Dripping as a Noun

Definitions of "Dripping" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “dripping” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A liquid (as water) that flows in drops (as from the eaves of house.*
- *The sound of a liquid falling drop by drop.*
- *Flowing in drops; the formation and falling of drops of liquid.*
- *Fat that has melted and dripped from roasting meat, used in cooking or eaten cold as a spread.*
- *A projection from a cornice or sill designed to protect the area below from rainwater (as over a window or doorway.*

- Wax, fat, or other liquid produced from something by the effect of heat.



Synonyms of "Dripping" as a noun (6 Words)

animal fat A living organism characterized by voluntary movement.

cooking oil The act of preparing something (as food) by the application of heat.

drip A method of brewing coffee by dripping boiling water through a filter filled with ground coffee beans.

*We both drink aged Sumatra **drip** coffee.*

drippage A liquid (as water) that flows in drops (as from the eaves of house).

fat The presence of excess fat in a person or animal.

*He was a tall man running to **fat**.*

oil Oil paint containing pigment that is used by an artist.

*400 birds were coated with **oil** which spilled out from an opened valve.*

- *The constant sound of dripping irritated him.*
- *Use the pan drippings to brush on the pork.*
- *Bread and dripping.*

Synonyms of "Dripping" as an adjective (9 Words)

doughy	(of a person) pale and rather fat. <i>A pasty doughy chubby white kid from the suburbs.</i>
mushy	Having the consistency of mush. <i>Mushy vegetables.</i>
oozy	Leaking out slowly.
pulpy	Like a pulp or overripe; not having stiffness. <i>Simmer gently until the fruit is very soft and pulpy.</i>
sloppy	Careless and unsystematic; excessively casual. <i>She wore a sloppy sweater and jeans.</i>
slushy	Being or resembling melting snow. <i>Slushy snow.</i>
soft and wet	Yielding readily to pressure or weight.

squashy

Easily crushed or squeezed into a different shape; having a soft consistency.
*A big **squashy** leather chair.*

squishy

Easily squashed; resembling a sponge in having soft porous texture and compressibility.
*The road is a sluice of **squishy** mud.*

beck	A beckoning gesture.
<u>cascade</u>	Rush down in big quantities like a cascade. <i>Separation of isotopes by a cascade of processes.</i>
coffee	The shrub which yields coffee seeds native to the Old World tropics. <i>A coffee pot.</i>
disgorge	Pour (something) out. <i>The wine is aged in the bottle before it is disgorged.</i>
<u>dive</u>	A sudden marked fall in prices or profits. <i>I was afraid to dive from the board into the pool.</i>
<u>dribble</u>	(in soccer, hockey, and basketball) take (the ball) forwards past opponents with slight touches of the feet or the stick, or (in basketball) by continuous bouncing. <i>He attempted to dribble the ball from the goal area.</i>
drivel	Let saliva drivel from the mouth. <i>Don't talk such drivel.</i>
drop	An act of dropping supplies or troops by parachute. <i>There was not a drop of water in sight.</i>

fall	Go as if by falling. <i>There is a fall of woodcock in the round wood above the dell.</i>
filter	Remove by passing through a filter. <i>An oil filter.</i>
flow	The amount of fluid that flows in a given time. <i>Ventilation channels keep the air flowing.</i>
glen	A narrow secluded valley (in the mountains.
gorge	The crop of a hawk. <i>They gorged themselves on Cornish cream teas.</i>
immerse	Cause to be immersed. <i>She immersed herself in her work.</i>
percolator	A coffeepot in which boiling water ascends through a central tube and filters back down through a basket of ground coffee beans.
<u>plummet</u>	Drop sharply. <i>A climber was killed when he plummeted 300 feet down an icy gully.</i>
<u>plunge</u>	Quickly immerse in liquid. <i>The stock market plunged.</i>
purl	Knit with a purl stitch. <i>Knit one purl one.</i>
ravine	A deep narrow steep-sided valley (especially one formed by running water.
retch	Make the sound and movement of vomiting. <i>With a sudden retch he vomited all over the floor.</i>
saliva	A clear liquid secreted into the mouth by the salivary glands and mucous glands of the mouth moistens the mouth and starts the digestion of starches.
<u>spew</u>	Vomit. <i>He felt faint and nauseous he had to get out before he spewed.</i>
<u>spill</u>	A quantity of liquid that has spilled or been spilt. <i>He was absolved from any blame for the oil spill.</i>
submerge	Put under water. <i>Pellets were then submersed in agar.</i>
submersion	Sinking until covered completely with water. <i>Five small islands threatened by submersion.</i>
swallow	An amount of something swallowed in one action. <i>The huge waves swallowed the small boat and it sank shortly thereafter.</i>
swimmer	A person who travels through the water by swimming. <i>He is not a good swimmer.</i>

trickle

A small flow of liquid.

*Philip **trickled** a line of sauce on his fish fingers.*

urinate

Eliminate urine.

*The sick men **urinated** blood.*

waterfall

A cascade of water falling from a height, formed when a river or stream flows over a precipice or steep incline.

*Each phase of a **waterfall** project must be complete prior to moving to the next phase.*
