**humbug** Communication (written or spoken) intended to deceive.

She was always ready to help him provided he didn t **humbug**.

A hypocritical person.

**hypocrite** The story tells of respectable Ben who turns out to be a cheat and a

hypocrite.

**infidelity** Disbelief in a particular religion, especially Christianity.

Her **infidelity** continued after her marriage.

**perfidious** the Carthaginians by the Romans.

A **perfidious** lover.

**perfidy**The state of being deceitful and untrustworthy.

Hapsburg **perfidy**.

**phony** Fraudulent; having a misleading appearance.
