<b>persistent</b>	Retained; not shed. <i>An attempt to stop <b>persistent</b> drink drivers.</i>
<b>persisting</b>	Relentless and indefatigable in pursuit or as if in pursuit.
<b><u>resistant</u></b>	Offering resistance to something or someone. <i><b>Resistant</b> to persuasion.</i>
<b>sound</b>	Vigorous or severe. <i>A <b>sound</b> timber.</i>
<b><u>stout</u></b>	Dependable. <i><b>Stout</b> hearts.</i>
<b>strong</b>	Relating to or denoting the strongest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts between nucleons and other hadrons when closer than about 10 cm so binding protons in a nucleus despite the repulsion due to their charge and which conserves strangeness parity and isospin. <i>The competition was too <b>strong</b>.</i>
<b><u>sturdy</u></b>	Strong enough to withstand rough work or treatment. <i>The bike is <b>sturdy</b> enough to cope with bumpy tracks.</i>
<b><u>substantial</u></b>	Of or relating to the real nature or essential elements of something. <i>A <b>substantial</b> family.</i>
<b><u>tough</u></b>	Physically toughened. <i>Poor kid It s <b>tough</b> on her.</i>
<b>undestroyable</b>	Not capable of being destroyed.
<b>well made</b>	In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury.

*The party stood for **unchanging** principles.*

Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable.  
*She fixed him with an **unwavering** stare.*
