## **Dungeon as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Dungeon" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “dungeon” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A strong underground prison cell, especially in a castle.*
- *The main tower within the walls of a medieval castle or fortress.*
- *A dark cell (usually underground) where prisoners can be confined.*



### Synonyms of "Dungeon" as a noun (5 Words)

<b>donjon</b>	The great tower or innermost keep of a castle.
<b><u>keep</u></b>	Food, clothes, and other essentials for living. <i>Each child was expected to pay for their <b>keep</b>.</i>
<b>oubliette</b>	A dungeon with the only entrance or exit being a trap door in the ceiling.
<b>underground cell</b>	An electric railway operating below the surface of the ground (usually in a city).
<b>underground prison</b>	An electric railway operating below the surface of the ground (usually in a city).



## Associations of "Dungeon" (30 Words)

- arrest** Stop or check (progress or a process).  
*I have a warrant for your **arrest**.*
- captive** A person who is confined; especially a prisoner of war.  
*The policeman put a pair of handcuffs on the **captive**.*
- captivity** The condition of being imprisoned or confined.  
*The third month of their **captivity** passed.*
- capture** Capture as if by hunting snaring or trapping.  
*This nucleus has **captured** the slow moving neutrons.*
- chase** A rectangular metal frame used in letterpress printing to hold together the pages or columns of composed type that are printed at one time.  
*He **chased** down the motorway.*



<b>committal</b>	The act of committing a crime. <i>The funeral service was held on May 12 followed by <b>committal</b> at Forest Lawn Cemetery.</i>
<b><u>convict</u></b>	A person who has been convicted of a criminal offense. <i>The thieves were <b>convicted</b> of the robbery.</i>
<b><u>conviction</u></b>	An unshakable belief in something without need for proof or evidence. <i>She takes pride in stating her political <b>convictions</b>.</i>
<b><u>culprit</u></b>	The cause of a problem or defect. <i>Low level ozone pollution is the real <b>culprit</b>.</i>
<b>dark</b>	Of a person having dark skin hair or eyes. <i><b>Dark</b> eyes.</i>
<b>deport</b>	Expel (a foreigner) from a country, typically on the grounds of illegal status or for having committed a crime. <i>He has <b>deported</b> himself with great dignity.</i>
<b>detention</b>	A state of being confined (usually for a short time). <i>The fifteen people arrested were still in police <b>detention</b>.</i>
<b>felony</b>	A serious crime (such as murder or arson). <i>An accusation of <b>felony</b>.</i>
<b>fetter</b>	Restrain with fetters. <i>The <b>fetters</b> of convention.</i>
<b><u>imprison</u></b>	Put or keep in prison or a place like a prison. <i>He was <b>imprisoned</b> three times for his activities.</i>
<b><u>imprisonment</u></b>	The act of confining someone in a prison (or as if in a prison). <i>The <b>imprisonment</b> of captured soldiers.</i>
<b>incarcerate</b>	Imprison or confine. <i>The murderer was <b>incarcerated</b> for the rest of his life.</i>
<b>infernal</b>	Expletives used informally as intensifiers. <i>An <b>infernal</b> nuisance.</i>
<b>inmate</b>	One of several occupants of a house. <i><b>Inmates</b> of the Louisiana State Penitentiary.</i>
<b>intern</b>	Work as an intern. <i>During WW II Japanese were <b>interned</b> in camps in the West.</i>
<b>jail</b>	Put someone in jail. <i>The driver was <b>jailed</b> for two years.</i>
<b>nick</b>	Cut a nick into. <i>Stuart and Dan got <b>nicked</b> for burglary.</i>

<b>parole</b>	Release a criminal from detention and place him on parole. <i>He was <b>paroled</b> after serving nine months of a two year sentence.</i>
<b>penitentiary</b>	An office in the papal court forming a tribunal for deciding on questions relating to penance, dispensations, and absolution. <i><b>Penitentiary</b> institutions.</i>
<b>prison</b>	Imprison. <i>The young man was <b>prisoned</b> behind the doors.</i>
<b>probation</b>	A way of dealing with offenders without imprisoning them; a defendant found guilty of a crime is released by the court without imprisonment subject to conditions imposed by the court. <i><b>Probation</b> is part of the sentencing process.</i>
<b>quest</b>	(in medieval romance) an expedition made by a knight to accomplish a prescribed task. <i>He was a real scientist <b>questing</b> after truth.</i>
<b>siege</b>	A group of herons. <i>Verdun had withstood a <b>siege</b> of ten weeks.</i>
<b>violation</b>	The crime of forcing a person to submit to sexual intercourse against his or her will. <i>The aircraft were in <b>violation</b> of UN resolutions.</i>
<b>warden</b>	The chief official in charge of a prison. <i>Securely handcuffed to a <b>warden</b> he was taken to Wandsworth Prison.</i>
