leaked. <i>Jones denies he <b>leaked</b> the photos.</i>
<b>let loose</b>	Grant use or occupation of under a term of contract.
<b>manifest</b>	Record in a ship's manifest. <i>Bad industrial relations are often <b>manifested</b> in strikes.</i>
<b>plop</b>	Drop something with a plopping sound. <i>He <b>plopped</b> himself down on the nearest chair.</i>
<b>pour forth</b>	Rain heavily.
<b>run</b>	Of a batsman run from one wicket to the other in scoring or attempting to score a run. <i><b>Run</b> a temperature.</i>
<b>send out</b>	Cause to be directed or transmitted to another place.
<b>splash</b>	Make a splashing sound. <i>The mother <b>splashed</b> the baby's face with water.</i>
<b>sprinkle</b>	Cause (a liquid) to spatter about, especially with force. <i>I <b>sprinkled</b> the floor with water.</i>

**trickle**

(of a liquid) flow in a small stream.

A solitary tear **trickled** down her cheek.



### Usage Examples of "Drip" as a verb

- *His hands were dripping with blood.*
- *Water dripped from her clothing.*
- *Water is dripping from the faucet.*
- *His voice dripped sarcasm.*
- *The candle was dripping wax down one side.*
- *The tap won't stop dripping.*
- *The women were dripping with gold and diamonds.*

- beck** A beckoning gesture.
- cascade** Rush down in big quantities like a cascade.  
*Blonde hair **casca**ded down her back.*
- coffee** Coffee seeds roasted and ground or a powder made from them.  
*A maxi dress in cream with a **coffee** silk trim.*
- disgorge** Eject the contents of the stomach through the mouth.  
*The Nile **disgorges** into the sea at Rashid.*
- dive** Plunge head first into water with one's arms raised over one's head.  
*I was afraid to **dive** from the board into the pool.*
- dribble** Flowing in drops; the formation and falling of drops of liquid.  
***Dribble** oil into the mixture.*
- drivel** Let saliva drivel from the mouth.  
*Don t talk such **drivel**.*



<b>drop</b>	The act of dropping something. <i>There is not a <b>drop</b> of pity in that man.</i>
<b>fall</b>	A controlled act of falling especially as a stunt or in martial arts. <i>The line of men <b>fall</b> forward.</i>
<b>filter</b>	A filter tip. <i><b>Filters</b> can be used in photography to reduce haze.</i>
<b>flow</b>	Something that resembles a flowing stream in moving continuously. <i>The <b>flow</b> of words was interrupted by painful sobs.</i>
<b>glen</b>	A narrow secluded valley (in the mountains).
<b>gorge</b>	A narrow pass (especially one between mountains). <i>They <b>gorged</b> themselves on Cornish cream teas.</i>
<b>immerse</b>	Cause to be immersed. <i>She was still <b>immersed</b> in her thoughts.</i>
<b>percolator</b>	A coffeepot in which boiling water ascends through a central tube and filters back down through a basket of ground coffee beans.
<b><u>plummet</u></b>	The metal bob of a plumb line. <i>A climber was killed when he <b>plummeted</b> 300 feet down an icy gully.</i>
<b><u>plunge</u></b>	Dash violently or with great speed or impetuosity. <i>It <b>plunged</b> to the bottom of the well.</i>
<b>purl</b>	Knit with a purl stitch. <i>The water was <b>purling</b>.</i>
<b>ravine</b>	A deep narrow steep-sided valley (especially one formed by running water).
<b>retch</b>	An involuntary spasm of ineffectual vomiting. <i>He <b>retched</b> up a thin stream of vomit.</i>
<b>saliva</b>	A clear liquid secreted into the mouth by the salivary glands and mucous glands of the mouth moistens the mouth and starts the digestion of starches.
<b><u>spew</u></b>	Eject the contents of the stomach through the mouth. <i>The volcano <b>spews</b> out molten rocks every day.</i>
<b><u>spill</u></b>	Liquid that is spilled. <i><b>Spill</b> the milk.</i>
<b>submerge</b>	Submerge. <i>Pellets were then <b>submersed</b> in agar.</i>
<b>submersion</b>	Sinking until covered completely with water. <i>Five small islands threatened by <b>submersion</b>.</i>
<b>swallow</b>	An amount of something swallowed in one action. <i>One <b>swallow</b> of the liquid was enough.</i>

**swimmer** A person or animal that swims.  
*Red flags to warn **swimmers** of dangerous currents.*

**trickle** Cause (a liquid) to flow in a small stream.  
*Philip **trickled** a line of sauce on his fish fingers.*

**urinate** Pass after the manner of urine.  
*The sick men **urinated** blood.*

**waterfall** A cascade of water falling from a height, formed when a river or stream flows over a precipice or steep incline.  
*Each phase of a **waterfall** project must be complete prior to moving to the next phase.*
