Synonyms of "Dumbfounded" as an adjective (19 Words)

astonished Greatly surprised or impressed; amazed.

confounded Used for emphasis, especially to express anger or annoyance.

He was a **confounded** nuisance.

dazed In a state of mental numbness especially as resulting from shock.

I was left **dazed** and confused.

dumbstricken As if struck dumb with astonishment and surprise.

dumbstruck So shocked or surprised as to be unable to speak.

He was **dumbstruck** with terror.

dumfounded As if struck dumb with astonishment and surprise.

flabbergasted Greatly surprised or astonished.

The **flabbergasted** aldermen were speechless.

goggle-eyed With eyes or mouth open in surprise.

nonplussed So surprised and confused that one is unsure how to react.

Henry looked completely **nonplussed**.

Temporarily incapable of speaking.

speechless
Speechless with shock.

Excited by sudden surprise or alarm and making a quick involuntary

startled movement.

Students **startled** by the teacher's quiet return.

stunned So shocked that one is temporarily unable to react; astonished.

Lay semiconscious **stunned** or stupefied by the blow.

stupefiedIn a state of mental numbness especially as resulting from shock.

Lay semiconscious stunned or **stupefied** by the blow.

surprisedTaken unawares or suddenly and feeling wonder or astonishment.

A **surprised** expression.

thunderstruck As if struck dumb with astonishment and surprise.

They were **thunderstruck** by this revelation.

wide-eyed Fully open or extended.

- He was utterly dumbfounded.

disorient The inconsistencies of the narrative do more than merely **disorient** and

challenge the reader.

embarrass Cause to be embarrassed cause to feel self conscious.

She wouldn t **embarrass** either of them by making a scene.

faze Disturb or disconcert (someone.

She was not **faze**d by his show of anger.

flurry Move in an agitated or confused manner.

There was a brief **flurry** of activity in the hall.

Lawyers who **mystify** the legal system so that laymen find it unintelligible.

Make obscure, unclear, or unintelligible. obfuscate

The new rule is more likely to **obfuscate** people than enlighten them.

Make more complicated.

Completely baffled; very puzzled. perplexed

Perplexed language.

Filled with bewilderment. **puzzled**

She looked **puzzled** and angry with him.

Struck with fear, dread, or consternation. shocked

Make dull or stupid or muddle with drunkenness or infatuation.
