- A liquid (as water) that flows in drops (as from the eaves of house.
- The sound of a liquid falling drop by drop.
- Flowing in drops; the formation and falling of drops of liquid.
- Fat that has melted and dripped from roasting meat, used in cooking or eaten cold as a spread.
- A projection from a cornice or sill designed to protect the area below from rainwater (as over a window or doorway.



• Wax, fat, or other liquid produced from something by the effect of heat.

cooking oil The act of preparing something (as food) by the application of heat.

(of a person) pale and rather fat. doughy

A pasty **doughy** chubby white kid from the suburbs.

Having the consistency of mush. mushy

Mushy vegetables.

Leaking out slowly. oozy

Like a pulp or overripe; not having stiffness. pulpy

Simmer gently until the fruit is very soft and **pulpy**.

Careless and unsystematic; excessively casual. **sloppy**

She wore a **sloppy** sweater and jeans.

Being or resembling melting snow.

slushy Slushy snow.

soft and wet Yielding readily to pressure or weight.



squashy

Easily crushed or squeezed into a different shape; having a soft consistency.

A big **squashy** leather chair.

Easily squashed; resembling a sponge in having soft porous texture and

squishy compressibility.

The road is a sluice of **squishy** mud.

plummet Drop sharply.

A climber was killed when he **plummet**ed 300 feet down an icy gully.

plunge Quickly immerse in liquid.

The stock market **plunge**d.

purlKnit with a purl stitch.
Knit one **purl** one.

ravine A deep narrow steep-sided valley (especially one formed by running water.

retch Make the sound and movement of vomiting.

With a sudden **retch** he vomited all over the floor.

A clear liquid secreted into the mouth by the salivary glands and mucous

glands of the mouth moistens the mouth and starts the digestion of starches.

Vomit.

He felt faint and nauseous he had to get out before he **spew**ed.

A quantity of liquid that has spilled or been spilt.

He was absolved from any blame for the oil **spill**.

submerse Put under water.

Pellets were then **submerse**d in agar.

submersion Sinking until covered completely with water. *Five small islands threatened by* **submersion**.

trickle A small flow of liquid.

Philip **trickle**d a line of sauce on his fish fingers.

urinate Eliminate urine.

The sick men **urinate**d blood.

A cascade of water falling from a height, formed when a river or stream flows

over a precipice or steep incline.

waterfall
