Falling temperatures.

Associations of "Dropping" (30 Words)

abate	Become less in amount or intensity. <i>The storm suddenly abated.</i>
awash	Covered with water. <i>The main deck was afloat or awash.</i>
cascade	Rush down in big quantities like a cascade. <i>Blonde hair cascaded down her back.</i>
declension	The class to which a noun or adjective is assigned according to the manner of this variation. <i>The declension of the new generation.</i>
decline	Inflect for number, gender, case, etc. <i>The company declined to comment.</i>
declivity	A downward slope or bend. <i>A thickly wooded declivity.</i>

descend	(of a situation or group of people) reach (an undesirable state). <i>He was scrupulous in refusing to descend to misrepresentation.</i>
<u>diminution</u>	The act of decreasing or reducing something. <i>A permanent diminution in value.</i>
dip	A candle that is made by repeated dipping in a pool of wax or tallow. <i>The road dipped down to the bridge.</i>
<u>dive</u>	A sudden movement in a specified direction. <i>An 11 per cent dive in profits.</i>
<u>down</u>	Drink down entirely. <i>Down by a pawn.</i>
<u>downturn</u>	A decline in economic, business, or other activity. <i>A downturn in the housing market.</i>
<u>dribble</u>	Let saliva drivel from the mouth. <i>He dribbled cream into his coffee.</i>
<u>drip</u>	A method of brewing coffee by dripping boiling water through a filter filled with ground coffee beans. <i>He had been on a drip for several days.</i>
drivel	Let saliva drivel from the mouth. <i>Don't talk such drivel.</i>
<u>engulf</u>	Flow over or cover completely. <i>Europe might be engulfed by war.</i>
fall	Fall from clouds. <i>The barometer is falling.</i>
<u>falling</u>	Coming down freely under the influence of gravity. <i>Falling attendance figures.</i>
immerse	Cause to be immersed. <i>Immerse the paper in water for twenty minutes.</i>
parachute	Jump from an airplane and descend with a parachute. <i>An air operation to parachute relief supplies into the region.</i>
<u>plummet</u>	Drop sharply. <i>The bird has a circular display flight followed by an earthward plummet.</i>
<u>plunge</u>	Dash violently or with great speed or impetuosity. <i>The stock market plunged.</i>
sink	Cause to sink. <i>They planned to sink a gold mine in Oklahoma.</i>
slump	Go down in value. <i>United slumped to another one nil defeat.</i>

- submerge** Put under water.
*Houses had been flooded and cars **submerged**.*
- submergence** The process or state of being submerged in or covered with water.
*Total **submergence** of plants results in heavy crop losses.*
- submerse** Put under water.
*Pellets were then **submersed** in agar.*
- subside** (of a building or other structure) sink lower into the ground.
*Patrick **subsided** into his seat.*
- trickle** Flowing in drops; the formation and falling of drops of liquid.
*A solitary tear **trickled** down her cheek.*
- waterfall** Relating to or denoting a method of project management that is characterized by sequential stages and a fixed plan of work.
*Each phase of a **waterfall** project must be complete prior to moving to the next phase.*
