Drown as a Verb

Definitions of "Drown" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “drown” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Die through submersion in and inhalation of water.*
- *Deliberately kill (a person or animal) by drowning.*
- *Kill by submerging in water.*
- *Die from being submerged in water, getting water into the lungs, and asphyxiating.*
- *Cover or immerse food in.*
- *Submerge or flood (an area.*
- *(of a sound) make (another sound) inaudible by being much louder.*
- *Be in danger of dying from submersion in a liquid and asphyxiation.*
- *Be overwhelmed by a large amount of something.*
- *Be covered with or submerged in a liquid.*
- *Cover completely or make imperceptible.*
- *Get rid of as if by submerging.*



Synonyms of "Drown" as a verb (24 Words)

be louder than	Have life, be alive.
<u>bury</u>	Involve oneself deeply in something to the exclusion of other concerns. <i>He ran through to bury a right foot shot inside the near post.</i>
cover	Cover as if with a shroud. <i>I moved in front of Hawk to cover him as he reloaded.</i>
deluge	Fill or cover completely, usually with water. <i>Caravans were deluged by the heavy rains.</i>
<u>devour</u>	Eat greedily. <i>She was devoured by envy.</i>
drench	Drench or submerge or be drenched or submerged. <i>Cool patios drenched in flowers.</i>
drown out	Be covered with or submerged in a liquid.
<u>engulf</u>	Flow over or cover completely. <i>The bright light engulfed him completely.</i>
flood	Of a flood force someone to leave their home. <i>His old fears came flooding back.</i>

immerse	Cause to be immersed. <i>Immerse the paper in water for twenty minutes.</i>
inhale water	Draw in (air).
inundate	Fill quickly beyond capacity; as with a liquid. <i>The islands may be the first to be inundated as sea levels rise.</i>
make inaudible	Develop into.
overcome	Overcome usually through no fault or weakness of the person that is overcome. <i>You must overcome all difficulties.</i>
overpower	Be too intense for; overwhelm. <i>He overpowered the two men and frogmarched them to the police station.</i>
override	Rule against. <i>The courts will ultimately override any objections.</i>
overwhelm	Give too much of something to; inundate. <i>They were overwhelmed by farewell messages.</i>
saturate	Put (a device) into a state in which no further increase in current is achievable. <i>Japan s electronics industry began to saturate the world markets.</i>
soak	Fill soak or imbue totally. <i>Cold water was soaking into my shoes.</i>
submerge	Put under water. <i>The tensions submerged earlier in the campaign now came to the fore.</i>
suffocate in water	Feel uncomfortable for lack of fresh air.
swallow up	Enclose or envelop completely, as if by swallowing.
swamp	(of a boat) become overwhelmed with water and sink. <i>The country was swamped with goods from abroad.</i>
swim	Cross a particular stretch of water by swimming. <i>My brain is swimming after the bottle of champagne.</i>



Usage Examples of "Drown" as a verb

- *Two fishermen were drowned when their motorboat capsized.*
- *Good pizza is not eight inches thick and drowned in tomato sauce.*
- *When the ice melted the valleys were drowned.*
- *He drowned the kittens.*
- *I was drowned in work.*
- *A motorist drowned when her car plunged off the edge of a quay.*
- *Art dealers are still drowning in a sea of paperwork.*
- *The noise drowned out her speech.*
- *The divers saved the drowning child.*
- *He immediately drowned four of the dogs.*
- *The child drowned in the lake.*
- *Both business and household sectors are drowning in debt.*
- *She drowned her trouble in alcohol.*
- *His voice was drowned out by the approaching engine noise.*
- *They committed suicide by jumping into the sea and drowning themselves.*



Associations of "Drown" (30 Words)

airway	The passage by which air reaches a person's lungs. <i>He kept the man s airway clear and blood circulating.</i>
awash	Level with the surface of water so that it just washes over. <i>The main deck was afloat or awash.</i>
capsize	(of a boat) be overturned in the water. <i>The craft capsized in heavy seas.</i>
choke	A knob which controls the choke in a carburettor. <i>We were the only team not to choke when it came to the crunch.</i>
clutter	Unwanted echoes that interfere with the observation of signals on a radar screen. <i>The room was cluttered with his bric a brac.</i>
deluge	A great quantity of something arriving at the same time. <i>He has been deluged with offers of work.</i>
dive	(of a fish or submarine) go to a deeper level in water. <i>He got into a fight in some dive.</i>
garrote	Strangle with an iron collar.
muffle	A kiln with an inner chamber for firing things at a low temperature. <i>A muffle furnace.</i>
overwhelm	Overcome, as with emotions or perceptual stimuli. <i>They were overwhelmed by farewell messages.</i>
plunge	Immerse briefly into a liquid so as to wet, coat, or saturate. <i>The professor plunged his students into the study of the Italian text.</i>
raft	Transport on or as if on a raft. <i>Great rafts of cormorants often 5 000 strong.</i>
scuba	Scuba diving. <i>Scuba gear.</i>
sea	Used to refer to waves as opposed to calm sea. <i>Rocky bays lapped by vivid blue sea.</i>
sink	Cause a ship to sink. <i>They planned to sink a gold mine in Oklahoma.</i>
smother	Form an impenetrable cover over. <i>The goalkeeper was able to smother the ball.</i>
springboard	A platform fixed to the side of a tree and used by a lumberjack when working at some height from the ground. <i>He uses other people s ideas as a springboard for his own.</i>

<u>stifle</u>	Restrain (a reaction) or stop oneself acting on (an emotion). <i>She stifled a giggle.</i>
strangle	Conceal or hide. <i>The imperialist nation wanted to strangle the free trade between the two small countries.</i>
<u>submerge</u>	Sink below the surface; go under or as if under water. <i>Houses had been flooded and cars submerged.</i>
<u>suffocate</u>	Die or cause to die from lack of air or inability to breathe. <i>He said he'd suffocate if he remained in this house for another hour.</i>
suffocation	Difficulty in breathing. <i>The country's slow suffocation under the ever increasing weight of red tape.</i>
sunken	Having a sunken area. <i>The wreck of a sunken ship.</i>
surf	A spell of surfing. <i>He fell to his death while surfing on a 70 mph train.</i>
surfing	The sport of riding a surfboard toward the shore on the crest of a wave. <i>Why share your internet connection with people surfing and chatting.</i>
<u>swim</u>	Cross a particular stretch of water by swimming. <i>They took a short swim in the pool.</i>
swimmer	A sperm cell. <i>Red flags to warn swimmers of dangerous currents.</i>
<u>throttle</u>	A pedal that controls the throttle valve. <i>It has two engines that can be throttled.</i>
underwater	Submerged; flooded. <i>An epidemic of underwater mortgages.</i>
welter	Move in a turbulent fashion. <i>The streams foam and welter.</i>
