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## Associations of "Drying" (30 Words)

<b>anhydrous</b>	(of a substance, especially a crystalline compound) containing no water.
<b>arid</b>	Lacking vitality or spirit; lifeless-C.J.Rolo. <i>The <b>arid</b> plains north of Cape Town.</i>
<b>aridity</b>	A deficiency of moisture (especially when resulting from a permanent absence of rainfall).
<b>blacken</b>	Damage or destroy (someone’s reputation) by speaking badly of them. <i>Stone <b>blackened</b> by the soot of ages.</i>
<b>char</b>	Burn to charcoal. <i>The <b>char</b> will clean the carpet.</i>
<b>climatic</b>	Of or relating to a climate. <i>Under certain <b>climatic</b> conditions desert locusts increase in number.</i>
<b>dehydrate</b>	Lose water or moisture. <i>In the desert you get <b>dehydrated</b> very quickly.</i>
<b>desert</b>	Desert a cause a country or an army often in order to join the opposing cause country or army. <i>We feel our public representatives have <b>deserted</b> us.</i>
<b>desiccant</b>	A hygroscopic substance used as a drying agent. <i>Natural <b>desiccants</b> cause fleas to dehydrate and die.</i>
<b>desiccate</b>	Preserve by removing all water and liquids from. <i>Years of drought have <b>desiccated</b> the soil.</i>
<b>desiccated</b>	Lacking vitality or spirit; lifeless. <i>Shredded and <b>desiccated</b> coconut meat.</i>
<b>desiccation</b>	Dryness resulting from the removal of water. <i>Long periods of drought have led to the <b>desiccation</b> of farming land.</i>
<b>dried</b>	Preserved by removal or evaporation of moisture. <i>The ink has <b>dried</b>.</i>

<b>drought</b>	A shortage of rainfall. <i>Farmers most affected by the <b>drought</b> hope that there may yet be sufficient rain early in the growing season.</i>
<b>dryness</b>	Lack of interest, excitement, or embellishment; dullness. <i><b>Dryness</b> of the mouth may occur while you are taking this medicine.</i>
<b>evaporate</b>	Lose or cause to lose liquid by vaporization leaving a more concentrated residue. <i><b>Evaporate</b> milk.</i>
<b>evaporation</b>	The process of something abstract ceasing to exist. <i>Thousands of employees witnessed the rapid <b>evaporation</b> of their retirement plans.</i>
<b>famish</b>	Deprive of food. <i>They had <b>famished</b> the city into surrender.</i>
<b>humidity</b>	A quantity representing the amount of water vapour in the atmosphere or in a gas. <i>The temperature is seventy seven the <b>humidity</b> in the low thirties.</i>
<b>moisturize</b>	Make (more) humid. <i>Revitalize your face <b>moisturize</b> your skin.</i>
<b>parch</b>	Cause to wither or parch from exposure to heat. <i>A piece of grassland <b>parched</b> by the sun.</i>
<b>parched</b>	Dried out with heat. <i><b>Parched</b> corn.</i>
<b>precipitation</b>	An unexpected acceleration or hastening. <i>These convective processes produce cloud and <b>precipitation</b>.</i>
<b>scorch</b>	Become scorched or singed under intense heat or dry conditions. <i>The invaders <b>scorched</b> the land.</i>
<b>sear</b>	Become superficially burned. <i>The unfortunate childhood encounter is <b>seared</b> on his memory.</i>
<b>semiarid</b>	Somewhat arid. <i>A <b>semiarid</b> region with little annual rainfall.</i>
<b>shrivel</b>	Decrease in size, range, or extent. <i>She <b>shrivelled</b> him with one glance.</i>
<b>singe</b>	A superficial burn. <i>The fire had <b>singed</b> his eyebrows.</i>
<b>thirst</b>	A feeling of needing or wanting to drink something. <i>A <b>thirst</b> for knowledge.</i>

**withered**

(used especially of vegetation) having lost all moisture.  
*He did well despite his **withered** arm.*
